KNOW YOUR FAITH

THE DEDICATION OF ST. JOHN LATERAN

Most Catholics think of St. Peter's as the pope's main church, but they are wrong. The Basilica of St. John Lateran is the cathedral of the diocese of Rome, the official ecclesiastical seat of the Holy Father, the Bishop of Rome, not St. Peter's Basilica as many mistakenly believe. It is the oldest and highest ranking of the four major basilicas in Rome. The Basilica is also called the Church of Holy Savior or the Church of St. John Baptist. This was the church where all Christians in ancient Rome were baptized.

The basilica was originally named the Archbasilica of the Most Holy Savior. However, it is called St. John Lateran because it was built in the fourth century on property donated to the Church by the Laterani family, and because the monks from the monastery of St. John the Baptist and St. John the Divine served it.

That original structure and its successors suffered fire, earthquake, and the ravages of war, but the Lateran remained the church where popes were consecrated until the seat of the papacy moved to Avignon in 1309. When the pope returned to Rome in 1377, he found the church and the adjoining palace in ruins.

Pope Innocent X commissioned the present structure in 1646. One of Rome's most imposing churches, the Lateran's towering facade is crowned with 15 colossal statues of Christ, John the Baptist, John the Evangelist, and 12 doctors of the Church. Beneath its high altar rest the remains of the small wooden table on which tradition holds Saint Peter himself celebrated Mass.

A Latin inscription in the Church reads: "omnium ecclesiarum Urbis et Orbis mater et caput."

Translated, this means, "The mother and head of all churches of the city and of the world." So, unlike the commemorations of other Roman churches, this anniversary is a feast. The dedication of a church is a feast for all its parishioners. In a sense, St. John Lateran is the parish church of all Catholics, because it is the pope's cathedral.

“[On November 9th] the liturgy celebrates the dedication of the Lateran Basilica, called ‘mother and head of all the churches of the city and the world.’ In fact, this basilica was the first to be built after Emperor Constantine’s edict, in 313, granted Christians freedom to practice their religion.

“The emperor himself gave Pope Miltiades the ancient palace of the Laterani family, and the basilica, the baptistry, and the patriarchate, that is, the Bishop of Rome’s residence – where the Popes lived until the Avignon period – were all built there. The basilica’s dedication was celebrated by Pope Sylvester around 324 and was named Most Holy Savior; only after the 6th century were the names of St. John the Baptist and St. John the Evangelist added, and now is typically denominated by these latter.

“Initially the observance of this feast was confined to the city of Rome; then, beginning in 1565, it was extended to all the Churches of the Roman rite. The honoring of this sacred edifice was a way of expressing love and veneration for the Roman Church, which, as St. Ignatius of Antioch says, ‘presides in charity’ over the whole Catholic communion (Letter to the Romans, 1:1).”
