
Stations of the Cross

BEREAVEMENT SUPPORT PROGRAM



OPEN GYM BASKETBALL **GRADES 3-8**



COVERING CROSSES AND STATUES

They say half of today's Catholics never experienced the traditional custom of shrouding holy images in purple during Lent! This report shocked me --- not because 50% of Catholics never saw 'covered statues' - but because I'm in the older half that DOES remember! Why did we cover holy images? Why did we stop doing it? And, why are we doing it again? For centuries before the Second Vatican Council's reform of the liturgy in the 1960's, Lent was mostly a prolonged meditation of the Lord's Passion and Death. Lent was marked by forms of the Stations of the Cross highlighting the physical sufferings of Our Lord, the sorrowful mysteries of the rosary, somber music with little or no accompaniment, stark devotions, acts of self-mortification, self-denial and fasting. Lent seemed more of a preparation for Good Friday than Easter! In fact, before Vatican II, the Lord's Passion was proclaimed numerous times during Lent, and the last two weeks of Lent were called 'Passion of the Lord - Week I' and 'Week II.' Now, the Lord's Passion is proclaimed only twice; Saint John's account is read on Good Friday, and one of the other versions (Saint Matthew in Year A, Saint Mark in Year B, and Saint Luke in Year C) are read on Passion (Palm) Sunday - since not everyone (sadly) can attend Good Friday's main service. But back then, when Christ's sufferings were proclaimed so often, the Church literally put on robes of mourning; crosses and crucifixes were veiled in red, statues, icons and holy images were cloaked in purple --- from the 5th Sunday of Lent (Passion I) until during the Gloria on Holy Saturday night. The rubrics even called for the old "Easter Vigil Mass" to begin at such an hour to make the Gloria begin exactly at midnight; then, since it was technically 'Easter morning', the crosses, statues and images were unveiled. Thus, covered images were, for many, the main 'sign' of the end of Lent and Easter's beginning!

When Vatican II researched the origins of Lent, they found it began as a time of intense preparation for those adults preparing for initiation into the Church through Baptism, Confirmation, and First Eucharist on Easter. At first, only these 'converts' received ashes and performed the traditional Lenten disciplines of prayer, fasting and almsgiving. While the whole Church was encouraged to spiritually join them in Lenten devotions --- it was not required to do so. Then, when infant Baptism became the norm, and Confirmation and First Eucharist were celebrated at a later age, Lent's baptismal nature was lost, and Lent's focus and purpose became what 'older' Catholics like me, remember: intense self-denial and signs of sadness. One of the main liturgical reforms of the Council was reinstating the ancient RCIA; the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults by which adults become full members of the Church. And it seems that, in the 1970's, the American Bishops implementing the RCIA and helping it grow, they were so intent on intentionally downplayed other aspects of Lent, such as the option of covering statues.

For although the rubrics of the 'new' Mass in the 1970's still called for images to be covered from the 5th Week of Lent until Easter, each nation's Conference of Bishops could 'suppress' the custom ---- as our Bishops did, a decision not welcomed by all Catholics. In the revised Roman Missal (2003), the American Bishops neither suppressed the custom (as they did in the 1970 Missal) nor required it; this issue of 'lesser importance' is left to the pastor's discretion. The Church is very clear on the 'Important Issues' no pastor or Bishop can change the type of bread used for Eucharist; who purifies sacred vessels; admitting non-Christian godparents or to the Eucharist. But as a mere custom, the covering of statues and holy images may take place from before the 5th Sunday of Lent until before the beginning of the Easter Vigil so that it does not become a focal point of that Mass,

which should be the Word of God and the Sacraments of Initiation. And crosses and crucifixes may be covered from before the 5th Sunday until after the celebration of the Lord's Passion on Good Friday. While no color is suggested, red is traditionally used for crosses and crucifixes, and purple for all other things. And, as always, liturgy should not be changed or altered without first giving a good catechesis or explanation. So, having read this, you should be ready to experience or be reacquainted with an ancient custom! Why cover holy images? In Lent, we 'fast' from many things: festive music, the Gloria, Alleluias, flowers and other signs of joy; some 'fast' from certain foods, activities, habits, etc. And so as the Lord's Passion draws near, the Church removes, covers or 'fasts' from anything that takes our focus off of the awesome, grace-filled Triduum liturgies in which we join ourselves to Christ's Last Supper – His Passion, Death and Burial – and His glorious Resurrection!



THE Legend of the CLADDAGH

Over 400 years ago in Ireland, there was a village called Claddagh. Its men were fishermen who often sailed way out into the Atlantic. On one particular voyage, Moorish pirates captured a fishing vessel and took the crew to Africa and sold them as slaves. One of the crewmen, a young man who was to be married, became a favorite of the Sultan and was taught the art of goldsmithing. The Sultan gave him permission to marry, but he would hold his heart for the girl who waited for him in the village of Claddagh. He fashioned a gold ring with a crown atop a heart held gently in two hands. The crown meant loyalty, the hands – friendship, and the heart – love. He finally escaped and returned to Ireland where he married his true love; the ring he had made was her wedding ring. To this day, the Claddagh ring represents loyalty, friendship and love.

Bread for the Eucharist

Like yeast that causes the dough to rise as it changes into a gas, leaven also causes the dough to rise. But unlike yeast, a small amount of leaven, taken from the last batch of dough, was kneaded into the new dough; before it was left to rise and was baked, a small amount was kept to add into the next batch of dough. Eventually this led to leaven with less "rising power" – and it became a source of harmful bacteria; so in the Bible, leaven is a negative symbol. The Jews were divinely mandated to destroy all leaven and be "leaven-free" for one week during the annual Feast of Unleavened Bread, after which they started anew with fresh leaven. The Passover or Seder meal took place during this weeklong "leaven-free" time. To this day the Church uses unleavened hosts or the purest bread for the Eucharistic sacrifice, for Christ was sinless!

ARCHDIOCESE OF NEWARK 2024 LENTEN REGULATIONS

Good Friday is a day of both Fast and Abstinence.
 The other Fridays of Lent are days of Abstinence.
 Those between the ages of 18 and 59 are obliged to fast.

On a day of Abstinence, no meat may be eaten. Those who have reached the age of 14 are obliged by the law of abstinence.

- 2. The obligation to observe the laws of Fast and Abstinence "substantially", or as a whole, is a serious obligation.
- 3. The Fridays of the year, outside of Lent, are designated as days of penance, but each individual may substitute for the traditional abstinence from meat some other practice of voluntary self-denial as penance.
- 4. The time for fulfilling the Paschal Precept (Easter Duty*) extends from the First Sunday of Lent, February 18 to The Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity, May 26, 2024.

Canon 920, §1. All the faithful, after they have been initiated into the Most Holy Eucharist, are bound by the obligation of receiving Communion at least once a year.
