KNOW YOUR FAITH

JOHN MARY VIANNEY (8 May 1786 – 4 August 1859) was a French parish priest often referred to as the "Curé d'Ars" (i.e., Parish Priest of Ars); known internationally for his priestly and pastoral work in his parish in Ars, France, he effected a radical spiritual transformation of his village and its surroundings.

Vianney grew up during the French Revolution, when the Jacobins hunted down priests and sent them and their faithful to the guillotine. He made his First Communion at a secret Mass in a home near Écully. As a boy, seeing the danger around him, he nonetheless felt the call to the priesthood, and was ordained in 1815.

In 1818, he was assigned as chaplain to the small village of Ars where the Faith was largely neglected. The villagers however were curious about their new priest. Those who dropped by the small chapel found a man who spent hours a day deep in prayer before the Blessed Sacrament and who lived a life of great austerity and penance. Soon, more and more of his people started to attend his Masses, returning to the practice of the Faith because of his preaching and the Masses he offered with such love and care.

Vianney's greatest gift was the manner in which he opened to his people God's forgiveness: Fr. Vianney was a man consumed by the confessional. His people flocked to him for confession where he listened, understood, read their minds, and comforted them.

Ars became the European capital of reconciliation with God: men and women from across Europe and around the world set out for France because they believed that in an out-of-the-way French village, a priest consumed by prayer and penance was guiding souls to holiness. The pilgrimages to see him became international: thousands, eventually hundreds of thousands, of pilgrims—simple people, statesmen, Bishops—went every year to Ars for 30 years to make their confessions to this holy priest.

On 2 August 1859, Fr Vianney received Holy Communion and Extreme Unction from his own curate in joyful simplicity. He went home to his Lord two days later. In 1925, Pope Pius XI enrolled him among the saints, and in 1928 declared him Patron of the world's parish priests.

At that time: Jesus went to the other side of the Sea of Galilee,

which is the Sea of Tiberias. And a multitude followed him, because they saw the signs which he did on those who were diseased. Jesus went up into the hills, and there sat down with his disciples. Now the Passover, the feast of the Jews, was at hand. Lifting up his eyes, then, and seeing that a multitude was coming to him, Jesus said to Philip, "How are we to buy bread, so that these people may eat?" This he said to test him, for he himself knew what he would do. Philip answered him, "Two hundred denarii would not buy enough bread for each of them to get a little." One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said to him, "There is a lad here who has five barley loaves and two fish; but what are they among so many?" Jesus said, "Make the people sit down." Now there was much grass in the place; so the men sat down, in number about five thousand. Jesus then took the loaves, and when he had given thanks, he distributed them to those who were seated; so also the fish, as much as they wanted. And when they had eaten their fill, he told his disciples, "Gather up the fragments left over, that nothing may be lost." So they gathered them up and filled twelve baskets with fragments from the five barley loaves, left by those who had eaten. When the people saw the sign which he had done, they said, "This is indeed the prophet who is to come into the world!" Perceiving then that they were about to come and take him by force to make him king, Jesus withdrew again to the hills by himself.

If you would like to start charting after attending the Introductory Session, materials and instructions will be provided upon scheduling of the first follow-up session. The cost breakdown is as follows:

Introductory Session: \$50.00 (non-refundable)
User manual, chart, and stamps for the first 6 months: \$40.00

Private follow-ups: \$60.00 per follow-up
Each follow-up is about 1 ½ hours, and 8 follow-ups are scheduled throughout the first year of charting. Follow-ups are the essential part in learning and gaining confidence with using the system. More information on follow-ups will be presented at the Introductory Session.



SAINT ALPHONSUS LIGUORI CSsR (1696–1787) was an Italian Catholic bishop, spiritual writer, composer, musician, artist, poet, lawyer, scholastic philosopher, and theologian.

A prolific writer, he published nine editions of his *Moral Theology* in his lifetime, in addition to other devotional and ascetic works and letters. Among his best known works are *The Glories of Mary* and *The Way of the Cross*, the latter still used in many parishes during Lenten devotions.

He lived his first years as a priest with the homeless and the marginalized youth of Naples. He became very popular

because of his plain and simple preaching. He said: "I have never preached a sermon which the poorest old woman in the congregation could not understand." His sermons were very effective at converting those who had been alienated from their faith.

He founded the Congregation of the Most Holy Redeemer (the Redemptorists) with the charism of preaching popular missions in the city and the countryside. Its goal was to teach and preach in the slums of cities and other poor places. They also fought Jansenism, a heresy that supported a very strict morality: Liguori taught that "the penitents should be treated as souls to be saved rather than as criminals to be punished."

He was canonized in 1839 by Pope Gregory XVI and proclaimed a Doctor of the Church by Pope Pius IX in 1871. One of the most widely read Catholic authors, he is the patron saint of confessors.
