Weekend Masses— Saturday at 4:30 pm, Sunday at 8:00 and 10:30 am **Rosary** after weekday Masses.



Forty Hours Devotion

What is the Forty Hours Devotion?

The Forty Hours Devotion is an opportunity to gather as a community before the Blessed sacrament and to pray before the Lord in solemn adoration. It gives us time to deepen our appreciation of the importance of the mystery of the Eucharist in our lives. Traditionally, it begins and ends with a celebration of Mass. At the end of this opening Mass the Blessed

Sacrament is exposed, and over a period of a few days the faithful are given the opportunity to assemble in prayer.

In the celebration of the Forty Hours Devotion we are able to witness a fuller expression of our theology of the Eucharist. This devotion also gives an opportunity to give voice to our belief in the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharistic elements. As the community gathers in prayer before the Blessed Sacrament, it witnesses to our belief, as a Church, that what is before us is bread no longer but truly the Body of Christ.

Catholics - Did You Know?

Our Catholic Church has a ranking of feast days that are not random, but carefully set into the annual Liturgical Calendar. What those feast days are and their rank has evolved over the past 450 years. The Catholic Catechism says, "The Church on earth shows she is united with the liturgy of heaven." Sunday is the original feast day, and most important in celebrating the Eucharist. Other feasts honor various mysteries of the Lord, the Virgin Mary, and the saints. Here are the rankings and descriptions:

> **Solemnities** - They celebrate major mysteries in the life of Jesus and Mary, honor significant saints like St. Joseph, St. John the Baptist, and Sts. Peter & Paul, or celebrate titles of God such as Christ Our King. There are 24 of these days, with six being holy days of obligation. Like a Sunday Mass, there are three readings, the Gloria and Creed. The holy days of obligation are: Jan. 1, Mary, the Mother of God; The Ascension of our Lord (the 6th Thursday after Easter but in our Archdiocese and most of the US it's transferred to the Sunday after.) Aug. 15, the Assumption of Mary into Heaven; Nov. 1, All Saints Day; Dec. 8, The Immaculate Conception of Mary; Dec. 25, The Nativity (Birth) of our Lord Jesus.

Feasts - These honor secondary mysteries or titles of God, the Virgin Mary, or saints of special importance. Examples are: the four Evangelists, and the Transfiguration. (The Feast of the Holy Angels is one too.) Many of these fall during the week, and are not obligatory. Those Masses will have two readings with the addition of the Gloria.

Memorials - They celebrate the majority of saints, or some aspect of God e.g. The Holy Name of Jesus. Some are designated obligatory, meaning they must be celebrated on the assigned day and have readings related to the saint. Optional memorials give the celebrant the choice to celebrate that saint with the readings chosen for them, or instead celebrate the Mass of the day using the readings normal for the day.

Now when you get your new Catholic calendar at Christmas, or if you subscribe to "Magnificat", you will better understand the meaning of the various feasts.
