
# September 1, 2021 (Wed. Out-of-Cycle Sacramental Prep Classes Meet in Parish Center)

#### Lessons from the National Study of Youth and Religion



We can learn how to be more successful parents and catechists by looking at the findings of longitudinal studies that tracked children through adolescence and adulthood with respect to their faith. The study indicates that the primary driver that a child will know and love God and will continue in their faith throughout their life, is home religious habits. Simply put, the most important thing parents can do is to lead by example by constantly demonstrating the faith, to include regular attendance at mass, consistently choosing the higher good, and leading their family in daily rosary and prayer. We can support but not replace parents for religious education.
