"Thou art Peter, and upon this rock I will build My Church."

One of the earliest decisions for the restoration was to include this pronouncement, spoken by Jesus to Simon Peter nearly 2,000 years ago.

Following the curve of the sanctuary with the Latin words set in gold, the saying links the physical structure of St. Peter Church more definitively to its namesake. At the same time, it reminds us that His promise is as relevant to our times as it was back then.

The most important conversation in history took place at Caesarea Philippi, near the lush foothills of Mount Hermon. Located only 25 miles from the religious communities of Galilee, it would have been well-known to Jews as a place to avoid.

Just outside the city was a large cave with a natural spring, which fed into the Jordan River. In centuries past, when the area had been a center of Baal worship, the cave was likely the site of child sacrifice. Later, the Ancient Romans made it a principal shrine to Pan, the god of fertility.

To the pagan mind, the cave was considered a gateway to the underworld. Pan lived below during the winter, but could be enticed out every year through ritual acts of sexual depravity. People traveled there from all over the ancient world to participate, make offerings, and earn the god's favor.

It's no coincidence that Jesus brought the apostles to that particular area. Just as He spoke of Peter as His rock, He was using the cave as a metaphor. He was telling Peter (and us) that those same false gods would assume many forms in the future and could lead people to sin, but none would ever have the power to destroy what is eternal & true.

His great declaration to Peter serves to remind us that we shouldn't hide from evil, but stand up against it. Christ is the builder of His Church, but we're active participants in His work. If we stumble along the way, it's often because we decide that we're the ones doing the building, and end up getting confused.

Our Lord has already shown us the way. It's He who makes all things new, and like St. Peter, we only need to stay faithful, and follow Him.



Our Lady of Fatima Rosary Procession & Talk

Saturday, May 13th | 6:00 PM

The 13th of May marks the anniversary of the first of the apparitions of Our Lady of Fatima. In commemoration of this apparition, we invite all to join us next Saturday at 6:00 PM for a talk in the church, followed by a Rosary Procession in our Ladies honor.

The story begins in the village of Fatima, Portugal, on May 13, 1917. On that fateful day near that tiny village, The Blessed Virgin Mary, Mother of God, appeared to three young peasant children: Francisco, Jacinta, and Lucia.

In all, from May through October, Our Lady appeared and spoke to the children on the 13th day of each month, a total of 6 times.
