REFLECTING ON GOD’S WORD

I suspect that the real reason we avoid the desert is because in all that monotony there are no hiding places, no paths to crawl our way behind some kink of hill, no busyness that allows us to duck beneath the rippling surface of honesty, no phone calls to undo the silence that echoes our real selves. Curious that we should be afraid of the nothing rather than of the something. Yet it is the nothing, in the end, that makes the revelation happen. Such is the unsettling power of any desert, to reveal what we most fear in life, the real self that is perhaps less known and more imposing than anyone else’s self. Deserts do that, and so we avoid them like kids dancing about their homework. Over the years we learn that it’s safer to fritter about on the fringe of Lent than to get lost in its vast and desert emptiness. We’ve grown good at frittering, at tinkering with days stripped of television or meals that have surrendered their dessert. This frittering goes on simply because when it’s all over and done we are able to go back to the lives we’ve come to enjoy and treasure and nothing has been redone, least of all our real selves.

Jesus, however, risked the desert. Never just a tinkerer, he dared to trek about the emptiness for forty days and nights. This week’s first scripture is a piece from Noah’s tale in the bobbing ark. Thus we might wonder which desert was more daunting, forty days and nights of Noah’s deluge or of Jesus’ drought. Yet both found themselves in new and different worlds, neither of which had ever before been mapped.

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STEWARDSHIP THOUGHTS

FIRST SUNDAY OF LENT (FEBRUARY 20/21 2021)



Baptism and repentance is the common theme in today’s Scripture passages. In Genesis, God establishes a covenant with Noah and his descendants: *that never again shall all bodily creatures be destroyed by the waters of a flood.* St. Peter, in his First Letter, references this story of Noah and the flood. He states: *... Eight in all, were saved through water. This prefigured baptism, which saves you now.* The Sacrament of Baptism forgives sin and calls us to discipleship in Christ, our Lord and Savior. Baptism is the “gateway” to all of the sacraments. At the Easter Vigil and Easter Sunday Masses, we strengthen this discipleship by renewing our baptismal promises, vowing to reject Satan, his empty promises, and the glamour of evil in our lives. In St. Mark’s Gospel, the evangelist tells how Jesus *remained in the desert for forty days, tempted by Satan.* We know Jesus was successful in resisting this temptation. May we seek the Lord’s grace in times of weakness so we, too, can avoid temptation that leads to sin. During this Lenten season, participate in the Sacrament of Reconciliation to prepare yourself for the Risen Christ.

COVID-19 VACCINATIONS

The City of Detroit has the site location of the TCF Center for residents of Detroit 65 or older who want to receive the vaccinations. **Must bring with you Proof of residency**, like a Michigan Driver License. Check with them for other examples of proof. **An appointment is required.**

The vaccination is also open to the following who are employed within the City of Detroit. They are clergy, critical care workers, teachers, childcare providers, adult foster caregivers, U.S. Post Office workers, food service workers, security guards, and janitors. You must show proof of employment within the City of Detroit; an example, pay stubb, W2, badge with employer's address. **Registration is required.**

You can also check the website, <http://www.DetroitMi.gov/vaccine> for a complete list of those eligible and what type of proof is required.

Another location is Meijer in **Wayne County for 65 or older Need not be a resident.** To get on the registration list you would need to visit **Clinic.Meyer.com** or send a text to **75049** then in the "message of the text" type the word, **"COVID"**. When the vaccination becomes available, they will contact you. There is a 3 day notice when you are contacted.

In the near future, there is a possibility of Walmart and CVS to become another site.
