including liturgical traditions.



KNOW YOUR FAITH

RICHARD OF CHICHESTER (1197–1253) was born at Wyche, Worcestershire, England. Orphaned while a young lad, he nonetheless received an excellent education at Oxford, Paris, and Bologna, Italy. He earned a doctorate in law from the University of Bologna. He was appointed chancellor of Oxford in 1235 and then chancellor to Edmund Rich, the archbishop of Canterbury. After accompanying Edmund into retirement to a Cistercian abbey in France, he departed the community upon Edmund's death, taught at the Dominican house in Orkans, and was ordained there in 1243. Upon going home to England, he was named chancellor to Edmund's successor, St. Boniface of Savoy. When King Henry III appointed Ralph Neville to the see of Chichester in 1244, Boniface declared the nomination invalid and named Richard to the post, an act which caused an uproar in the kingdom. Finally, in 1245, Pope Innocent IV found in Richard's favor, but Richard was prevented from entering his palace by the machinations of Henry. Only after the king was threatened with excommunication was Richard able to take up his duties.

As bishop, Richard reformed the manners and morals of his clergy, and also introduced greater order and reverence into the services of the Church. He insisted upon strict adherence to discipline among the clergy, aided the poor, and fearlessly denounced the corruption and vices of the contemporary Church and the royal court. He died at Dover, in a home for poor priests, while delivering a plea for a crusade.

Richard is widely remembered today for the popular prayer ascribed to him, which he recited on his deathbed, surrounded by the clergy of the diocese. The words were transcribed, in Latin, by his confessor Ralph Bocking, a Dominican friar. The most widely-known modern translation renders it thus:

Thanks be to Thee, my Lord Jesus Christ
For all the benefits Thou hast given me,
For all the pains and insults Thou hast borne for me.
O most merciful Redeemer, friend and brother,
May I know Thee more clearly,
Love Thee more dearly,
Follow Thee more nearly.



A good concrete illustration of the Blessed Trinity is an equilateral triangle. Such a triangle has three sides equal in every way, and yet distinct from each other. There are three sides, but only one triangle. As we see in this illustration, each Divine

Person is different from the other two, but all three are God. Each one is God, distinct from the two others, and yet one with them. The three Persons are equal in every way, with one nature and one substance: three Divine Persons, but only one God.

SAINT ANTHONY OF PADUA [1195-1231] was born Fernando Martins into a wealthy family in Lisbon, Portugal. By the age of fifteen he asked to be sent to the Abbey of Santa Cruz in Coimbra, where he learned theology and Latin. When Franciscan friars settled a small hermitage outside Coimbra dedicated to Saint Anthony of Egypt, Fernando felt a longing to join the then-new order. When he was admitted, he changed his name to Anthony. He became renowned for both his knowledge and the eloquence of his preaching, and, in 1224, Francis of Assisi gave him the responsibility of teaching the friars.

Anthony had a book of psalms that contained notes and comments to help when teaching students and, in a time when a printing press was not yet invented, he greatly valued it. When a novice decided to leave the hermitage, he stole Anthony's valuable book. When Anthony discovered it was missing, he prayed it would be found or returned to him. The thief did return the book and in an extra step returned to the Order as well.

So simple and resounding was Anthony's teaching of the Catholic Faith, both the illiterate and the innocent could understand his messages. It is for this reason he was declared a Doctor of the Church by Pope Pius XII in 1946. He is typically depicted either with a lily, or with a book and the Infant Child Jesus. St. Anthony is most commonly invoked today as the "finder of lost things."
