Finding Light in the Dark of Winter

In the Northern Hemisphere, the darkest days of year provide a setting for one of the Church's most luminous feast days, Candlemas. Also known as the Presentation of Our Lord, or the Purification of Our Lady, it marks the end of Christmas in the liturgical calendar.

Luke's Gospel describes how all the prophecies and signs heralding the Nativity culminate in Mary bringing Jesus to the temple after 40 days, in accordance with Mosaic Law. There, two holy people, Simeon and Anna, identify the infant as the longed-for Savior. Simeon also tells Mary, in a foreshadowing of the Passion, that a sword shall pierce her heart.

The Church has always recognized this moment's importance, even if formal celebrations came slowly. Candlelit processions likely grew out of pagan Rome, which had used them to purify the city after riotous carnivals. For the pagans, the processions eventually became an encounter with the Light of Christ, and a journey out of sin.

This idea of encounter between Christ and His Church remains a key aspect of Candlemas. As its name suggests, the candles themselves have taken on new meaning over time. When we light tapers during the solemn Mass, as we did at Christmas, we're reminded again of the Incarnation. The wax represents Christ's body, the wick His soul, and the flame His divinity. The Blessing of Candles, a custom dating from the 11th Century, allows us to bring this special light into our homes.

Traditionally, blessed candles are made of beeswax – no small detail, but something that links Candlemas to the natural world and the entire liturgical year. Religious orders have raised honeybees for centuries, carefully tending the hives over the summer, then harvesting in the fall. The wax candles they fashion are used in churches and homes, and the honey eaten.

Bees and monks share similar virtues of hard work and self-sacrifice, as the prayers of the Easter vigil allude to: "On this, your night of grace, O holy Father, accept this candle, a solemn offering, the work of bees and your servants' hands." But the connections go even further.

Honeybees, with their virginal nature, are also a symbol of Our Lady; their creation of wax suggests how she gave Christ His fleshly aspect. Honey, in turn, represents religious eloquence (beehives adorn the emblems of St. Ambrose and St. Bernard of Clairvaux, two doctors of the Church). In this way, all of God's creation is woven into the life of the Church.

Candlemas comes at a time when people can feel exhausted by winter, but it's meant to give hope. It celebrates Christ, the light revealed to the nations, and the glowing candles remind us that He is always there, even in the worst of times.

Candlemas

Join us this coming Friday, February 2nd, as we close the Christmas Season with the feast of Candlemas. Candlemas, gets it's name from the candle blessing commemorating the Light of the World coming into the Temple.
