Why We Remember the Dead

November marks the end of the liturgical year, as well as the Month of the Holy Souls. For people in the northern hemisphere, the early twilight and bare trees create a stark backdrop, but it has a quiet, otherworldly quality as well. This is a time when we're asked to reflect more on the Four Last Things, and nature creates the appropriate mood.

During the month, we're also urged to pray for the souls in Purgatory. This is something we should always do, but especially at this time, when the year draws to a close. We pray not just for our loved ones but for strangers, even for those who died long ago.

The idea of intercessory prayer appears in both the Old and New Testaments. Such prayers can be found among ancient inscriptions left in catacombs by His followers. The dead are addressed directly: "Ursula, may you be received by Christ . . . Victoria, may your spirit be at rest . . . Kalemir, may God grant peace to your spirit and that of your sister, Hildare . . ."

Unfortunately, some Catholics today don't fully understand the importance of prayers like these. Consider how many funerals have become celebrations of life, rarely mentioning judgment or Purgatory, much less Hell. Tragically, the assumption that loved ones immediately enter Heaven means that prayers are rarely said for them.

Yet they need the prayers, and we know this deep down. Scripture tells us that nothing lacking grace can enter Heaven. The souls in Purgatory undergo a necessary suffering, which our prayers can help mitigate. They, in turn, can intercede for us. This is also important to remember, especially if one feels bereft after a loved one dies. The benefits of intercessory prayer extend to the living.

The dead can feel very close, in ways that are hard to define. Anyone who's gone through their day and felt the presence of a loved one knows it. Visit a cemetery in November, and you feel it another way. One reason a gravesite is so important is that it orients us to a proper relationship with the dead – not just honoring their mortal remains but remembering always to pray for their souls. We're reminded that our relationship didn't end with death; it just altered.

We pray for the Holy Souls, and they pray for us, now and always. We pray as a community, along with the angels and saints. Prayer weaves its way through the Church Militant, the Church Suffering, and the Church Triumphant as a unifying thread, holding us all together until the end of the world.

Mass of Remembrance

With November dedicated to the Faithful Departed who've gone before us, this year we are remembering in a special way the souls of all those unborn lives lost to miscarriage, stillbirth, medical crisis, abortion, or untimely death, with our Mass of Remembrance.

Friday, November 10th | 7:00 PM

Prior to the start of Mass, all those who have lost a child are invited to light a candle in remembrance, and place it in front of Mary's Altar.
