The Pastoral Plan

In September of 2005, the Pastoral Council of Shepherd of the Valley Catholic Church began the strategic process of developing a new 5-Year Pastoral Plan.

Parishioners were invited to share their input, enabling identifiable objectives, strategies, and individual ministries responsible for implementation to be established.

As a result, members of the Pastoral Council present our new 5-Year Pastoral Plan for Shepherd of the Valley Catholic Church.

Hispanic Ministry

Shepherd of the Valley Catholic Church is richly blessed with a variety of gifts among its parishioners. The Hispanic Ministry seeks to offer a culturally relevant ministry, both liturgically and socially, to bring forth the gifts of all Spanish speaking parishioners.

Objectives:

Provide a high quality and relevant ministry through worship, education, evangelization, and cultural integration. Support the ministry to accommodate anticipated future growth of the Spanish speaking parishioners.

Strategies:

Provide opportunities, training and necessary resources to maintain development of leadership within the Hispanic community. Devise and implement an effective plan that focuses upon evangelization and collaboration of liturgical celebrations and social events as one body in Christ where possible. Liturgy

The Liturgy is a prayerful and spiritual invitation to experience God's continual presence among us. It is through our senses of sight, sound, smell and touch; we are called to a fuller experience of His presence.

Objectives:

Provide the necessary tools and resources for life long faith formation and development. Educate parishioners to become more involved in learning, teaching, and living our Catholic Faith.

Work to catechize new and missing generations in the basic teachings of the Church.

Strategies:

Discern the educational needs of the parish and implement an effective plan to meet those diverse educational needs.

Compile resources to assist in the catechesis. Have well trained and invested instructors and presenters. Search for creative yet faithful avenues to captivate and educate the people. Assess and evaluate the process and content on a periodic basis.

Enable active participation with the work of peace and justice.
Evaluate the current education and advocacy of our Catholic Social Teachings to discern priorities not being met.

Strategies:

Provide a balanced peace and justice ministry within the parish that reaches out to the local community and the world. Educate and provide opportunities to participate in the work of peace and justice.

Education

A strong faith formation program for both adults and children is the basic foundation that enables a parish to know, love and serve the Lord and His people.

Objectives:

Enable quality liturgy and worship within the different aspects that contribute toward it.

Have quality music, message, welcome, environment, and a relevant connection with the people and concerns of the day.

Experience a more profound and integrated connection in our liturgies that focus upon cultivating, nourishing and expressing our relationship as the one body in Christ.

Bring connections together with the music, the scriptures, the Eucharist, and social teaching.

Strategies:

Develop a liturgical ministry that will promote, encourage and beautify a spiritual, prayerful and artistic expression of the liturgical celebrations.

Coordinate the music and liturgy.

Promote high standards for music, homiletics, and participation. Maintain well trained and renewed liturgical ministers.

Spiritual Life

Spirituality is that loving, connected relationship between Jesus, others and yourself.

Objectives:

Foster, encourage and nurture spiritual growth within the parish community by providing a variety of opportunities for parishioners to express, share, and live out their faith with each other.

Strategies:

Develop within the parish community, an effective system for promoting and developing retreats, prayer and worship opportunities, and faith sharing.

Encourage prayer and spirituality within and outside of the parish.

Emphasize the spiritual significance of the ritual and practice of the faith.

Offer real world examples of how to bring Christian spirituality into the real world.

Model the spiritual life

among the leaders of the church. Assess current programs and activities for their development of the spiritual life among parishioners.
