Course Description and Approach

This is a multi-faceted class granting students a substantial chronological history of European and American events from 1776 to the present day. A hybrid art history, intellectual history, and literary criticism offering, the course's guiding paradigm is the "Catholic Optic," affording plentiful reflections on the high and low points of recent times under the umbrella of fallen humanity's attempts at betterment in an imperfect world.
