

CATHOLIC MEN'S CONFERENCE



I see people going every which way in life and in my opinion, I've come to the conclusion that people really need to say the rosary. They need it more than they can imagine. So much fighting would go away, so many good ideas would surface, so much grace would be given. **The Rosary is just amazing!** I often like to connect it to one of Our Lady's titles: **'CAUSE OF OUR JOY'**.

I always try to pray the rosary after Mass with the people who are able to stay for it, for a few reasons. Is it because I'm holier than thou? **Nope!** It's because in my experience, my day is ALWAYS better when I do. There have been numerous days when I've wondered: Why was I off today...Why was I so impatient, etc. then remember that I'd missed the rosary. I also like to pray the rosary with other people – why? Our Lord said, where two or more are gathered in my Name, there am I in their midst. The Church also offers a plenary indulgence for saying the Rosary as a family or when it is said in a church together (with usual conditions: confession within 20 days, pray for Holy Father's intentions (Our Father Hail Mary and Glory Be – we do this as part of the Rosary!), and receive Holy Communion that day otherwise it is a partial indulgence. The Church is confirming this prayer together. Make every effort to say the rosary together! I like to think the way St. Louis de Montfort did; when you say the rosary with ten people, you get credit for ten rosaries. There are of course a million more reasons; "I have to chastise my body and bring it into subjection." In our spiritual lives, we often have to **make** ourselves do things that we know are good; the beauty, peace and fruit comes after the tilling of the soil. The Rosary really helps people to love better ultimately. I see it as pumping love into our heart. Why else would the Church, the popes and the saints tell us to say it? We overcome evil with Good. Still the most important reason might be that Our Lady wants us to say it each day. She told us at Fatima to say the Rosary each day for world peace. (15 minutes a day). We know it is for our good surely. A challenge; if you are saying it 3 days a week; great! God bless, but you have to strive to get to 7 days. Our Lady knows you are up for it! If not at all, start with a decade. Beauty awaits. I went to a lunch with a friend a while back and he said to me; it is my one year anniversary. I said of what? He said of saying the rosary every day. Nice work!

YEAR OF SAINT JOSEPH

Pope Francis has proclaimed a “Year of St. Joseph” in honor of the 150th Anniversary of his declaration as Patron of the Universal Church, beginning Dec. 8, 2020, and ending Dec. 8, 2021 with a special decree outlining conditions for receiving indulgences.

The decree signed by the head of the Vatican’s Apostolic Penitentiary, Cardinal Mauro Piacenza, said the year would be an opportunity for the faithful to follow St. Joseph’s example and “daily strengthen their life of faith in full fulfillment of God’s will” and outlined several instances in which the faithful will be able to obtain a plenary indulgence in relation to the Year of St. Joseph, provided they meet the usual conditions of going to confession, receiving the Eucharist, and praying for the intentions of the pope.

According to the decree, a plenary indulgence will be available under these conditions:

- * To those who meditate on the Our Father prayer for at least 30 minutes or take part in a spiritual retreat of at least one day that includes a meditation on St. Joseph.
- * To those who perform a corporal or spiritual work of mercy
- * To families or engaged couples who recite the rosary together
- * To those who entrust their daily work to St. Joseph and those who ask St. Joseph to intercede for the unemployed.
- * To those who recite a prayer to St. Joseph (the litanies of St. Joseph in the Latin rite, or Akathistos to St. Joseph in the Byzantine rite, or any other prayer to St. Joseph) for the relief of Christians persecuted both inside and outside of the Church
- * To faithful who recite “any legitimately approved prayer or act of piety in honor of St. Joseph,” with an encouragement to do so on the March 19 and May 1 feasts of St. Joseph, the Feast of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph, the Byzantine celebration of St. Joseph’s Sunday, and on the 19th of every month and on every Wednesday, which has been dedicated to St. Joseph in the Latin rite
- * To the elderly, sick, dying and those legitimately unable to leave the house, who recite an act of piety to St. Joseph under his title of Comfort of the Sick and Patron of a happy death, provided they offer their discomfort to God and fulfill the conditions for the indulgence “as soon as possible”

Cardinal Placenza urged all priests with the appropriate faculties to make themselves available to an extra degree to offer confessions and to administer communion to the sick more often.
