Sunday of Divine Mercy

The doubting Thomas was not among the Apostles when the Savior appeared to them on Easter Sunday night. When the others told Thomas that they had seen the Lord, he stubbornly replied that he would not believe unless he put his fingers into the wounds in Christ's hands and his hand into Christ's opened side. A week later, Jesus appeared to the disciples, called Thomas to Him and asked him to do exactly what Thomas had demand as condition of believing. Thomas repented of his doubt and pronounced those words that by now have been repeated million of times by believing Catholics at the elevations at Mass. 'My Lord and my God," Thomas declared. The human language could not be

Faith in the fact that Christ is totally present in the Holy Eucharist is the key that unlocks the treasures of His Sacred Heart. And, in that Most Sacred Heart is the unfathomable Divine Mercy. If there is one divine attribute that we spontaneously associate with Christ and Christianity it is the attribute of mercy. Mercy, we may safely say, is the distinctive quality of being a Christian: The spirit of Christianity is the spirit of mercy.

Mercy is the disposition to be kind and forgiving. Founded on compassion, mercy differs from compassion or the feeling of sympathy in putting this feeling into practice with a readiness to assist. It is therefore the ready willingness to help anyone in need, especially in need of pardon or reconciliation.

DIVINE MERCY. The love of God beyond what humankind deserves. In one sense, every manifestation of God's love is an expression of mercy. But more properly, mercy is the exercise of divine charity toward those who have sinned. Mercy, then, is God's continued love of humans although they have sinned, His forgiving love that invites them to be reconciled with the God against whom they have sinned, His condoning love that mitigates and is even willing to remove all the punishment due to sin, and his superabundant love that mysteriously blesses the repentant sinners beyond what they might have received from God before the sin.

What is mercy? It comes in two stages. First stage. Mercy is love shown not only to those who are in need, but also to those who are in want. "Need" expresses the real objective absence or lack in someone. "Want" is rather the subjective, the psychological desire to get whatever a person wants. Can people need what they don't want? Yes. Can people want things what they don't need? Yes. Mercy is meeting people's needs; it is also meeting people's subjective wants. Did the Mother of Mercy practice the love shown to those who are in want? We would hardly say that there was an objective need at the marriage feast in Cana.

Second stage. And here, we must understand our faith clearly in order to live it properly. Mercy is love shown not only to those in need or love shown not only to those who are in want, but mercy is love shown to those who are not lovable. Are there lovable people in need? Are all people in need lovable? Mercy is love shown to those who do not deserve to be loved, they don't have a claim on my love, in fact maybe just the opposite. What they deserve from me is rejection.

Mercy is love shown to those who do not love—that is as far as we can tell. Mercy is love shown to those who have rejected our love. We've tried three times or thirty times. Remember Peter's question to Christ? "How often shall I forgive my brother? Seven times?" Christ using an Aramaic figure, said, "As often as he has wronged you." Mercy is loving rejected love. No one in their right mind or heart, apart from the grace of God, can do this. It is impossible naturally to love people who have rejected our love of them.

Mercy is love shown to those who have been unjust to the one who now is supposed to love them. Mercy is shown not only to those who fail in love but to those who fail in justice, those who cheat us, those who steal from us, etc. "Blessed are the merciful; they shall reach Heaven." No one else will.
