KNOW YOUR FAITH



JOHN CHRYSOSTOM [c. 349 – 407], Archbishop of Constantinople, was an important Early Church Father. He is known for his preaching and public speaking, and for his ascetic sensibilities. The epithet *Χρυσόστομος* (Chrysostomos, anglicized as Chrysostom)

means “golden-mouthed” in Greek and denotes his celebrated eloquence. The Eastern Orthodox, together with the Byzantine Catholics, hold him in special regard as one of the Three Holy Hierarchs (alongside Basil the Great and Gregory of Nazianzus).

John was ordained as a deacon in 381 and as a presbyter (priest) in 386. In Antioch, over the course of twelve years (386–397), John gained popularity because of the eloquence of his public speaking at Antioch's cathedral. He called upon the rich to lay aside materialism in favor of helping the poor, often employing all of his rhetorical skills to shame wealthy people to abandon conspicuous consumption:

“Do you pay such honor to your excrements as to receive them into a silver chamber-pot when another man made in the image of God is perishing in the cold?”

His straightforward understanding of the Scriptures meant that his talks were practical, explaining the Bible's application to everyday life. Such straightforward preaching helped Chrysostom to garner popular support.

Beyond his preaching, the other lasting legacy of John is his influence on Christian liturgy. He revised the prayers and rubrics of the Divine Liturgy, or celebration of the Holy Eucharist. To this day, Eastern Orthodox and Eastern Catholic Churches of the Byzantine Rite typically celebrate the Divine Liturgy of St. John Chrysostom as the normal Eucharistic liturgy, although his exact connection with it remains a matter of debate.

Brethren: Owe no one anything, except to love one another; for he who loves his neighbor has fulfilled the law. The commandments, “You shall not commit adultery, You shall not kill, You shall not steal, You shall not covet,” and any other commandment, are summed up in this sentence, “You shall love your neighbor as yourself.” Love does no wrong to a neighbor; therefore love is the fulfilling of the law.



JOHN CHRYSOSTOM ON FASTING

“Do you fast? Give me proof of it by your works:

- If you see a poor man, take pity on him.
- If you see a friend being honored, do not envy him.
- Do not let only your mouth fast, but also the eye and the ear and the feet and the hands and all the members of our bodies.
- Let the hands fast, by being free of avarice.
- Let the feet fast, by ceasing to run after sin.
- Let the eyes fast, by disciplining them not to glare at that which is sinful.
- Let the ear fast, by not listening to evil talk and gossip.
- Let the mouth fast from foul words and unjust criticism.
- For what good is it if we abstain from birds and fishes, but bite and devour our brothers?”
