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
A Message from Archbishop Michael Mulhall

The pandemic, which first had an impact upon our lives in early 2020, is still with us as we welcome the release of this edition of Journey. The past 16 months have challenged, in so many ways, our society and the parishes of our Archdiocese. Even in the midst of the restrictions placed upon us, I am deeply thankful for the care and perseverance shown by our many faithful parishioners and clergy. When we finally move beyond the pandemic, it will be good for us to reflect upon the ups and downs of these past months, but it may be premature to do so at this stage. Willing Hearts and Many Hands Achieve Fundraising Goal

Nine years ago, in July of 2012, St. Mary of the Immaculate Conception parishioner, Dominica Bracciodieta, had a conversation with the newly assigned Rector, Fr Shawn Hughes, about the condition of the carpet in the sanctuary. With many competing needs for maintenance and upgrading in the 164 year old cathedral, there were no funds to replace the carpet much less consider a more permanent improvement in flooring. For Dominica, the solution was simply to begin to raise money for the beautification of the sanctuary floor. Over the past eight years, Dominica, members of the Italian Ladies Association and other volunteers within the parish have hosted Italian dinners, Easter bread sales and fall bake tables with all proceeds going to the fund to replace the flooring in the sanctuary of the Cathedral. Tickets to the first Italian dinner sold for \$25 each. Prices increased incrementally over time with sell out crowds of 240 guests paying \$50 each in 2019 to enjoy the feast. Dozens of volunteers offered their time and gifts to purchase supplies, cook, decorate, serve and clean up for each event. "No one ever said NO to helping - people were amazing" commented Dominica. The last, pre-pandemic dinner event raised \$11,300! When asked, "how do you do it?" Dominica replied, "it's the power of the Lord who gives you strength and courage and health to do it. Without Him, we can do nothing".

This fall, Fr. Shawn informed Dominica that the fundraising goal for a new floor for the sanctuary had been achieved. "You can see through Dominica and so many others in the parish the work of the Holy Spirit", stated Fr. Shawn. The inspiration to begin to raise funds led to a ripple effect of willing hearts and hands to contribute to the same goal including St. Mary's parish Knights of Columbus and private donors. The new floor will be an expression of praise and love of God from countless volunteers and benefactors who rejoice in coming to the Eucharistic banquet at the table of our Lord.



St. Francis Xavier Parish, Brockville Shares the Joy of Christmas

For 48 years the parish of St. Francis Xavier has hosted an annual community Christmas dinner so that everyone could experience the joy of Christmas Day regardless of their circumstances. Preparations for this community event typically begin in September and have been coordinated by Dana Wren and family for the past 7 years. Numbers of dinner guests fluctuate from 130 to 150 annually and the event is so well supported within the parish community that there are often an equal number of volunteers offering their services. In the past, guests who registered to attend the dinner were transported to and from the venue by Howard Bus Line, free of charge. Caroling, Christmas gifts and dinner music were part of the joyful experience of being together as a community, all provided through the generosity of parishioners.



The pandemic made gathering for Christmas dinner within a community setting impossible last year so the team of volunteers at St. Francis Xavier worked with local health unit authorities to devise a plan to deliver Christmas dinner to the homes of those who registered. Building on their experience last year, the team of volunteers led by Dana and her family are determined to once again, show their love for their neighbours by taking Christmas dinner to their registered guests.

When asked about how she and her family became involved in coordinating the community Christmas dinner, Dana explained: “Our neighbour, who was like a grandmother to our kids, was one of the founding members of this event and when she passed on, our kids asked if we could take this over. For us, each year it renews the true meaning of Christmas”.

St. Peter in Chains Parish, Trenton, Prayer and Service Groups Prevail

Pope Francis teaches us, "Praying and working in community keeps the world going. It is a motor. Everything in the Church originates in prayer and everything grows thanks to prayer." There are many St. Peter in Chains, Trenton, parishioners who's lives have been touched by the opportunities available to participate in group prayer and service within their parish community. The Followers of Jesus prayer group started in the parish in the 1970s and continues to this day. Over the past 40 years, membership in the group and the program of praise and worship has changed several times. Currently the group meet weekly to prepare together for Sunday Mass using the program, "Celebrating the Word". A long-time participant of the group, Marlene Murphy, commented, "I've learned how to pray. The Mass means so much more to me. My whole world changed and opened up from my experience in the prayer group". When asked what advice she would give to others, Marlene stated, "People should at least try a prayer group. It has really opened up the Scriptures for us and the sharing which happens is wonderful".

Communal prayer holds an important place in the many other groups and organizations within the parish all of which celebrate the contributions of each other. The Fr. Justin Hanley Squires Circle #5219, a Catholic leadership service group for male youth aged 10 to 18, has been operating, with some breaks in service, in the parish for 70 years! Prayer anchors their monthly meetings as the youth discern what initiatives they will undertake each year to serve their community. Mike Silva, a volunteer leader and parent supporting the Squire Circle, indicated that not only do group members develop great leadership skills and enjoy opportunities for community and social engagement, but they are also encouraged on their spiritual journey. Mike noted that the pandemic and related restrictions have had a negative impact on opportunities for Squire youth to gather and interact with each other and the community as they would have in the past however the Circle, with 20 members is still viable in Trenton. Knights of Columbus, Legion of Mary and Catholic Women's League groups are all very active within the St. Peter in Chains parish ensuring that any need identified by Fr. Tim Harrison or another member of the parish administrative team can be promptly and joyfully addressed. A strong culture of service to others prevails within the Catholic faith community in Trenton and prayer, as the motor, can be found at the heart of communal life in the parish. "It is just a prayerful atmosphere in this church" commented Fr. Tim, "and always has been".






Window Project Complete at Holy Rosary Church, Belleville

Inspirational images of historic and contemporary Catholic role models shine brightly in the lofted windows of the new Holy Rosary Church in Belleville. The construction of the church was completed in 2009 under the guidance of Fr. John Hibbard. Over the past two years, with the support of many donors and thoughtful planning, a process has been completed to have beautiful, artistic images displayed on the windows of the church. Using innovations in print technology, selected images were produced on special laminates which were designed to adhere to the windows. A matte overlamine was then used to protect the panels from fading.

The first artwork displayed on the windows in the church was a 13-panel rendering of the Last Supper installed in the fall of 2019, prior to the pandemic. As parish life resumed after the initial lockdown, further images were installed. In the summer of 2021, in appreciation for the 18 years of loving service of Fr. John Hibbard who would be moving to St. Paul the Apostle parish in Kingston, parishioners organized a campaign to fund the remaining costs to complete all of the windows in the church. Fr.

Hibbard has yet to see the full effect of the beautiful display of Canadian saints and martyrs and Blessed Carlos Acutis who modeled for us a



pathway to holiness while living and intercedes for us now as we make our way home. When asked about selecting the saints and specific images for

the church, Fr. Hibbard indicated, “I wanted to represent our Canadian history and the religious of our diocese who have contributed so much. Young people also need a model so Blessed Carlos Acutis represents a young, contemporary Catholic who can inspire the young people of today.”



St. Vincent de Paul Parish in Deseronto Celebrates 125th Anniversary

Despite the restrictions on gathering in the pandemic, the parishioners of St. Vincent de Paul in Deseronto proudly celebrated the 125th anniversary of the parish on the weekend of September 25th, 2021. Commemorating their Patron Saint, St. Vincent de Paul, who’s Feast Day is September 27th, a tribute to the important events and milestones in the history of the parish was shared at Mass and a display of historic photos was arranged at the back of the church so that parishioners could browse through the photos and maintain social distancing.

A history of the life of the parish, originally documented by Bill Dowling and updated by Teresa Dorey was read by Teresa recounting the generations of families whos’ lives were intertwined by their commitment to their faith, to each other and to their community. Recalling some of the hardships endured over the past 125 years, Teresa’s concluding comments reminded everyone of their place in living and passing on the faith, “Today we are weathering the Covid pandemic with separated seating, parking lot Masses, and diminished numbers but as we continue to worship our Lord in this beautiful church that was built by our forefathers under such difficult circumstances let us strive to continue their legacy. St Vincent de Paul pray for us.”

Rosalie Munoz inquired about membership with the Catholic Church before we knew Covid-19. The parish Initiation team enthusiastically started meeting with her in person, sharing our faith and listening to Rosalie's childhood faith stories from her native country, the Philippines.

Rosalie was very excited about the faith formation process; she has asked many questions and was looking forward to being initiated. When Covid struck, Rosalie was working at a long-term care home in Kingston and for obvious reasons, she has limited her contact with people including with the church community. The Initiation process went online, and week after week Rosalie met with the team via Zoom. She had the support of her Catholic sponsor and a Godparent Mila Garcia and knew the RCIA team was there to answer any questions. When Ontario started to open, and the Health Unit permitted Churches to celebrate rituals in small groups Rosalie told us she was ready. In June of this year, with her mother visiting from the Philippines, and her husband and son beside her, Rosalie was baptized by Fr. Paul Mawala, celebrated her Confirmation, and joined us at the Table of the Lord for the very first time. It was a very happy moment for parishioners of St. Paul's Church who, keeping a social distance, warmly welcomed our new sister into the faith community. God bless You Rosalie.

St. Mary's Drop-In Centre: A refuge for the homeless and poor

"Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these my brethren, you did it to Me." (Mt 25:40)

St. Mary's Drop-In Centre initially opened its doors on February 24, 2020. The Drop-In Centre was declared an essential service right from the beginning of the pandemic and continued to remain open during the provincial shutdowns to serve the homeless and poor when other such programs closed. Over the past 19 months we have been able to add wonderful necessary additions for the homeless: a shower and laundry facilities. Our clothing warehouse is open year round and our Winter Coat Drive runs annually from November to January. This past summer, our community garden produced 3500 lbs of vegetables for soup making by our Italian Nonnas. Surplus produce was donated to other local food programs. Through our Guardian Angel Program, people can 'adopt' a homeless person by praying for them, and, due to a recent award from The Davies Charitable Foundation in Kingston, free foot care and haircutting services will soon be added to the constellation of services we provide. God has truly blessed us and continues to do so.

The number of our guests continues to increase. Currently, approximately 50 people attend the Drop-In Centre which is open Monday to Friday from 1 pm to 4 pm. Our guests regard the church as a safe haven and we continually hear that our loving volunteers make all the difference. We strive to see Jesus in all those who come through our doors. Many of our guests struggle with loneliness, a lack of social hope, mental illness or addictive behavior patterns. "Jesus in the distressing disguise of the poor" as St. Teresa of Calcutta put it. "The least of these my brothers and sisters" as Jesus taught. This is the mystery of the poor, that in serving them we are in reality serving Jesus.

We endeavour to meet some of their needs in a practical way by offering nutritious food, clothing, pastoral care and support in a warm, friendly and welcoming environment. During the past year, close to 10,000 meals were served and blankets and sleeping bags were distributed to the homeless. Birthday parties are held for our guests and our summer Tuesday BBQ's have become a favourite. On Christmas Day a full course turkey dinner is served in a festive atmosphere. On a somber note, one of our regular guests, who had attended Mass regularly at the cathedral, passed away suddenly. A memorial service was held at the Drop-In Centre with Father Michel Quenneville, a former volunteer at the Drop-In Centre, officiating. Father Shawn Hughes celebrated the funeral Mass in St. Mary's Cathedral. Pallbearers were volunteers at the Centre. The municipality of Kingston provided a plot for internment.

We have been blessed with the inspiring ongoing commitment of our many volunteers, both front line, and those working behind the scene. We also have been blessed with support from various parishes, the Fourth Degree Knights of Columbus, St. Joseph's and St. Mary's Cathedral Knights of Columbus, Blessed Sacrament CWL, students from Ecole Cathedrale, Mother Teresa School, St. Martha's School, Regiopolis-Notre Dame and Holy Cross, just to name a few, as many generous individual donors. We rely completely on the Providence of God and do not accept funding from the government so that we always keep our Christ-centred mission based on Catholic social teaching. As such, financial support from the local Catholic community is crucial. Income tax receipts are issued for all donations over \$20. Celebrating the National Day of Truth and Reconciliation

On September 30, the first National Day for Truth and Reconciliation, we chose to bring into our liturgical celebration elements of the culture and ritual of our indigenous brothers and sisters as a way of honouring their traditions. It was also a way of showing our sorrow and acknowledgment of the denigration of these traditions by our ancestors and members of our church. We wanted to find healing and reconciliation. We wanted to show our desire to stand with them in their struggles for recognition of the wrongs of the past and the pain that they have suffered. Yet we know that racism and effects of colonialism exist to this day. So, as we acknowledged the traditional homelands on which our chapel stands, we asked God, as the Great Spirit, to allow us to show our indigenous sisters and brothers that we support them in their ongoing struggle for a just and respectful relationship with all the peoples of Canada.

Orange adorned the chapel ambo and walls, and many of the Sisters wore orange as a reminder of the suffering and disrespect indigenous children suffered in Residential Schools. In front of the altar, we draped a star blanket that holds deep meaning and traditions linked to indigenous culture, birth, life and death, and symbolizes peace. Placed on the blanket were the four sacred plants – tobacco, sweet grass, cedar and sage.

After the Liturgy of the Word from Isaiah 58:9b-12; Psalm 33 and John 17:20-26, a recording of a drumming song, played by three women from the Four Directions Centre at Queen's University here in Kingston, accompanied our reflection on what we had heard and experienced. We prayed for the dawning of a new day for all indigenous people in the Americas, north and south, as they struggle for justice and equality, and for the healing of the earth itself and all relationships. As we left the chapel, we heard again the drumming song. A fitting ending to a call to deep reflection and transformation.

The Solemnity of The Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary Patronal Feast Day of the Archdiocese of Kingston



December 8th, the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary is a special day of celebration and joy in the Archdiocese of Kingston. It is the patronal festival of the archdiocese and is an occasion when the faithful can join their archbishop in the celebration of the Holy Mass at the Cathedral of St. Mary of the Immaculate Conception in Kingston. Planning for this year's celebration reflected concern for safe worship in light of the ongoing Covid 19 pandemic, including pre-registration of attendees, mask wearing and social distancing. Archbishop Mulhall praised God for the blessing of being able to gather together despite the challenges we faced. Reflecting on how Our Blessed Mother teaches us, Archbishop Mulhall stated, "She models for us how to listen to the Word. She allows the Word to enter her heart, to win over all in her life, even the plans she had made for herself. We are to listen to God's Word in our lives at this moment. Each of us are called to look into our hearts and ask ourselves, are we hearing God's Word? Have we approached God's Word with the sanctity and reverence necessary to listen and understand?". His Grace asked for the intercession of Our Blessed Mother, conceived without sin, to guide us in this time of listening and prayerful preparation for the coming of Our Lord and for the months to follow as we encounter each other in our parish communities as a synodal Church.





For a Synodal Church: Communion, Preparation and Mission

With the opening of the Synod on Synodality by Pope Francis, we have begun a time of renewal for the Catholic Church throughout the world. It is a time of gathering together and listening. All members of the body of Christ, men, women, and children are invited to walk together and discern how the Holy Spirit is calling us to live the Gospel in our present age.

The faithful of the Archdiocese of Kingston are encouraged to enter this synodal process through prayer, listening and dialogue. The fundamental task put before each of us is to re-awaken our desire to listen to God. Reverent listening to God, through His Son, the Incarnate Word, is the first response of our Catholic life and our surest means of growing in grace. There are three phases of engagement planned for the synodal journey in the Archdiocese of Kingston:



Communion: Oct. 17, 2021 – Jan. 2, 2022 Prayer; opening our hearts to God by listening to His Word

Preparation: Jan. 3, 2022 – Apr. 1, 2022 The people of God engage in respectful, heartfelt listening and dialogue with each other and share their insights through the Archdiocesan synod submission process
