KNOW YOUR FAITH

BENEDICT BISCOP (c. 628 – 690) was an Anglo-Saxon abbot and founder of Monkwearmouth-Jarrow Priory.



At the age of 25 Benedict made the first of five trips to Rome, accompanying his friend Saint Wilfrid the Elder. When he returned to England, he was “full of fervour and

enthusiasm ... for the good of the English Church.” Benedict made a second journey to Rome twelve years later, this time stopping on his return at Lérins, a monastic island off the Mediterranean coast of Provence. During his two-year stay there, he took monastic vows and the name of “Benedict.” Benedict made a third trip to Rome, where he was commissioned by the pope to accompany Archbishop Theodore of Tarsus back to Canterbury. On their return Benedict was appointed abbot of SS. Peter and Paul’s, Canterbury. Benedict made his fifth and final trip to Rome in 679 to bring back books for a library, saintly relics, stonemasons, glaziers, and a grant from Pope Agatho granting his monastery certain privileges.

In 682, the King was so delighted at the success of St Peter’s, he gave Benedict more land in Jarrow to build a second monastery. Bede, one of Benedict’s pupils, tells us that he brought builders and glass-workers from Francia to erect the buildings in stone; indeed, it was here that Bede wrote his famous works.

Benedict’s idea was to build a model monastery for England. It was the first ecclesiastical building in Britain to be built in stone, and its use of glass was a novelty for many in 7th-century England. It eventually possessed what was a large library for the time – several hundred volumes assembled from Benedict’s travels abroad: mostly service books but also including scripture, classical, and secular works. The library became world-famous and manuscripts that had been copied there became prized possessions throughout Europe, including especially the Codex Amiatinus, the earliest surviving manuscript of the complete Bible in the Latin Vulgate version.

For the last three years of his life Benedict was bed-ridden, yet he suffered this affliction with great patience and faith. He died on 12 January 690, having seen in his lifetime the Church in England change from being divided between the Roman and Celtic Churches to a strong and growing Roman Catholic Church, united with the worldwide church.

They told him, "In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it is written by the prophet: 'And you, O Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler who will govern my people Israel.'" Then Herod summoned the wise men secretly and ascertained from them what time the star appeared; and he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, "Go and search diligently for the child, and when you have found him bring me word, that I too may come and worship him." When they had heard the king they went their way; and lo, the star which they had seen in the East went before them, till it came to rest over the place where the child was. When they saw the star, they rejoiced exceedingly with great joy; and going into the house they saw the child with Mary his mother, and they fell down and worshipped him. Then, opening their treasures, they offered him gifts, gold and frankincense and myrrh. And being warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they departed to their own country by another way.

RAYMOND OF PENYAFORT, O.P. (c. 1175 – 6 January 1275), was a Spanish Dominican friar who compiled the Decretals of Gregory IX, a collection of canon laws that remained a major part of Church law until the 20th century. Raymond served as the confessor for King James I of Aragon, who was a loyal son of the Church but allowed his lustful desires to shackle him. While on the island of Majorca to initiate a campaign to help convert the Moors living there, the king brought his mistress with him. Raymond reproved the king and asked him repeatedly to dismiss his concubine. This the king refused to do. Finally, the saint told the king that he could remain with him no longer and made plans to leave for Barcelona. But the king forbade Raymond to leave the island, and threatened punishment to any ship captain who dared to take him. Saint Raymond then said to his Dominican companion, "Soon you will see how the King of heaven will confound the wicked deeds of this early king and provide me with a ship!" They then went down to the seashore where Raymond took off his cappa (the long black cloak the Dominicans wear over the white tunic and scapular), and spread one end of it on the water while rigging the other end to his walking staff. Having thus formed a miniature mast, Raymond bid the other Dominican to hop on, but his companion, lacking the saint's faith, refused to do so. Then Raymond bid him farewell, and with the sign of the cross he pushed away from the shore and miraculously sailed away on his cloak. Skirting around the very boats that had forbidden him passage, the saint was seen by scores of sailors who shouted in astonishment and urged him on. Raymond sailed the ~160 miles to Barcelona in the space of six hours, where his landing was witnessed by a crowd of amazed spectators. Touched by this miracle, King James I renounced his evil ways and thereafter led a good life.
