

Office of Concern Needs Diapers

The Office of Concern at St. Cecilia Church has an urgent request for Size 3, 4, 5 and 6 diapers and baby wipes. Our vendor is unable to sell diapers to us in the quantities we need to continue to serve our clients.

A persistent request from our clients is whether they can receive more diapers.

Diapers are not covered under any Federal or State program and cannot be bought with food stamps. Diapers can cost a family about \$80 per month per child.

All of Catholic Charities' shelters and residences are open and full.

Shelter directors are communicating clearly with all residents about protocols and the measures in place to protect them and the staff from spreading the virus. Social distancing is strongly encouraged and enforced.

Theology Roundtable Postponed

Chronicle of a Death Foretold by Gabriel García Márquez tells the story of the murder of Santiago Nasar by the Vicario twins. The novella was based on real-life events that occurred to García Márquez's godbrother. García Márquez heard the story of a young couple that got married in Sucre and, on the day following their wedding, the groom rejected the bride due to her lack of virginity. Investigation determined that the bride had relations with her former boyfriend, who was consequently pursued and murdered by the bride's two brothers in order to avenge the family's honor.

The book explores the morality of the village's collective responsibility in the murder of Santiago Nasar. Is anyone besides the two brothers responsible for Nasar's death? Is anyone guilty? If so, how?

A Message from the Pastor



Dear Friends,

Father Danny and I continue to celebrate Mass each morning and offer the Mass for each intention of the day. While we are in quarantine and the doors are closed, the parish is indeed very much alive!!! We continue to offer spiritual guidance via video and phone, and to network with each staff member in their individual ministries, although in a much more limited way. Father Danny and I miss you so much and can't wait to begin public celebrations of the Eucharist again.

One of our largest projects after we re-open will be funeral celebrations. Please remember that the first Mass celebrated for a dearly departed after death is a funeral Mass, NOT a memorial Mass! We have heard from parishioners that some of our members have passed away, but to date we haven't received many calls from families or funeral directors. We want to know to pray with you and mention their names during the Sunday Mass.

1. While we are not permitted to preside over wake services or funeral Masses at the moment, we can preside over cemetery services, as long as the number of attendees is under 10. That number may change soon, I suspect, to allow more attendees.
2. We will be offering families two choices to celebrate the funeral Masses of their loved ones: (a) a communal celebration honoring all the dearly departed of our parish, or (b) individual funeral Masses for larger celebrations if families choose.
3. Please start to collect photos and make memory boards for your loved ones, which we can place in the narthex on the day of funeral Mass.

The dates for our First Communion, Confirmation, and full Initiation are all on hold. But for now, I've asked those families to consider making a video a few seconds in length of your family member in their First Communion or Confirmation outfits, which Father Danny will consolidate and make available for the whole congregation to see and celebrate.

We have exceeded our Go Fund Me amount of \$9,000. The original intention is for that Go Fund Me goal to be a weekly goal to help the parishes sustain themselves during this time. But for now, I want to commend you for being so generous with your contributions!!! While we are not the same as we were before the virus, with you generously mailing in or dropping off your envelopes, we are much better than I or many others expected. Thank you so much!

Many people are calling, asking to be informed of goings-on in the parish. While the bulletin is not in print, it is on our website. I suggest you check the parish website every few days and click on the bulletin link to become and stay informed.

We are in the process of updating our parish website! I'm very excited about this. We are looking for pictures of the parish in action! Good-quality, high-definition pictures! You can email the pictures to me and I'll get them to our web person to see if they are compatible and user friendly. Looking for group pictures of Masses and parish events. ALSO, I'm hoping someone can donate some drone footage to be incorporated into a video for our website.

Queridos amigos

P. Danny y yo continuamos celebrando la eucaristía todas las mañanas y la ofrecemos por cada intención del día. ¡Aunque estamos en cuarentena y las puertas están cerradas, la parroquia está realmente viva! Continuamos ofreciendo orientación espiritual por video, teléfono y las redes sociales con cada miembro del personal en sus ministerios individuales, aunque de una manera mucho más limitada. El P. Danny y yo los extrañamos mucho y no vemos la hora de comenzar de nuevo las celebraciones públicas de la eucaristía.

Uno de nuestros proyectos más grandes después de la reapertura serán las celebraciones fúnebres. ¡Recuerda que la primera misa celebrada por un difunto después de la muerte es una misa de funeral, NO una misa conmemorativa! Hemos escuchado de feligreses que algunos de nuestros miembros han fallecido, pero hasta la fecha no hemos recibido muchas llamadas de familiares o directores de funerarias. Queremos saber quiénes son para poder orar con ustedes y mencionar sus nombres durante la misa del domingo.

1. Si bien no se nos permite presidir los servicios de velación o misas funerarias en este momento, podemos presidir los servicios del cementerio, siempre y cuando el número de asistentes sea menor de 10. Creo que ese número puede cambiar pronto.
2. Les ofreceremos a las familias dos opciones para celebrar las misas funerarias de sus seres queridos; a- una celebración comunitaria en honor a todos los queridos difuntos de nuestra parroquia y b- misas funerarias individuales para celebraciones más grandes si las familias lo eligen.
3. Por favor, comience a recolectar fotos y carteles de memoria de sus seres queridos que podamos colocar en el nártex el día de la misa del funeral.

las fechas para nuestras primeras comuniones, confirmación e iniciación completa están todas en espera. Pero por ahora les he pedido a las familias que consideren hacer un video de unos segundos en sus trajes de primera comunión y de confirmación que el Padre Danny consolidará y pondrá a disposición de todo el mundo para ver y celebrar.

Five Reasons We Turn to Mary in Times of Crisis

Earlier this year when the devastating effects of the COVID-19 pandemic became clear, and thousands—then millions—of people throughout the world were effected by physical, spiritual, economic and psychological hardships, including severe sickness and death, I began to implore the Blessed Virgin Mary, Health of the Sick, on a daily basis for her intercession and help. Throughout the ages, Christians have turned to Mary in times of war, pestilence and famine. In troubled times like these, she is a sure refuge, a source of comfort and hope.



My religious order, the Congregation of the Most Holy Redeemer (Redemptorists) maintains a particular devotion to Mary under the title *Mater de Perpetuo Succursu* (Mother of Perpetual Help). As guardians of the 15th century Byzantine icon that bears this holy name, for more than 150 years my community has promoted devotion to Our Lady of Perpetual Help as a means of helping people in all regions of the world draw closer to Mary, the Mother of God and our mother.

Pope Francis has frequently said that his favorite image for the Church is her motherhood. “The Church is feminine,” Pope Francis says. “She is a mother.” Of course, Mary is the model, the inspiration for the Church’s motherhood and for all that is holy, compassionate and loving in the Church’s life and ministry. When Mary’s influence is missing or weak, the Church no longer acts as a loving mother.

That’s why we should turn to Mary in both good times and troubled times. As Mother of Perpetual Help, she is always ready to assist us, always there for us, constantly prepared to seek her Son’s guidance and support for all her children. Especially in times of grave danger, such as the current pandemic, Mary offers hope, healing and comfort to all who are in need of her maternal care.

As I reflect on our current crisis, and the serious challenges it presents to individuals, families, communities and nations in all regions of the world, I see five major reasons (among many more) why we should turn to Mary our mother for her intercession and help.

Here are my five reasons.

1. People are sick and dying. Throughout the Church's history, Christians have sought Mary's intercession in times of serious illness including pestilence and plagues. As a loving mother, Mary always responds with comfort and the healing grace of her Son.

Most Holy Mother, Health of the Sick, please stay close to all who are suffering from the effects of this deadly virus. Comfort those who mourn the loss of loved ones. Encourage caregivers, first responders and all who provide essential services often at great risk to themselves.

2. People are frightened, lonely and depressed. Mary's loving presence offers courage and hope during frightening times, especially when we are isolated from family and friends. She reassures us and reminds us that we are never alone, never without the consolation and hope won for us by her Son's suffering, death and resurrection to new life.

Mother of Holy Hope, inspire us by your perseverance and courage. Help us see that we are not going through this time of trial alone. Show us the way to Jesus, and help us to accept your loving presence as a sure sign that even in this time of social distancing, your Son holds us in his loving embrace and says to each one of us: "Be not afraid!"

3. People are out of work or afraid they will lose their jobs. Mary is alternately invoked as Our Lady of Abundance and as Mother of the Poor. She stands with us when the economy is growing and when there is widespread poverty and unemployment. She reminds us to be good stewards of all God's gifts and to share generously with others, especially the poor.

Our Lady of Guadalupe, patroness of all the Americas, you know the riches and the poverty of the lands we share with all our sisters and brothers here. Teach us to be grateful and generous stewards. Intercede for all who are poor. Reassure all who are frightened. Help us to help each other so that no one has to go without his or her share of God's abundance.

4. People are longing for the sacraments, especially the Eucharist. Mary shows us the way to her Son. She is a sacrament of God's presence in the world, the Gateway to Grace and a model for the Church's prayer and worship. Deprived of access to the sacraments, and to liturgy *cum populo* (with our sisters and brothers), we understandably turn to Mary in the Rosary and other devotional prayers to help fill the spiritual gaps that exist in our lives.

Mary, Mother of the Church, pray for us. Teach us to seek and find your Son, Jesus, in the prayer and worship of the Church, in the sacraments and in intercessory prayers to you and all the saints. Queen of the Most Holy Rosary, help us to be patient and understanding until the day we can safely reopen our churches and once again make the sacraments available to all.

5. People need wise, prudent and compassionate leadership—now more than ever. Mary is the Mother of the Good Shepherd. His teaching and example powerfully illustrate the meaning and vital importance of servant leadership. We implore the Mother of our Lord to help all our leaders in society and in the Church set aside their personal and political agendas so that they can place the needs of others first and foremost.

Mother of Justice and of Mercy, pray for all who are leaders. Inspire us by your obedience to God's will and your readiness to sacrifice your own needs and desires for the good of all. Open our minds and hearts to the selfless witness given to us by your Son so that we can lead our people with humility, wisdom and courage.

In conclusion, I would like to once again make my own Pope Francis's prayer to Our Lady, Health of the Sick, which uses the words of an ancient prayer, *Sub tuum praesidium*, actually the oldest hymn to Mary, the Mother of God, to implore her protection during the coronavirus epidemic:

O Mary, you shine continuously on our journey as a sign of salvation and hope. We entrust ourselves to you, Health of the Sick. At the foot of the Cross you participated in Jesus' pain, with steadfast faith. You know what we need. We are certain that you will provide, so that, as you did at Cana of Galilee, joy and feasting might return after this moment of trial. Help us, Mother of Divine Love, to conform ourselves to the Father's will and to do what Jesus tells us: He who took our sufferings upon Himself, and bore our sorrows to bring us, through the Cross, to the joy of the Resurrection. Amen.

We seek refuge under your protection, O Holy Mother of God. Do not despise our pleas – we who are put to the test – and deliver us from every danger, O glorious and blessed Virgin. Amen.
