

KNOW YOUR FAITH

That every individual soul has a **GUARDIAN**

ANGEL, though never defined by the Church, nonetheless has been the “mind of the Church,” as St. Jerome expressed it: “how great the dignity of the soul, since each one has from his birth an angel commissioned to guard it.”

The Old Testament depicts God’s angels as His ministers who carry out special tasks regarding men and mundane affairs. Angels deliver Lot from danger; in Exodus, an angel is the appointed leader of the host of Israel, and God says to Moses: “my angel shall go before thee.” The story of Tobias might serve for a commentary on the words of Psalm 90:11: “For he hath given his angels charge over thee; to keep thee in all thy ways.”

In the New Testament, Christ set a seal upon the Old Testament teaching: “See that you despise not one of these little ones: for I say to you, that their angels in heaven always see the face of my Father who is in heaven.” (Matthew 18:10). From this we see that even little children have guardian angels, and that these same angels do not lose the vision of God by the fact that they have a mission to fulfil on earth. Hebrews 1:14 states: “Are they not all ministering spirits, sent to minister for them, who shall receive the inheritance of salvation?” This is the function of the guardian angels; they are to lead us, if we wish it, to the Kingdom of Heaven.

According to St. Thomas Aquinas, our guardian angels can act upon our senses (*Summa Theologica* I:111:4) and upon our imaginations (I:111:3) – not, however, upon our wills, except by working on our intellect, and thus upon our will, through the senses and the imagination. (I:106:2; and I:111:2). Finally, they are not separated from us after death, but remain with us in heaven, not, however, to help us attain salvation, but to enlighten us with their angelic ministry (I:108:7, ad 3am).


