Propers for Sunday

10:00 AM

Introit: When He calls on me, I will answer Him; I will deliver Him and give Him glory, I will grant Him length of days. He who abides in the shelter of the Most High, shall remain under the protection of the God of Heaven.

Gradual: To His Angels He has give a commandment concerning you, to keep you in all your ways. On their hands they will bear you up, lest you dash your foot against a stone.

Tract: He who abides in the shelter of the Most High, shall remain under the protection of the Lord of Heaven. He shall say to the Lord: "You are my protector and my refuge;" my God, in whom I trust. For He has set me free from the snare of the fowler, and from cutting words. He will conceal you with His pinions, and under His wings you will find refuge. His faithfulness will shield you as with a buckler, you will not suffer the terrors of the night: You shall fear neither the arrow that flies by day, nor the conspiracy that stalks in the darkness, nor destruction, nor the demon of noonday. A thousand will fall at your side, and ten thousand at your right, but you shall remain unharmed. For to His Angels He has given a commandment concerning you, to keep you in all your ways. In their hands they will bear you up, lest you dash your foot against a stone. On the asp and the basilisk you will tread and trample the lion and the dragon. Because he has put his hope in Me I will deliver him; I will protect him, because he knows My Name. He shall call out to Me, and I shall answer him; I am with him in tribulation. I will rescue him and honour him; with long days will I satisfy him; and I shall let him see my saving power.

Offertory: Blessed are You, O Lord, teach me Your commandments. O Lord, You are blessed, teach me Your commandments. With my lips have I declared all the judgements spoken by Your mouth.

Communion: They ate and had their fill, and what they craved the Lord gave them; they were not disappointed in what they craved.

The Third Station – Jesus Falls the First Time

Why did the crowd turn against Jesus, despite the fact that they'd honored Him like a king only days before? As Isaiah 53 foretold, they "esteemed Him stricken, smitten by God, and afflicted."

The passage reminds us that Ancient Jews often regarded physical affliction as God-given. This could be seen in their treatment of lepers, who were said to wear their sins on their own disfigured faces. A similar attitude informed the crowd's treatment of Jesus, as he dragged His cross through the streets. God must be punishing Him – how else could they rationalize this horror?

Beyond that, however, was the question of pride. No one likes to feel that they've made a mistake, and it's easier to find a scapegoat. Jesus must be what the authorities said He was: a charlatan, a liar, a fool.

It's telling that when Jesus cured the sick and diseased, He would admonish them to go to the priests. The Sanhedrin should have been the ones to discern that Jesus offered another way of knowing God; they might have helped their people grow in holiness. But pride prevented them.

So the crowd jeered and the cross bore down, until Jesus fell for the first time. In the words of the poet Paul Claudel, "sin hurled its evil weight," like an attack. Claudel likened this fall to our initial, small sins that we think don't matter much.

Yet God feels their cumulative impact. They are the slights and insults that we, in our pride, still use to wound Him.

The Fourth Station – Jesus Meets His Afflicted Mother

Set against this hostile backdrop was the figure of Mary, following Jesus. Her heart was pierced with agony at what He was experiencing, exactly as Simeon foretold. And although she understood that everything was unfolding through God's will, it didn't lessen her maternal desire to help Jesus somehow.

Scripture doesn't record the exact moment when they met, but there's no doubt that Jesus recognized Mary's constant presence. His Passion was met with her compassion, giving Him the solace to carry on.

Tradition has Mary daily retracing her Son's journey, and praying at significant sites along the way, long after His crucifixion. Anyone who's lost a child will understand this desire to remember intensely, but Mary's act had particular consequences. Her route would eventually become Jerusalem's Via Dolorosa. When she moved later to Ephesus, it's said that she recreated the route in the hills behind her house. (Archaeologists would find strong evidence of this in the 19th Century.)

When we pray the Stations, we follow Mary's example by suffering with Christ. The Stations can be especially powerful for helping someone, especially a child, who's lost to sin or estranged. In compassion we can pray for them, trusting in God, just as Mary did.

Observing the Ember Days

Ember Days are ancient days of fasting and penance which would take place on a Wednesday, Friday, and Saturday, at the beginning of each season. The 1st record of them is attributed to Pope St. Callistus in 222 AD. These 3-days at the beginning of Lent are an opportunity to start out our Lenten observances on the right foot.

We ask you to join us in observing the Lenten Ember days this week on February 21st, 23rd, and 24th, with fasting and abstinence. Also, please consider joining us for Mass or the Divine Office on these days as well.
