KNOW YOUR FAITH

THE FIRST NOVENA

The novena in honor of the Holy Spirit is the oldest of all novenas since it was first made at the direction of Our Lord Himself when He sent His apostles back to Jerusalem to await the coming of the Holy Spirit on the first Pentecost. It is still the only novena officially prescribed by the Church. Addressed to the Third Person of the Blessed Trinity, it is a powerful plea for the light and strength and love so sorely needed by every Christian.

While meeting with the disciples, Jesus enjoined them not to depart from Jerusalem, but to wait for "the promise of the Father about which you have heard me speak; for John baptized with water, but in a few days you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit." When they had gathered together they asked him, "Lord, are you at this time going to restore the kingdom to Israel?" He answered them, "It is not for you to know the times or seasons that the Father has established by his own authority. But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes upon you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, throughout Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." (Acts 1:4)

"Over the next nine days, the Apostles and disciples did as Jesus had commanded and on the tenth day, Pentecost happened, the fiery and powerful gift of the Holy Spirit was given to them. They had prayed the first Christian novena. Since then, novenas, nine days of prayer for a specific intention have been a normal and healthy part of Christian devotion, both personally and communally...If a novena is authentically Catholic and biblical, it will have all the elements we read about in the Scriptures: 1) nine days (or a specific number of days or moments of prayer); 2) asking for a specific grace or gift; and 3) is oriented to growth in faith, or the spread of God's kingdom."

CHARLES LWANGA was a Ugandan convert to the Catholic Church, who was martyred for his faith and is revered as a saint by both the Catholic Church and the Anglican Communion. Lwanga served as a page and later major-domo in the court of King Mwangi II. As part of

the king's resistance to foreign colonization, Mwangi insisted that Christian converts abandon their new faith, and executed dozens of Anglicans and Catholics between 1885 and 1887, many of whom were officials in the royal court or otherwise very close to him. The Christian persecutions began in 1885 with the massacre of Anglican missionaries. Joseph Mukasa, a Roman Catholic priest and an official at Mwangi's court, rebuked the king for the deed, and was beheaded for it. Lwanga, who was chief page at the time, took up Mukasa's duties, and on that same day sought baptism from a Catholic missionary priest. On May 25, 1886, Mwangi charged two of his pages with the practice of Christianity, and then condemned them to death. The next day, Lwanga secretly baptized those of his charges who were still only catechumens. The king interrogated his court and demanded that they renounce the Christian faith. Their refusal to apostatize and their ongoing rejection of the king's sexual advances infuriated Mwangi, who had them bound and led to execution. Besides Lwanga, twelve Catholic boys and men and nine Anglicans were then burnt alive on June 3, 1886. As he was burnt, Lwanga said to his executioner, "It is as if you are pouring water on me. Please repent and become a Christian like me."
