Living In the World

Much has been written lately about the contentious state of everyday society, which has people everywhere retreating into ideological camps. It reflects what Catholic philosopher Charles Taylor calls the "disenchanted world," where universal belief in God fractures, and faith becomes just another choice in a hotly contested space.

It's strange to consider how the Catholic faith once built Western Culture, and now it's decidedly counter-cultural. Catholics can also retreat into a camp, probably more than we should, but the pressure to conform to secular values is constant and intense. It wears us down, as we grapple with how to be "in the world, but not of it" in a practical sense. We take steps to educate our children and build community. We pay attention to politics and try to be good citizens.

Nevertheless, sometimes life gets to us. There can be a siren call to retreat even further – psychologically, spiritually, physically – into a place where the outside forces can't come. This can take the form of movements, like the so-called Benedict Option, or it can be social isolation, where we just don't go out much. At worst, it makes us believe that this world, ultimately, doesn't matter. Even devout Catholics may experience an overwhelming desire for Heaven that isn't really healthy, but a kind of creeping despair.

When we feel this uncertain, it helps to remember why Christ came into this world. His purpose was to transform it, and He wants us to continue that work, both as individuals and together, as His Church on earth. This means we have to resist the urge to retreat. Rather, we need to order our hearts and minds towards God, and think of our lives — with whatever our natural gifts and inclinations — as the raw material He works with. Ours is a collective work, in which each person makes a unique contribution, however small. This is true whether we're young or old, male or female.

How different life can feel when we tell God: I'm with You, no matter what the future brings. We're able to let go of a great deal, including our fear of the world. We worry less about failing or being canceled. When we join our hearts to His, our abilities develop as they're meant to, for they are aligned with virtue and strengthened by His grace. God has a way of helping each of us accomplish great things for His Kingdom, although we may not always see how He's doing it.

If the Catholic Church has shown us anything over the centuries, it's that God often makes use of His faithful precisely when all feels lost, for that's when people in the wider world are searching for truth and beauty. This is why we must *be* His Church, especially now. We must be the light that draws lost souls home.
