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
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
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


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WITH THE HELP OF SAINT CECILIA PASTORAL REFLECTIONS

This week's guest column is taken from a 2011 reflection on parable of the sower by Pope Benedict XVI.

Dear brothers and sisters,

The Gospel parables are brief accounts that Jesus uses to proclaim the mysteries of the Kingdom of Heaven. Using imagery from situations of daily life, the Lord "wants to show us the real ground of all things. He shows us the God who acts, who intervenes in our lives, and wants to take us by the hand.

The subject of this Sunday's Gospel is, precisely, the Kingdom of Heaven. "Heaven" should not be understood only in the sense that it towers above us, because this infinite space also takes the form of human interiority. Jesus compares the Kingdom of Heaven to a field of wheat to enable us to understand that something small and hidden has been sown within us which, nevertheless, has an irrepressible vital force. In spite of all obstacles, the seed will develop and the fruit will ripen. This fruit will only be good if the terrain of life is cultivated in accordance with the divine will.

For this reason in the Parable of the Weeds [tares] among the good Wheat (Mt 13:24-30). Jesus warns us that, after the owner had scattered the seed, "while men were sleeping, his enemy" intervened and sowed weeds among the wheat. This means that we must be ready to preserve the grace received from the day of our Baptism, continuing to nourish faith in the Lord that prevents evil from taking root. St Augustine commenting on the parable noted "many are at first tares but then become good grain", and he added: "if these, when they are wicked, are not endured with patience they would not attain their praiseworthy transformation"

Hence if we are children of such a great and good Father, let us seek to be like him! This was the aim Jesus set himself with his preaching; indeed, he said to those who were listening to him: "You... must be perfect, as your heavenly Father is perfect" (Mt 5:48). Let us turn with trust to Mary, whom we invoked yesterday with the title of Our Lady of Mount Carmel so that she may help us to follow Jesus faithfully, and so live as true children of God.

"The seed sown among thorns is the one who hears the word but then the cares of the world and the lure of riches choke the word and it bears no fruit." (Matthew 13:22)

Gratitude and generosity are virtues that we should strive to do on a daily basis. Every decision we make either takes us one step closer to God or one step further away. HOW WE RECEIVE HOLY COMMUNION



The reception of Holy Communion is one of the most intimate moments in the life of every Catholic. The great mystic and Doctor of the Church, Saint Therese of Lisieux, writes eloquently of the first time she ever received Holy Communion:

I knew that I was loved and said, "I love You, and I give myself to You forever." Jesus asked for nothing, He claimed no sacrifice. Long before that, He and little Therese had seen and understood one another well, but on that day it was more than a meeting-it was a complete fusion. We were no longer two, for Therese had disappeared like a drop of water lost in the mighty ocean. Jesus alone remained-the Master and the King.

While every reception of Holy Communion cannot be expected to meet the spiritual and emotional heights of Saint Therese, her experience reinforces the importance of preparing our hearts to receive Christ in the Most Blessed Sacrament. We do this just before receiving Holy Communion by praying fervently on the most holy mystery we are about to receive. But even before we come to church, we confess our sins and receive absolution in the Sacrament of Penance, especially if we are aware of any serious sins. For at least an hour, we fast from eating anything at all.

When we go to receive Holy Communion, we never go alone. The Communion Procession is one of the three great processions of the Mass. The first is the Entrance Procession, where we come to recognize that we are a royal priesthood gathered by Christ our High Priest. The second is the Presentation of the Gifts, where we join our lives to the Sacrifice about to be offered by the Priest. Now, singing a Eucharistic hymn, we come forward as Christ's own people to be fed by him with his own Body and Blood.

As you approach the minister to receive the consecrated bread, bow your head as a sign of veneration of the consecrated bread. The minister will hold the consecrated host before you and say, "The Body of Christ," to which you respond, "Amen."

From the first days of the Church, Christians have spoken this "Amen" with conviction and faith. It is, in the first place, an affirmation of Christ's presence in the Blessed Sacrament, whereby, in the words of Saint Ambrose, "you acknowledge in your heart that you are receiving the Body of Christ."

But it is also an acceptance of the consequences of eating his Body and drinking his Blood, as Saint Augustine reminds the fourth-century residents of Hippo:

If you are the body and members of Christ, then what is laid on the Lord's table is the sacrament (*mysterium*) of what you yourselves are, and it is the sacrament of what you are that you receive. It is to what you yourselves are that you answer *Amen*, and this answer is your affidavit. Be a member of Christ's body, so that your *Amen* may be authentic.

You may receive the consecrated host either on the tongue or in the hand, at your discretion. For many centuries Christians have received Holy Communion on the tongue as a sign of reverence for this awesome mystery. In the earliest days of the Church, and in our own time, Christians typically received the consecrated host in their hands and then reverently eat it. Saint Cyril taught the newly baptized of fourth-century Jerusalem how to receive Holy Communion in the hand in a passage still used by the Church today:

When you approach, do not extend your hands with palm upward and fingers apart, but make your left hand a throne for your right hand, the latter is to receive the King; then, while answering "Amen," receive the body of Christ in the hollow of your hand.

Next ... take it in your mouth, being watchful that nothing of it is lost. If you were to lose part of it, it would be like losing one of your own members. If someone were to give you some flakes of gold, would you not guard them very carefully and see to it that you did not lose any and suffer a loss? Should you not therefore watch far more carefully over an object more valuable than gold or precious stones, lest you lose a crumb of it? Then, after receiving the body of Christ, approach his blood

As they receive Holy Communion, a Communion chant or song is sung, by which the faithful praise God in one voice as they process together to receive their Eucharistic Lord. The Communion song is a processional song, ideally sung by all who approach the altar to receive Holy Communion. After receiving Holy Communion all pray quietly or sing a psalm or hymn together.

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
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
