REFLECTING ON GOD'S WORD

The prophets often spoke bluntly, whether addressing the people or even God. Take Jeremiah today. He accuses God of seducing and overpowering him, making him speak a word that has led to his ridicule and persecution. He was even thrown down a cistern and left to die because of his preaching! Jeremiah confesses he has no choice in the matter. When he refuses to speak God's word, he experiences a fire burning in his heart, consuming his very bones.

The cost of drawing near to the living God can take us down a path we would rather not go. Peter saw this coming when Jesus began to speak of the suffering that lay ahead, instead of being the powerful Messiah people had been waiting for, who would cast down their enemies and restore Israel to the glory days of King David. Instead, Jesus spoke about taking up the cross, losing one's life, or, in Paul's words to the Romans, becoming "a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God."

God's plan for us is the transformation and renewal of our minds according to the pattern of God's Son Jesus. This transformation comes about when we "offer [our] bodies as a living sacrifice," seeking to discern and do God's will as Jesus did. Such self-offering may lead to our following Jesus on the way: finding life by losing it for the sake of others, and coming to know the living God as purifying fire, life-giving water, and nourishing food for our spirit.

STEWARDSHIP THOUGHTS

THE TWENTY-SECOND SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

A central theme develops in today's Scripture passages regarding God's will. The prophet Jeremiah's personal relationship with God inspires him to do the Lord's will in spite of his reluctance. Even as his community mocks him, he prophesies against the leaders' idol worship and unjust treatment of the poor. In St. Paul's Letter to the Roman community, he encourages them to convert and renew their minds and bodies to what is good, pleasing, and perfect to Him in order to find God's will. In the Gospel from the evangelist St. Matthew, Jesus aligns himself with His Father's will when He tells His disciples that He will suffer, die, and be raised up on the third day. For Christian stewards, pursuing, finding, and then doing the Father's will leads to deeper discipleship and a personal relationship with Jesus. For wise stewards, they also find peace, joy, and fulfillment in this life. Establishing your spiritual life is key to discovering God's will. Begin by making daily quiet time to listen and pray to the Lord along with reading a few verses of Scripture

LITURGY OF THE DAY

Today we hear Jesus tell his disciples that he must go to Jerusalem where he will suffer and be killed and that—guess what? - whoever comes after him must take up his cross and follow him. It must have been quite a shock. This is the first time Jesus told them this. We know what happened nearly two thousand years ago, but the challenge is new for each generation of disciples. Are we willing to take up our crosses? Will we follow? Let our sharing in the Eucharist strengthen us as we take up the cross and follow him.

When Jeremiah heard the word of the Lord, it burned so fiercely in his heart that he had to proclaim it, even though it brought him derision and reproach. We have the opportunity to hear the word of the Lord every time we celebrate the Eucharist. Does it burn a fire within our hearts? Does it leave us with no choice but to proclaim it? Does it transform our lives? Or have we forgotten it by the time Mass is over? Let us open our hearts today to the word of God.

Families of Parishes and Discernment of Family Members for St. Scholastica

Families of Parishes are groups of parishes, generally three to six, in close proximity to each other, served by multiple priests and deacons, and sharing resources to advance the mission. Key elements related to Families of Parishes and Parishioners are:

- This new model will allow the priests, deacons, and lay staff associated with a single parish to better share their gifts and talents with the whole family of parishes.
- Forming "Families of Parishes" is our way to answer the Spirit's call we heard at Synod 16: for a complete renewal of structures to make them radically missionoriented and Spirit- filled
- The new structure calls parishes to be communal. Families of Parishes enable us to establish and nurture new relationships. We are no longer isolated parishes; rather, we will become one complementary family.
- "God relates to his people not as isolated individuals but as a people, a family, united with one another in deep bonds of love" (Eph 4:1-6).
- The Church is communal. Parishes are communal.
- "We learn to give and receive God's love in and through our relationships with one another" (Unleash The Gospel Marker 3.1).
