The First Station – Jesus is Condemned to Death

The Way of the Cross was Christ's true mission on earth. We can't celebrate His words and miracles, or the triumph of the Resurrection, while avoiding the arduous journey to Golgotha. Meditating on the Stations of the Cross takes us deeply into the mystery of God, and what He really asks of us.

We see many things during Christ's trial. The High Priest, Caiaphas, tearing open his robes. Peter's denial, made out of fear. The Jews and soldiers hurling insults. Pilate, baffled by Jesus, saying, "I wash my hands of this man's death."

The images reek of pride, greed, betrayal, cowardice. Jesus stands alone, seemingly defeated, while the mob's fury swirls around Him. It's a scene that could take place anywhere in the world, with slight variations, because human nature hasn't really changed much.

Christ was condemned nearly 2,000 years ago because He called people to look beyond the world and seek what's above. Many still reject that message. Yet God's mystery was at work then, and still is today.

Consider the moment at the trial when Pilate offered the choice between freeing Jesus or Barabbas, and the mob chose the latter. Scholars have noted that the name "Barabbas" means, in Aramaic, "the son of the father."

"Give us Barabbas!" the mob shouted. "Give us the Son of the Father!"

God hears the cries of His lost children, even in the worst moments, and gives them exactly what they need.

The Second Station – Jesus Carries His Cross

There's no better symbol of the depravity of sin than the cross, which Jesus willingly took upon Himself. Made of rough wood, it was a suitable tool for the worst death that Rome could offer. Crucifixion was meant to be humiliating (even Cicero called it "the most cruel and disgusting penalty"), and that started with carrying your own cross, or patibulum, to the execution site.

Christ's embrace of the cross would have seemed as contradictory as His refusal to defend Himself at the trial. But Scripture helps us understand His purpose.

The Book of Revelation refers to Christ's cross as a "tree," although here it seems a dead tree. It stands in contrast to the Tree of Life, with its three branches, that we see in the church's Annunciation mural. This was lost to us after the Fall, but Christ restores it through His Passion and Resurrection. That's why the crucifix is not a symbol of death, but life – Christ Himself becomes the Tree.

God asks us to take up our own crosses, which can be heavy – not just because our lives on earth are difficult, but because we burden ourselves with sin. Salvation comes only through our willingness to follow Christ. Through Him, we learn over time what to let go, and what can be transformed through grace.
