A Reflection on Today's Gospel (Mk 1: 29-39)

During this year 2024 we are reading from the shortest of the Gospels, but by no means is it short on messages for us to dissect and digest. Mark is a great Gospel to read from beginning to end. It doesn't take that long, and we get a very down to earth picture of Jesus and his apostles.

Today we are still reading form the first chapter of Mark. Two Sundays ago, we read form Mark 1: 14-20 in which we read Jesus' direct description of his mission. He proclaims, "This is the time of fulfillment. The kingdom is at hand. Repent, and believe in the Gospel." Last Sunday we read again from Mark chapter 1. In Vs.21-28 we are told that Jesus confronts evil. Jesus is goodness in the flesh. He is all about doing battle with evil and thus overcoming Satan's rule in the world. By overcoming evil, he establishes the reign of God. riding the world of evil driving out the power of the devil and establishing the reign of God. Today, again we read from Mark chapter one. We read verses 29-39. In these verses we are given a beautiful summary of the work of the Church. We need to recall that the Church is the continuation of Christ in history. The Church is the Body of Christ; therefore, it continues the mission of Christ. His work is the work of the Church.

In this reading we find that Jesus prayed, "He left and went off to a deserted place, where he prayed." One of the primaries works of the Church is to pray. That is critical and crucial for the life of the Church and therefore the life of every Christian. That is the heart of the work of the Church. Why do we pray? We pray because Jesus prayed, as he prayed so must we pray. We are to be imitators of Him. The greatest of the prayers that we do is of course Holy Mass, however that cannot and must not be the totality of our prayer life. Religion is not just for Sunday. It is for everyday and besides without daily prayer soon our Sunday worship will have little meaning.

We read as well that Jesus cured the sick and cast out demons. He was a servant to all those in need. So, the Church must reach out to the poor, not only the financially poor, but the poor in all their dimensions, the sick, the spiritually poor, the alienated, the abused, the depressed, the terminally ill, etc. We are to love as Jesus loved without boundaries. We as Christians bring with us Jesus who was always reaching out in love and faith to those in need. We can have no more powerful example in our time of how we do that than Saint Mother Theresa of Calcutta. She prayed and then went out to serve.

And finally, we read that Jesus went out to preach. Jesus was the Incarnate Word of God, that is the Word of God in the flesh. The word has power. So, he never tired of teaching and preaching, that indeed one could argue took up the main part of his time. He constantly evangelized. So that is our task as well. We are to speak about Jesus, not just as someone who lived 2,000 years ago but someone who lives in our hearts and indeed is our friend.

So, here we have it in this passage, the Church which is the Body of Christ, is about prayer, evangelizing and serving. So that must be our work and mission as followers of Jesus.

Here is why wherever we have the Church we have the building of Churches in which the community gathers to pray, and we have the building of schools where we evangelize and preach, and we build hospitals where we serve the poor and heal.

May we never tire of doing good in imitation of Jesus. Praised be Jesus Christ now and forever, Msgr. Eugene Lozinski
