Anselm, Bishop and Doctor of the Church

KNOW YOUR FAITH

ANSELM

Anselm of Canterbury [c.1033- 21 April 1109] was a Benedictine monk, abbot, philosopher and theologian of the Catholic Church, who held the office of archbishop of Canterbury from 1093 to 1109. Anselm composed dialogues and treatises with a rational and philosophical approach, sometimes causing him to be credited as the founder of Scholasticism. Despite his lack of recognition in this field in his own time, Anselm is now famed as the originator of the ontological argument for the existence of God and of the satisfaction theory of atonement. He was proclaimed a Doctor of the Church by a bull of Pope Clement XI in 1720.

In the 11th and 12th centuries, a series of popes challenged the authority of European monarchs over who had the authority to appoint (“invest”) local church officials such as bishops of cities and abbots of monasteries. For his resistance in this struggle to the English kings William II and Henry I, Anselm (then serving as Archbishop of Canterbury) was exiled twice: once from 1097 to 1100 and then from 1105 to 1107. He died on Holy Wednesday, 21 April 1109.
