

Why Marry in a Church?

Question: Why are Catholics required to get married in a church, and not outside or at a different venue?

Answer: Because the sacrament of marriage is a sacred covenant between the husband and wife, the celebration of the sacrament of matrimony is much more than simply a social or family event. So, the rule that the sacrament be celebrated in a church is a way to help reinforce the deeper meaning of Christian marriage. To help make this clearer, the Church's tradition also normally includes the celebration of the Mass when the marriage is being celebrated between two Catholics, and so a church or chapel is the ideal setting. For special reasons — which vary from diocese to diocese — the local bishop can give permission for the marriage to be celebrated in another suitable place. ©LPi

EASTER EGG HUNT

On Easter Sunday morning St. John's will host an Easter Egg hunt for our younger children. The Hunt will take place after the 9:30 mass in the outside area (weather permitting) by the side entrance on Harrison Street.

YOUR ALTAR

O Lord, we bring to <u>Your altar</u> these offerings of our service: be pleased to receive them, we pray, and transform them into the Sacrament of our redemption.

During Mass, parents (and others!) often admonish children to "behave themselves", because they are in God's house. But are we "grown-ups" fully attuned to what happens in this sacred place, at God's holy altar? Whatever we bring to a Catholic altar – we literally bring to Christ Himself! All the prayers we utter before, or vows we make before, or sacrificial gifts we offer before a Catholic altar – are offered to Christ! No wonder we <u>bow</u> before the altar, and the ordained ministers venerate it with a kiss at Mass! Are you aware of what is happening each time you stand before our altar, or when your gifts are brought to our altar, or when you or a loved one celebrates a Sacrament: Baptism, Confirmation, Eucharist or Anointing of the Sick before our altar, or when the bodies of our loved ones are honored before our altar?

This prayer asks Christ to receive EVERYTHING we bring to God's altar – and transform it into Himself! For the altar is the place of the <u>ultimate</u> exchange; at the altar, we offer back to God whatever He has entrusted to us; our service, our offerings, our very lives – which He receives and transforms into Himself! WOW!





ST. JOSEPH

The Bible pays Joseph the highest compliment: he was a "just" man. The quality meant a lot more than faithfulness in paying debts. When the Bible speaks of God "justifying" someone, it means that God, the all-holy or "righteous" One, so transforms a person that the individual shares somehow in God's own holiness, and hence it is really "right" for God to love him or her. By saying Joseph was "just," the Bible means that he was one who was completely open to all that God wanted to do for him. He became holy by opening himself totally to God. The rest we can easily surmise. Think of the kind of love with which he won Mary, and the depth of the love they shared during their marriage. It is no contradiction of Joseph's manly holiness that he considered divorcing Mary when she was found to be with child. The important words of the Bible are that he planned to do this "quietly" because he was "a righteous man, yet unwilling to expose her to shame" (Matthew 1:19).

The just man was simply, joyfully, wholeheartedly obedient to God-in marrying Mary, in naming Jesus, in shepherding the precious pair to Egypt, in bringing them to Nazareth, in the undetermined number of years of guiet faith and courage. The Bible tells us nothing of Joseph in the years after the return to Nazareth except the incident of finding Jesus in the Temple (see Luke 2:41-51). Perhaps this can be taken to mean that God wants us to realize that the holiest family was like every other family, that the circumstances of life for the holiest family were like those of every family, so that when Jesus' mysterious nature began to appear, people couldn't believe that He came from such humble beginnings: "Is He not the carpenter's son? ls not His mother Mary...?" (Matthew 13:55a). It was almost as indignant as "Can anything good come from Nazareth?" (John 1:46b).

God's love is for anybody anywhere, and everybody everywhere.

Where do Ukrainian Easter Eggs come from?

The beautiful "pysanky" are an ancient celebration of Christ's Resurrection. Pysanky comes from the Ukrainian word pysaty, which means "to write." The eggs are so named because their intricate designs of beeswax wax and special dyes are not painted but "written" onto the egg.

Easter eggs are a pre-Christian practice. Before Christianity came to the Ukraine in 988, pagan Ukrainians heralded the coming of spring with their intricately-decorated and colorful pysanky. When the followers of Christ arrived in Ukraine and discovered this ancient practice, they did not ban the existence of the symbolic little eggs. They saw the beauty and meaning in them, and joyfully adopted the custom. They enriched the pysanky by incorporating Christian symbols and colors that represented their faith.

The Ukrainians would make pysanky and bestow them as special gifts. Children and godchildren received pysanky, and unmarried maidens and eligible young men in the community exchanged the delicate treasures each spring. People gave the intricate eggs to their priests as a sign of admiration and thanks. They left pysanky in the cemetery on the grave sites of beloved family members who had died.

The custom became so deeply ingrained in the Catholic culture of Ukraine that no external force could obliterate it. When Stalin banned the making of pysanky in an attempt to stamp out Christianity, the undaunted Ukrainians responded by hiding in closets in the dead of night and secretly writing the eggs in the dim light of a sputtering candle.

The vibrant pysanky remind us of Christ's ultimate triumph over evil and death. This ancient symbol of the Resurrection is a good way to keep in mind just what Easter is about.
