The St. Nicholas Window

Most people will recognize St. Nicholas of Myra on the next window – if not from his flowing red robes, then from the baskets of food he's distributing to the poor. The image of Nicholas is deeply ingrained in the Christian imagination and he's patron of many causes, including children. His legacy has also been conflated over time with imaginary figures: *Sinterklaas*, the Spirit of Christmas Present, Santa Claus. These distort the real man, along with the true meaning of the season, but they're nevertheless grounded in a certain historical reality.

That Nicholas existed is beyond dispute; his relics now lie in Bari, Italy. Recent forensic reconstruction, using digital imaging of the skull, reveals an elderly man with a kindly face and a badly broken nose – the latter an old injury that might have occurred during the persecutions of Diocletian. Portrayed with a white beard, the face does look remarkably like Santa's, but the nose gives a much better indication of his true character.

Born into a wealthy Christian family in Patara (now Turkey) around 270 A.D., Nicholas was probably orphaned in his teens. Christians then were barely tolerated by the Romans, but he could have lived comfortably enough, had he chosen to remain a merchant.

His temperament and deep faith led him elsewhere. The famous story of how he secretly threw bags of gold through a window to help three poor girls avoid prostitution actually comes from this early period of his life. It was an imaginative act of generosity that not only set the tone for his future, but laid the foundation for later fictional representations.

Nicholas entered the priesthood and eventually became Bishop of Myra. He was renowned for his affability and charity, as well as for being a fierce defender of the Church. During the worst Roman persecutions, he worked hard to protect his besieged flock. There are many stories about Nicholas helping people and rebuking authority, often in miraculous ways.

In one account, he brings three murdered children back to life. In another, he saves a ship by calming a storm. There's also plenty to suggest his combative side: it's said that during the Council of Nicaea in 325 A.D., Nicholas slapped an Arian heretic (possibly even Arius himself). But afterwards he would finally see Christianity safely established in his homeland.

It's easy to dismiss all these stories as exaggerations. Yet if one compares Nicholas to a saint like Padre Pio, they start to make sense. Both men were miracle workers who drew people to them. Both were warm and sympathetic, but no-nonsense in their attitude towards sin. If they capture the imagination, it's because God made them larger than life.

In an era when people, especially children, suffer unimaginably, St. Nicholas remains a powerful saint to call upon. His image shines into our church: champion of Christ, bringer of gifts, and protector of the most vulnerable.
