The Message of the Baptistry

Of the many renovations to St. Peter's over the last year, one of the most significant has been the opening up of the Baptistry. An iron gate now sets the area off from the rest of the narthex, allowing visitors to see the font and the stained-glass windows, which illustrate the revelation of the Sacrament of Baptism: St. John preaching repentance, then baptizing Christ in the River Jordan. Christ baptizing the Apostles. And finally St. Peter, baptizing the 3,000 souls.

The antique gate was discovered years ago and kept in storage until it could be installed. Its symbolism lies not only in its function but in the images on it, which all speak to the nature of Baptism. Most are commonly seen today – the dove, the sacred oils, the seashell. But a prominent thorn motif follows the arch as well.

Beyond the gate, the space houses an eight-sided stone font. Eight is an important number in Christian tradition, often tied to renewal. Eight people were saved through water during the Great Flood. Jewish boys were traditionally circumcised on the eighth day, as a sign of the Covenant. The restoration of the temple by Judas Maccabeus was celebrated by an eight-day feast. All these things prefigure Baptism, and this is reflected in the shape of the font.

It's curious to think, however, that the earliest known baptismal font (discovered in Syria) was shaped like a coffin. Several Church fathers, including Origen and St. Ambrose, referred to fonts as sepulchers. Even eight-sided fonts can resemble martyria – tombs erected over the bodies of those who died for Christ.

There's a tomb-like aspect to the Baptistry as a whole, and yet it's an empty tomb, as Christ's was empty on the eighth day following the Sabbath. The tomb becomes, through supernatural grace, a gateway to eternal life.

St. Augustine called the Baptistry "the womb of the Church," underscoring this paradoxical nature. Holy water washes away the stain of Original Sin, and with the death of the former person, one is reborn into the life of grace. The sacred oils represent salvation through Christ and membership in His divine body. The baptized person becomes infused with the Holy Spirit, symbolized by the dove.

Yet before entering eternity, all must undertake an earthly pilgrimage, and this is how the seashell and the thorns need to be understood. To walk with Christ means to enter into union with His suffering. Life can be a painful journey, but divine grace gives it beauty and meaning.

Coming to Mass represents this journey in compressed form. We dip our fingers in holy water, and then continue on towards the Sanctuary. This small act reminds us that our real lives began with Baptism, and while each pilgrim's way is unique, the compass always points towards Him.
