Blessed Pier Giorgio Frassati (1901-1925)

Born April 6, 1901, in Turin, Italy, Pier Giorgio Frassati was raised with his sister in an aristocratic family. His mother was a painter, and his father, an agnostic, was founder and editor of the newspaper La Stampa. A handsome and vibrant youth, Frassati had a passion for sports and mountain climbing. He relished laughter and practical jokes, as well as beauty and art. To the bewilderment of his parents, he developed a vibrant faith, which he shared with ease and enthusiasm. Friends described him as "an explosion of joy."

In 1913, Frassati failed Latin and was sent to a Jesuitrun school. It was there that Frassati's devotion to the Eucharist and to Our Lady blossomed, and he obtained permission to receive daily Communion, which was rare at the time. In 1918, Frassati began to study mining engineering at the Royal Polytechnic Institute of Turin. Deeply committed to charity toward the poor and neglected, he wanted to "serve Christ better among the miners," who toiled in conditions of constant danger and misery. While dedicated to his studies, he immersed himself in social and political activities. He was an active member of the Popular Party, which promoted the social teaching of Pope Leo XIII, and he enrolled in numerous Catholic groups, including the Society of St. Vincent De Paul. He likewise became a Third Order (Lay) Dominican and had an intense prayer life.

At age 24, Frassati suddenly contracted polio from the sick for whom he cared. Serene to the end, he died after six days of excruciating pain. His parents were astonished when thousands attended the funeral, most of them poor people whom their son had served. Pope John Paul II beatified Frassati in 1990. His feast day is July 4.

The "Culture of Comfort"

IT IS NOT surprising that in poll after poll, economic concerns consistently rank as the top political priority of voters. While people's attitudes about specific economic policies may differ, they seem to be in agreement that the health of the economy is of paramount importance. This is not to say that people do not also have strong opinions about public safety such as the right to life. Many polls, including those conducted by the Marist Institute for Public Opinion for the Knights of Columbus, have demonstrated that most people favor significant legal restrictions on abortion. In the more than four decades since Roe vs. Wade, Americans have become increasingly uneasy with the legacy of abortion on demand. Nonetheless, when judged alongside other political issues, the right to life often doesn't make the list of voters' priorities.

In this light, consider several observations that Pope Francis has made about contemporary society. First, he has often referred to a "throwaway culture" that fails to recognize the intrinsic dignity of human life. He notes that because the sick, poor, disabled, elderly and unborn are not seen as "useful" neither are they respected and protected. At the same time, the pope has warned against what he calls a widespread "culture of comfort," which leads to "the globalization of indifference." In a July 2013 homily he said that we, like those who walk by the man left for dead in the parable of the Good Samaritan, "have lost a sense of responsibility for our brothers and sisters." Thus, in his twofold diagnosis of our culture, Pope Francis has drawn urgent attention to our tendency to reduce others – as well as ourselves – to useful and comfortable consumers.

Of course, the "throwaway culture" is not new. In a 1931 speech, Irish playwright George Bernard Shaw smugly argued, "If you can't justify your existence – if you're not producing as much as you consume or perhaps a little more – then clearly we cannot use the society for the purpose of keeping you alive because your life does not benefit us and it can't be of very much use to yourself." This atheistic philosophy of the eugenics movement led to the horrors of the World War II death camps – and it is still alive today. The only difference now is that its proponents are less brazen and its victims are more silent and defenseless.

In the United States, we are reminded of certain self-evident truths: "that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights, that among these are life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness". Yet, even if we accept these principles and reject the underlying philosophy of a throwaway culture, we are not immune to becoming a society of comfort and indifference. For this reason, we must carefully examine our lives and priorities in light of our social responsibilities. Pope Francis' challenge to Catholic medical professionals in September 2013 applies to us all: "Be witnesses and diffusers of the culture of life... This is a task of the new evangelization that often requires going against the tide and paying for it personally." Alton J. Pelowski Editor, Columbia Magazine, July 2014.

LOURDES MIRACLES

The Medical Office of Lourdes was established in 1882 as an aid for the Church in discerning which alleged miracles at Lourdes would be approved by the Church. In 1947, the National Medical Committee of Lourdes (which in 1954 became the International Medical Committee of Lourdes) was established to further scrutinize phenomena presented by the Medical Office as inexplicable. This committee of approximately 30 physicians appointed by the Bishop of Tarbes and Lourdes applies intense scrutiny to each case presented. Of the more than 6,000 documented miracles in the archives of the Medical Office, the Church has only approved 67 of them.

This isn't because all the other non-approved "miracles" are not truly miracles. Many of them, perhaps, thousands, probably are. The Church establishes the highest of standards to ensure only the most certain are presented to the faithful as worthy of pious belief. In order to be approved, the miracles have to be "sudden, unforeseeable, involving no convalescence...total...lasting (at least four or five years before being taken into consideration)...serious (that is, a threat to life)...organic and not functional." In fact, the committee considers whether or not previous therapies or means of care may have had an impact on a healing. Only those entirely inexplicable by natural causes can be considered to be miraculous.

Two of these miracles occurred on successive days – August 20 (Marie Lebranchu) and 21 (Marie Lemarchand) of 1892. Both of these women suffered from severe pulmonary tuberculosis (Koch's baciallus) and were in the terminal stages of the disease. Lebranchu, 35, was emaciated, weighing less than 65 pounds. Lemarchand, 18, had ulcerous caverns in her face caused by the tuberculosis that were terribly difficult to behold. Both women were healed instantaneously upon bathing in the miraculous waters – Marie Lemarchand received new pink skin where before there were only holes. She would later marry and give birth to eight children. (miraclehunter.com/marian_apparitions/approved/Lourdes/miraclesl.html#lemarchand).

What are SACRAMENTALS?

acramentals are sacred signs or symbols. A sacramental is a sacred sign that signifies effects obtained through the Church's intercession. Sacramentals drive away evil spirits, and when piously used, remit venial sin and prepare the soul for grace. Candles, incense, holy oils, and bells are examples of objects which have been blessed and are used as Sacramentals. As Catholics we are most familiar with the swinging and tolling bells usually found in the Church tower or steeple. These bells are traditionally used to call the faithful to church, to mark the death of someone (at funeral Masses), and to call people to prayer at certain times of the day (such as the noon bell calling people to pray the Angelus). There is also a hand bell, known as the Sanctus Bell, which has been rung during the Mass since the 16th Century. The hand bell is rung by the server at the elevation of the consecrated Bread and Wine. This ringing signifies the extreme sacredness of what is happening at the Mass at that time, and calls those assembled to focus on the real presence of Jesus Christ. As a sacramental, then, the hand bell calls our attention to the most solemn moment in the Mass.

TODAY GOD LOVES THE WORLD THROUGH US!

The Father is the most beautiful gift that Jesus gave us on earth. He said it to Philip: "To have seen Me is to have seen the Father, I am in the Father and the Father is in Me." And when He taught us to pray, He said: "Say this when you pray, 'Our Father,' your Father and My Father, 'Our Father." And on another occasion, He told us, "Love one another, as I have loved you. As the Father has loved Me, so I have loved you." Jesus was so sure of His Father's love for Him, and of His love for His Father, that all the time He wanted to make us realize how much the Father loves us too.

God loves us tenderly with a love He has proved, and so tender is His love that He will never force Himself on us. God will never disturb a soul, rather He draws a soul. God lifts a soul and then fills it with His love. God cannot fill what is already full though that is why we need to be empty for Him to be able to fill us. That is why, if we want to fill His presence, we need a pure heart, for a pure heart can see God and if we see God, then that's the beginning of love: our love for God and His love for us. Today God loves the world through us, just as before He proved His love for the world by giving His Son to Mary the most pure, and she went "in haste" to give Him to others. And He loved us so much, He made Himself the Bread of Life. And we too must love, we too must give until it hurts. Today God loves the world through us, He keeps on loving the world by sending us into the world, to be His love. His compassion."
