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First Sunday of Lent

“Repent & Believe in the Gospel!”

Sisters and Brothers,

“May the Lord give you PEACE!”

From the book of Genesis, we read that God said to Noah and his sons, “*See I am now establishing my Covenant with you and your descendants after you and with every living creature that was with you.*”

The story of Noah reminds us that it is God’s nature to **save** NOT to destroy! God gave the **RAINBOW** as a sign and reminder of his **COVENANT** that he would uphold forever. A sign for all ages between God and us of the **loving and redeeming relationship** that has been *sealed in the blood of the Lamb*, Jesus our Lord!

Church architecture has incorporated the bow of the ship, if we but look up at the ceiling and flip it upside down in our mind, it has the contour of the **ARK of Noah** or the **BARK of Peter**. Jesus himself is the **CAPTAIN** of the ship called Church. The Holy Spirit is our **navigator**, and we are **the CREW** as we journey together along the sea of life. As in nature, so on the human journey the waters of life are a mixture of movement. Sometimes, we travel on calm and serene water, while other times the seas of life are turbulent and threatening.

As we journey with Jesus in Mark’s GOSPEL, we are led with HIM into the desert for forty days. **The desert** is an arid space that can be for us **a contemplative space for communion with our God**. However, Mark notes that both we and Jesus are not alone. It is here that Satan tempted the Lord and do we think that we might be free of his grappling force? Not likely. But there are also angels to minister to Jesus and to us! There is a whole world community called CHURCH that journeys together with us as we take time to **RETREAT**, to change—up our schedule, to take some time and get away. Perhaps, a good word **METANOIA**, Greek in origin.... can be a helpful mantra for us to help lead us through our Lenten Journey towards Easter Transformation. **Metanoia** means to get to the essence of our existence as Catholic—Christians and open-up ourselves to **a change of heart and lifestyle**.

Jesus’ message from the oldest Gospel which is Mark has a clear and urgent call for each of us:

**“This is the time of fulfillment.
The Kingdom of God is at hand.
Repent, and believe in the Gospel!”**

This is the TIME...**the Kairos—moment** in which we live, and at every moment we exist...especially, in this time of the pandemic crisis that has affected our 21st century world. It’s real! And so is the presence of God, as we listen and be still to the Spirit of the Lord speaking to our hearts.

AMEN—Church! **Grace is built upon nature**. Hopefully, we have come to the realization that we are NOT able to do everything by ourselves. Amen! If we don’t accept it in FAITH....may the gift of our human NATURE speak truth to us in the flesh! We need others. We need God!

PRAYER is our sacred time with GOD as we enter into the Lenten Season with our sacred ancestors the desert fathers and mothers. Like “**Anthony of Egypt**” and “**Abba LOT and Abba Joseph.**”

FASTING is an important Lenten practice that we begin to fast from eating too much....that makes us heavy and sluggish; that causes us to live in solidarity with the poor; that can give us physical and spiritual energy on the things of the Lord; that we can share what we would have spent by placing that money in our **RICE BOWL** for those who are suffering from malnutrition and hunger.

ALMSGIVING is taking a closer look at life and at the quality of life of those who are homeless, those who have become evicted, those who are simply in need of basics like a hot meal. Spend some time at **our OUTREACH MINISTRY** and encounter the face of Christ in the sisters and brothers who are part of our local church—family.

Sisters and brothers, as we begin to enter this first week of Lent, consider something **physical**, something **spiritual**, and something that is **relational** to do for your Lenten journey to Easter transformation. May God who is troubling the waters of life at this time, offer us shelter and protection **aboard the Ark of the Church that is Kingdom—bound!**

For Lent 2021, I plan to offer any pain and discomfort from surgery for new growth and new life here at St. Benedict. May this time of healing mercy be blessed in the invitation of Jesus **to repent and to believe in the Gospel!**

First Sunday of Lent

READING 1 Gn 9:8-15

God said to Noah and to his sons with him: “See, I am now establishing my covenant with you and your descendants after you and with every living creature that was with you: all the birds, and the various tame and wild animals that were with you and came out of the ark. I will establish my covenant with you, that never again shall all bodily creatures be destroyed by the waters of a flood; there shall not be another flood to devastate the earth.” God added: “This is the sign that I am giving for all ages to come, of the covenant between me and you and every living creature with you: I set my bow in the clouds to serve as a sign of the covenant between me and the earth. When I bring clouds over the earth, and the bow appears in the clouds, I will recall the covenant I have made between me and you and all living beings, so that the waters shall never again become a flood to destroy all mortal beings.”

READING 2 1 Pt 3:18-22

Beloved: Christ suffered for sins once, the righteous for the sake of the unrighteous, that he might lead you to God. Put to death in the flesh, he was brought to life in the Spirit. In it he also went to preach to the spirits in prison, who had once been disobedient while God patiently waited in the days of Noah during the building of the ark, in which a few persons, eight in all, were saved through water.

This prefigured baptism, which saves you now. It is not a removal of dirt from the body but an appeal to God for a clear conscience, through the resurrection of Jesus Christ, who has gone into heaven and is at the right hand of God, with angels, authorities, and powers subject to him.

GOSPEL Mk 1:12-15

The Spirit drove Jesus out into the desert, and he remained in the desert for forty days, tempted by Satan. He was among wild beasts, and the angels ministered to him.

After John had been arrested, Jesus came to Galilee proclaiming the gospel of God: “This is the time of fulfillment. The kingdom of God is at hand. Repent, and believe in the gospel.”
