



KNOW YOUR FAITH

Saint Anthony or Antony (January 12, 251 – January 17, 356), was a Christian monk from Egypt, revered since his death as a saint. He is distinguished from other saints named Anthony such as Anthony of Padua, by various epithets of his own: Anthony the Great, Anthony of Egypt, Anthony the Abbot, Anthony of the Desert, Anthony the Anchorite, and Anthony of Thebes. For his importance among the Desert Fathers and to all later Christian monasticism, he is also known as the Father of All Monks. His feast day is celebrated on January 17 among the Orthodox and Roman Catholic churches.

The biography of Anthony's life by Athanasius of Alexandria helped to spread the concept of Christian monasticism, particularly in Western Europe via its Latin translations. He is often erroneously considered the first Christian monk, but as his biography and other sources make clear, there were many ascetics before him. Anthony was, however, the first to go into the wilderness (about ad 270), which seems to have contributed to his renown. Accounts of Anthony enduring supernatural temptation during his sojourn in the Eastern Desert of Egypt inspired the often-repeated subject of the temptation of St. Anthony in Western art and literature.

Anthony is appealed to against infectious diseases, particularly skin diseases. In the past, many such afflictions, including ergotism, erysipelas, and shingles, were referred to as St. Anthony's fire.

NATIONAL PRAYER VIGIL FOR LIFE

The Prayer Vigil for Life begins January 17 at 5:30pm with the Solemn Opening Mass held in the Great Upper Church of the Basilica Shrine of the Immaculate Conception. Most Reverend Joseph F. Naumann, Archbishop of Kansas City in Kansas and Chairman of the USCCB's Committee on Pro-Life Activities, will be the principal celebrant and homilist.

After the Mass, the National Rosary for Life will be held in the Basilica's Crypt Church at 8 pm, followed by Night Prayer at 9 pm. Confession is available from 8:30pm to 10:30pm in the Basilica's Confessional Chapel.

The Vigil continues overnight in the Crypt Church beginning at 11 pm on January 17 with Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament and Holy Hours every hour on the hour through 6 am, followed by Morning Prayer, Benediction and Reposition of the Blessed Sacrament at 6:30am. The Vigil for Life closes with the Solemn Mass for Life celebrated on January 18 at 7:30am in the Great Upper Church.

No tickets are required for any of the National Prayer Vigil for Life events held at the Basilica. All are welcome to attend.


