## Gospel Meditation

In the backyard of the house where I live with other priests, there is a lemon tree which produces a huge amount of fruit. One evening in the spring I needed some lemons for a chicken dish. I glanced from the kitchen and saw the tree bursting with large, bright, gorgeous lemons, hanging thick on seemingly every branch. Turning to Fr. Bob (I'll change his name to protect the innocent) who sat on the couch, I said, "Father, could you pick a few lemons for me?" He said sure and into the backyard he went. He returned a few minutes later empty-handed. "John, there's no lemons. Sorry." I said, "What are you talking about?" I looked again and saw the grapefruit tree on the other side of the yard, which had recently been picked clean of fruit. He didn't see the abundant fruit because he was looking in the wrong place!

Like Fr. Bob, we sadly don't see the fruit all around us. We think that the culture is spiraling down, young people avoid church, and the future looks bleak. Why go out into the world and work? The world looks like a fruitless tree.

Jesus doesn't see things that way. This week he tells us, "The harvest is abundant, but the laborers are few." Look again: there is spiritual fruit hanging all around us! The lonely ready to be visited. The sick ready to be healed. The forgotten ready to be remembered. The poor ready to be treated with dignity. The sad ready to be consoled. The young ready for the Gospel. So, let's ask the Lord to send laborers to get to work. And he will. He might send you and me. Just remember to look at the correct trees.

## St. Romuald, Abbot

Feast Day: June 19
St. Romuald was born at Ravenna about the year 956. In spite of an innate desire for virtue and sanctity, his early life was wasted in the service of the world and its pleasures. Then one day, obliged by his father, Sergius, to be present at a duel fought by him, he beheld him slay his adversary. The crime made such an impression upon him that he determined to expiate it for forty days, as though it were entirely his own. For this purpose he retired to a Benedictine monastery ofSt. Apollinare, near Ravenna, where he became Abbot (996-999). After founding several monasteries he laid the foundations of the austere Order of Camaldoli in Tuscany.
Like all the saints, he fought a life-long battle against the assaults of devils and men. In the beginning of his spiritual life he was strongly assailed by numerous temptations, which he conquered by vigilance and prayer. More than one attempt was made on his life, but Divine Providence enabled him to escape from the danger. Like many servants of God, he also became the victim of calumny, which he bore in patience and silence. In his old age he increased his austerities instead of diminishing them.
After a long life of merit he died in the monastery of Castro, which he founded in Marquisate of Ancona. His death occurred on June 19, about the year 1027.

> This youthfuil scion of the illustrious house of Gonzaga, son ofFerdinand, Marquis of Castiglione in the diocese of Brescia, March 9, 1568. From his tenderest yearsSt. Aloysius devoted himself heart and soul to the service of his Creator.Hismemory has cometo us with the sweet fagrance of the mostunsullied purity.He united an innocenceperfectly angelic with a penance tuly heroic.
> At foutteen years of age he accompanied his father to Spain, where the latter went to attend the Empress, Maria of Austia, wife of Maximilian II. Philip II made him page to Pince James, elderbrother of Philip II. His innocenceremained uncontaminated amide the vanities of the cout, nor could the world draw his heart fiom God. Onhis retum to Italy in 1584 , he manifested his desirieto enter the Society of Jesus. In spite of opposition, he finally succeeded in carrying outhis intentions and became a novice at Rome in 1585 , during the pontificate of Pope Pius V. Hemadehis professionNovember 20, 1587, and soonafferreceived minor orders. From the begimning of his religious life St. Aloysius was a model of perfection. During an epidemic in Rome in 1591 , he distinguished himselfby his charity toward the sick in the hospital. These labors brought on him the illness that ended in his death. His lastdays were the faithfuil echo of his briefly consummated life. He exchanged time for etemity on June 21,1591 , attwenty-four years of age. St. Aloysius was canonized by Benedict XIII in 1726.

## St. Paulinus of Nola, Bishop

Feast Day: June 22
Born in 353 at Bordeaux, Gaul, of a senatorial family, St. Paulinus was educated under the poet Ausonius, and became governor of the province of Campania. He married a Spanish Christian lady named Therasia and for fifteen years displayed his talents in honorable employments in Gaul, Italy, and Spain. His conversations with St. Ambrose at Milan, St. Martin whom he met at Vienne, and St. Delphinus, Bishop of Bordeaux, resulted in his being baptized by the latter in 590.

After the death of his only child he and his wife took a vow of chastity, gave away their considerable wealth, and retired to Spain to embrace the religious life. In 394, he was ordained in Barcelona at the insistence of the people, and together with is wife settled at Nola, Italy, near the tomb of St. Felix, where they founded a home for monks and the poor and lived a very austere life. Because of his widespread reputation for holiness, he was made Bishop of Nola in 409. His sanctity brought St. Paulinus in contact with the most eminent saints of his time, such as Augustine and the ones already mentioned above. He had an intense devotion to the saints and respect for their relics. His poetic works, many of them in honor of St. Felix, place him beside Prudentius as the foremost Christian Latin poet of the patristic age. He died in 431.

## Sts. JohnFisher, Bishop and Thomas More, Martyrs FeastDay: June 22 Patron of Lawyers

St. John Fisherwas bom in Beverley, Yorkshire, in 1459, and educated at Cambridge, from which he received his Master of Arts degree in 1491. He occupied the vicarage of Northalletton, 1491-1494; then he became proctor of Cambridge University.In 1497, he was appointed confessor to Lady Margaret Beaufort, mother of Henry VII, and became closely associated in her endowments to Cambridge; he created scholarships, introduced Greek and Hebrew into the curriculum, and brought in the world-famous Erasmus as Professor of Divinity and Greek.
In 1504, he became Bishop of Rochester and Chancellor of Cambridge, in which capacity he also tutored Prince Henry who was to become Henry VIII. St. John was dedicated to the welfare ofhis diocese and his university. From 1527, thishumble servant of God actively opposed the King's divorce proceedings against Catherine, his wife in the sight of God, and steadfastly resisted the encroachment of Henry on the Church. Unlike the other Bishops of the realm, St. John refused to take the oath of succession which acknowledged the issue of Henry and Anne as the legitimate heir to the throne, and he was imprisoned in the Tower in April 1534. Thenext yearhe was made a Cardinal by Paul III, and Henry retaliated by having him beheaded within a month. A half-hour beforehis execution, this dedicated scholar and churchmanopened hisNew Testament for the lastime and his eyes fell on the following words fromSt. John's Gospel: "Etemal life is this: toknow You, the only tue God, and him whom You have sent, Jesus Christ. Ihave given You glory onearth by finishing the work You gave me to do. Doyounow, Father, give me glory at Your side" (17, 3-5). Closing the book, heobserved: "There is enough leaming in that tolast me the restofmy life."St. Thomas More was bom at London in 1478. After a thorough grounding in religion and the classics, he enteredOxford to study law. Upon leaving the university he embarked on a legal career which took him to Parliament. In 1505 , he married his beloved Jane Colt who borehim four children, and when she died at a young age he maried a widow, Alice Middleton, to be a mother for his young children. A wit and a reformer, this leamed mannumbered Bishops and scholars amonghis friends, and by 1516 wrote hi world-famous book Utopia.. He attracted the attention of Henry VIII who appointed him to a succession of high posts and missions, and finally madehimLord Chancellor in 1529. However, he resigned in 1532 , at the height of his career and reputation, whenHenry persisted in holding his own opinions regarding marriage and the supremacy of the Pope.
The restofhis life was spent in witing mostly in defense of the Church. In 1534, with his close friend, St. John Fisher, he refused to render allegiance to the King as the Head of the Church of England and was confined to the Tower. Fiffeen months later, and nine days after St. John Fisher's execution, he was tried and convicted of treason. He told the cour that he couldnot go against his conscience and wished his judges that "we may yet hereafter in heaven merily all meet together to everlasting salvation." And on the scaffold he told the crowd of spectators that he was dying as "the King's good servant-but God's first."He was beheaded on July 6, 1535.
