Introit: The Lord, walking by the sea of Galilee, saw two brothers, Peter and Andrew, and He called out to them: "Follow me, and I will make you fishers of men." The heavens declared the glory of God, and the firmament proclaims the work of His hands.

Offertory: The Lord's right hand has shown strength, the Lord's right hand has exalted me. I shall not die, but live; and I shall declare the works of the Lord.

Communion: "Follow me; I will make you fishers of men." Whereupon they, leaving their nets and their boat, followed the Lord.

The St. George Window

The figure of St. George saving the princess from a dragon, featured in the final window, has been a popular theme in art since the Middle Ages. Those unfamiliar with his story are often surprised to learn that he wasn't a 12th Century knight, but a Roman soldier serving under Diocletian. He was one of many who died for their faith in that era, but what was it about this particular saint that chivalric legends would grow around him?

Pope Gelasius I, who canonized George in 494, described him as one of those "whose names are justly reverenced among men, but whose actions are known only to God." He was likely born to Cappadocian Greek parents around 280 A.D. and grew up in Lydda (now part of Israel). He achieved the rank of Tribune in the Roman army, the equivalent of a captain. Beyond this, nothing's really known of his life. We get the true measure of the man from the facts of his death.

Early on in his reign, Diocletian focused on purging his army of Christians. Military losses were blamed on the anger of the gods, and Christan officers had to convert and make sacrifices of propitiation to them, or face execution. George refused, and his punishment was horrific and very public, to set an example.

A document in the Vatican archives, dated April 23, 303 A.D. and signed by a witness named Pascrates, describes how George met his end. He was tortured repeatedly, then dragged by horses to a square and beheaded. He must have displayed remarkable courage, given what followed.

It's said that hundreds of people were inspired to become Christians that day. Pilgrims came in droves to his death site, then took his story out into the world. In an age of senseless persecution and political opportunism, George stood for the Truth, embodied in his own person. Tyrants always create martyrs at their own peril, but Diocletian's decision to kill George backfired in truly spectacular fashion.

Devotion to St. George grew rapidly, spreading well beyond the Middle East. It eventually reached its apotheosis during the Middle Ages, when crusaders claimed him as a warrior-saint whose convictions mirrored their own. Richard the Lionheart prayed at his tomb in the Holy Land. Battle cries invoked his name, along with St. Michael's. The story of the dragon was popularized around this time in The Golden Legend, a compendium of saints' lives, with the killing of the dragon taken as a symbol for the defeat of Islam.

For centuries, St. George has remained the patron saint of soldiers, knights, Scouts, and other individuals whose service is tied to honor and personal sacrifice. He represents the true meaning of virility – the willingness to take a stand against evil, no matter the cost. This is the stuff of real heroes, and the secret of his universal appeal.
