The Fifth Station – Simon Helps Jesus Carry the Cross

During the Passion, other people stood watching, not mocking Jesus but moved to pity. Two individuals stand out, each representing different aspects of charity.

The Fifth Station shows Simon of Cyrene, who helped Jesus carry the cross. (He's named in three of the Gospels, suggesting that the Apostles came to know him.) Cyrene was a Greek city in North Africa with a large population of Jews, and Simon may have been visiting Jerusalem for Passover when the Roman soldiers pulled him out of the crowd. His was not a voluntary act; the Gospels tell us that Simon was "compelled," "seized" into service. From his perspective, this would have been terrifying. The Romans were capricious, and he likely feared worse. Yet he couldn't refuse.

Simon seems to have been chosen early on, which means that he would have witnessed much – Mary's meeting with Jesus, the beatings and falls, Veronica. He would have felt Christ's blood and sweat on his own skin. No life can experience all that, and not be changed forever.

His service to Christ is like so much in our own lives – the sudden reversals of fortune, the demands of work and family, the abandoned dreams, that can feel like punishment but are really part of God's plan. We won't fully understand our role until the end of time, but these crosses appear for a reason.

We accept them because God calls us to do so. By serving others at such times, we act for Christ, and this in turn leads us to new life.

The Sixth Station – Veronica Wipes the Face of Jesus

The name Veronica translates as "true image." This probably wasn't the real name of the woman who wiped the face of Jesus with her veil, but the miraculous image that appeared on it was known for centuries as "the veronica," and this became her identifier.

What's known from early sources is that she slipped through the crowd and past the Roman soldiers to kneel in front of Christ, which took some nerve. Her spontaneous act of charity was different from Simon's in that she chose it. Still, it's worth noting that pity – not pride or anger – motivated her. She removed an item of clothing associated with her social rank and dignity, and used it to ease suffering.

There are many things that can be drawn from this, but the fact that the Holy Face appeared on her veil underscores the idea that acts of charity, done in humility, become an image of Christ Himself. Or, as St. Teresa of Avila would write centuries later, "Christ has no body but yours. No hands, no feet on earth but yours."

Charity is the highest virtue because it's the source of all others. What matters is not how the moments come, but how we respond: out of love for the One who gave all for us.
