

Unit 3 — How does Jesus Christ teach us to live a moral life?

EQ #1: How do God's commands (rules) guide my life?

CATECHIST PREPARATION

To prepare for this week's lesson:

 Prepare your adult heart and mind by watching the following videos ahead of this lesson:

<u>BISHOP BARRON ON THE TEN COMMANDMENTS</u> and <u>DID CATHOLICS REWRITE THE 10</u>

<u>COMMANDMENTS?</u> If time permits, also review <u>TEN COMMANDMENTS ORDERING</u>

COMPARISON.

Important Note: Depending upon whether you come from the Catholic tradition or one of the Protestant denominations, you will be influenced by one of the two scriptural bases for God's Commands. To read both Biblical 'lists' for yourself, go to **Exodus 20:1-17** and **Deuteronomy 5:6-21** in the Old Testament. (This would also be a GREAT activity for older learners - i.e., to read and compare/contrast the two lists). The Catholic translations can be found on the USCCB website at EXODUS and DEUTERONOMY or in your family Bibles. Note that the Catholic ordering is based upon the Deuteronomy account.

Sometimes, Catholics are criticized by their Protestant brothers and sisters for the ordering of the Commandments that we use. Claims have been made that Catholicism has 'taken out' the reference to making idols or graven images in order to justify our 'worship' of sacred statues and images. Of course, that is *not* what the Church teaches. While we do venerate these religious items as they serve to point our hearts and minds towards Him, only God is deserving of our worship or adoration. When you read from Scripture, however, it is apparent that the command regarding idols has not been neglected in the Catholic rendition. Rather, the prohibition of worshipping idols is

understood/affirmed in our First Commandment where God declares "I am the Lord your God; you shall not have strange gods before me." This includes any and all things that might be wrongfully worshipped or placed before God in our lives. This can be ANYTHING (sports, money, electronics, success, statues, images, etc.). Be sure to keep this in mind as you instruct your learners in this lesson. This is a point of contention for some Protestants against Catholicism and understanding this distinction and the reason for it can better equip your learners with the tools necessary to defend their faith now and as they grow older. As we know, it's not enough that our learners are taught what we believe, but more importantly, why we believe it. Remember: If an activity or video is listing a prohibition against GRAVEN IMAGES OR IDOLS as the 2nd Commandment, it's not the Catholic ordering. Be sure to ADAPT any activities you may find to reflect the Catholic ordering.

- Review the appropriate grade-level learning targets from the Catechetical Framework
 for Lifelong Faith Formation (CFLFF) posted on the Catechist website at
 https://stlaurence.org/the-catechist for your age group. Keep these targets in mind as
 you prepare for and progress through the weekly lesson, making discussion points based
 upon these specific age-appropriate targets.
- Reflect upon a favorite Scriptural passage referring to God's rules, or laws, that you
 would like to share with your learners, and explain why the passage is important to you.
 Or, you might like to consider any one of the following:

MARK 12: 28-34, EXODUS 3: 1-17, EXODUS 14: 5-29, EXODUS 20: 1-17, DEUT 5: 6-21, MATT 5: 3-10, MATT 7:12, MATTHEW 19: 16-19, ROMANS 2: 12-16, ROMANS 13:8, JEREMIAH 31: 33

- Create a <u>Prayer Table</u> (or check out <u>How to Make a Prayer Table for Kids</u>) in a special corner of the classroom. Keep a Bible reverently displayed there to be used for readings in your lessons. When proclaiming *The Word* to children, it is more impactful to read directly from the Bible and not just from their workbooks. This gives them the sense that this is not just any book.
- Establish a comfortable learning space in your classroom for your session.

Supplies you may want to have on hand before beginning the Lesson:

- A Catholic family or children's Bible (go to <u>USCCB</u> for approved Bible translations); on campus, we use the <u>ST. MARY'S PRESS CHILDREN'S BIBLE</u>, a classroom set of which is located in the "CCE" storage cabinet.
- An electronic device with reliable internet access (i.e., an in-class mounted TV or TV cart if a video will be watched as part of the lesson)
- Sticky notes
- Art or any unlined paper
- Crayons, markers and pencils as needed (located in the "CCE" storage and your class bin)
- (Optional): Materials necessary for any of the craft ideas selected during the EXTEND segment of the lesson

OPENING PRAYER

Begin your discovery session today with your learners in prayer. Gather together in your dedicated prayer space and ask the children to quiet their minds and hearts as you pray together. Begin with the <u>SIGN OF THE CROSS</u> and then recite a favorite prayer, choose one of the <u>COMMON PRAYERS BY GRADE</u> or sing the <u>10 COMMANDMENTS SONG</u> together as a class. Conclude by praying the <u>SIGN OF THE CROSS</u>.

ENGAGE

(Mental warm-up)

Say, "Our last Unit focused on how we get to know and love Jesus Christ by praying, going to Mass and celebrating the Sacraments. For the next few lessons, we will learn about how Jesus Christ wants us to live and always do the right thing. Let's listen to one of my favorite passages from the Bible about the rules that God made to keep us safe ... (Read your favorite passage from the Bible about God's commands and explain WHY it is important to you or your favorite passage) ... You know, Jesus teaches us how to obey God's rules."

EXPLORE

(Pre-assessment of faith concepts)

Ask/Discuss, "What can you tell me about God's rules or commands?"

- ❖ As the children share their ideas, have them jot a few down on a sticky note (with their name) and then place them on the wall in your discovery space. (For younger children, you may act as the 'scribe'). Retain the sticky notes to have an understanding of what your learners already know or don't know. This will be helpful as you move along through today's lesson.
- ❖ To facilitate thinking and discussion above, use some of the following prompts: What is a rule? Why do we have rules and why are they so important? Can you name any rules which we all must follow? What are God's rules called? Can you name any of God's rules? How many are there? Who did God give his rules to and how? Where can we read about God's rules? What is God's greatest rule and why? Who teaches us how to follow God's greatest rule and commands? How are we supposed to do that? How does God's greatest rule reflect his commandments? What are the Beatitudes? Who taught us the Beatitudes and where can we find them? Plus, any others you can think of...

EQ "Essential Question"

(This question serves as a cognitive bookend for the children – i.e., it is the targeted "so what" or "take-away" of the lesson being presented. If your learners can articulate a relevant answer to this question by the end of the session, you have done your job. ⊕)

Share and post the physical representation of the lesson's EQ in your classroom (Note: Each classroom is equipped with a set of *EQ posters* corresponding to those posted on the weekly *Lesson Schedule*):

How do God's commands (rules) guide my life?

<u>EXPLAIN</u> (Either as a class guided with your assistance, or working independently - or in groups - have the children review their relevant grade-level material – listed below - and complete the workbook activities, where applicable).

Grade 1: * Alive in Christ, Chapter 14, Pg.195 & 198 (Making Choices) and Pg. 318-319

Grade 2: Alive in Christ, Chapter 7 (God's Commandments)

Grade 3: Alive in Christ, Pg. 320-321, Chapter 3, Pg. 78 (Families Teach Love) and Chapter

13, Pg. 193 (Choose Love)

Grade 4: Alive in Christ, Chapter 3 (God's Commandments) and Chapter 7 (Beatitudes)

Grade 5: Alive in Christ, Chapter 6 (A Life of Virtue)

*NOTE: We are aware that some of our lower Elementary learners have been delayed and are not all reading ready. As the Catechist or class facilitator, your role is to help your learners understand or connect with the *content* of the weekly lesson. You can convey the assigned weekly content from the *Alive in Christ* textbook in a variety of creative ways that are appropriate and effective for your learners and does not involve the class taking turns reading from the student text. Review the content *beforehand*, and feel free to introduce other methods of conveying it or more specifically adapting it to your learners. Some suggested ideas can include the use of any of the following, many of which are available on campus. Just ask a staff member. These are:

- Story Books
- Felt Board Creation Figures to tell the stories
- Role-playing/Skits
- Manipulatives
- Costumes/Dress-up
- Puppets

If you have any questions or need suggestions, be sure to reach out to a staff member. Be sure to also check out the supplemental resources at the end of this Lesson Plan outline for additional ideas.

EXTEND

(Gather back together and invite children to share, in turn, what they learned about God's rules or commands. Affirm positive answers and interject grade-level learning targets into the discussion, where applicable. As a class (or in groups), come up with a list of at least three new things that the children learned, were surprised by or think others should know about how God's Commandments and the Beatitudes taught by Jesus help us to live a life of LOVE. Then, extend the lesson together by completing at least one of the activities provided below).

Lower Elementary (K-2):

- Activity: As a class, in teams or in small groups, complete the <u>HOW WE KEEP IT/HOW</u>
 WE BREAK IT activity.

Upper Elementary (Grades 3-5):

- Video <u>THE MOST IMPORTANT COMMANDMENT</u> or <u>JESUS REVEALS GREATEST</u> COMMANDMENT
- Activities/Games:
 - ➤ Complete the **GREATEST COMMANDMENT** worksheet or
 - ➤ As a class or in small groups **REWRITE THE TEN COMMANDMENTS** or have learners work together to complete the **10 COMMANDMENTS GAMES BOARDS**
 - ▶ Play either the <u>TEN COMMANDMENT CUP KNOCKDOWN</u>, <u>WHAT IS LOVE?</u> or <u>TEN COMMANDMENTS FOLDER game</u>.
 - Prepare and implement the <u>TEN COMMANDMENTS TWO-MINUTE SCRIPTS</u> object lesson.

EVALUATE/REFLECT

Restate today's Essential Question (EQ) – How do God's commands (rules) guide my life?

Summarize what's been learned during this lesson, emphasizing those concepts which may have been missed or misunderstood in the EXPLORE step above.

• Say, "A rule is something that we are asked to follow and do. Rules tell us how to behave and act. In our lives, there are rules for most everything; for keeping us safe, for taking care of things, for organizing our lives, for doing the right thing, for keeping the peace, and for pleasing our families, just to mention a few. God gives us rules too. We call the rules or laws given to us by God, His "commandments." This is one important way in which God shows us just how very much He loves and cares for us. He provides us with His commands in order to keep us safe from harm. The commandments give us a standard, or rule, for living as God wants us to live.

We can learn about God's commandments by spending time reading the Bible. These rules for living are *so* important, that they are actually found in *two* places in the Old Testament of the Bible – in both the Books of *Exodus* (20: 1-17) and *Deuteronomy* (5: 6-21). God gave these *Ten Commandments* (also called the *Decalogue* – remember, 'deca' means 10...) to Moses, a man who He called to be the leader of His people, the Chosen People of Israel. When leading the Israelites out of slavery in Egypt, Moses received ten words or "commands" from God on two stone tablets up on Mount Sinai in the desert. The story of God leading the Israelites out of Egypt with the help of Moses can be found in the Book of *Exodus* (14: 5-29) in the Old Testament.

The Ten Commandments are more than just a summary of laws that God entrusted to Moses' care. They provide us with a standard (or rule) of living that is necessary for loving God and loving others. Love keeps us in right relationship with God and should be the basis of all our decisions about what to do and what not do as Catholic Christians. These commandments are the expression and sign of the Covenant (a sacred promise or

agreement) between God and God's people, and are just as binding today as they were when they were given to Moses over 3,300 years ago. They direct God's People (that's us!) to live out our covenant promises with God.

Jesus was an excellent student in the Hebrew Scriptures of the Old Testament and also knew God's laws well. One day, when he was asked by the scribes of the Temple what the greatest of all of God's Ten Commandments was (i.e., note – this was a trick question meant to trip Jesus up!) Jesus cleverly replied, "You must *love God* with all your heart and with all your mind and with all your strength; and you must *love your neighbor* as you love yourself." (Matthew 12:33) Clear in his teaching, Jesus gave us what is known as <u>The Greatest Commandment</u> of God. When we look carefully at the <u>Greatest Commandment</u>, we quickly realize that it neatly summarizes *all* of the Ten Commandments into two simple rules for living – **Love God** (Commandments 1-3) *and* **Love Neighbor** (Commandments 4-10). Choosing to follow Jesus means loving God with all one's heart and loving one's neighbor as oneself.

Jesus teaches us how to live a fulfilling life. He instructs us through his actions and teachings recorded in the Gospels of the New Testament. Jesus' entire public life was dedicated to healing the sick, feeding the hungry and reaching out to those cast off by society. While the Ten Commandments appear in the Bible in the Old Testament, we find the *Beatitudes* in the Gospel of Matthew in the New Testament (Matthew 5: 1-11). A "Beatitude" is a blessing from Jesus Christ. The *Beatitudes*, taught by Jesus at the *Sermon on the Mount*, fulfill the intent of the Ten Commandments by providing Christians with specific guidelines which will help us find happiness with God in this life and in the next. There are eight Beatitudes that instruct us on how to achieve this blessedness or happiness.

Even though we talked about God's Ten Commandments today, they all point to the most important rule that God gave us through Jesus which is the *Great Commandment of LOVE*. Loving others and treating them as Jesus taught (and did) results in a life of true happiness and freedom. When we freely follow the Ten Commandments, we are living *moral* lives. Being "moral" means we are acting in service of others as God directs us to do... and by always doing what is right and avoiding what is wrong. This is how Jesus teaches us to live a moral life through God's commands."

- Say, "Think back to the passage that I read from the Bible at the beginning of our lesson today. Which of God's rules (or commands), did it refer to, and how do you know?" (Discuss together, affirming appropriate answers and reinforcing lesson teaching points).
- Separately reflect on these questions: How would you explain the Ten
 Commandments (or the Beatitudes) to a friend? Why do you think it is so important to
 follow the rules and guidelines that Jesus taught us about? Explain in your own words
 why LOVE is God's greatest commandment. (After some reflection time, have the
 children turn and share their answers with a partner or the class).

CLOSING PRAYER

Gather together in your dedicated prayer space and ask the children to quiet their minds and hearts as you pray together. Begin with the <u>SIGN OF THE CROSS</u> and recite a favorite prayer,

choose one from the <u>COMMON PRAYERS BY GRADE</u>, sing the <u>GREATEST COMMANDMENT</u>
<u>SONG</u>, choose one of the <u>KID'S PRAYERS TO BE OBEDIENT</u> or ask your learners to offer up their <u>INTERCESSORY INTENTIONS</u>. Conclude by praying the <u>SIGN OF THE CROSS</u>.

BONUS (optional)

• What We Pray: An examination of conscience is a prayerful way to reflect on our actions in light of our Catholic Christian faith. It helps us to identify sins, patterns of sin, or ways in which we are falling short of who God is calling us to be. Once we recognize our sins, or what leads us to sin, we can better ask God for forgiveness and healing. Even if we are not yet old enough to celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation, developing the habit of a daily examination of conscience (perhaps at bedtime along with your prayers) is a beautiful way to guide our words and actions. It can also be an opportunity for us to ask for God's forgiveness daily in our hearts and make a new commitment to do better. This allows us to be more self-aware and intentional about our choices and actions.

One useful way to make an *examination of conscience* is to consider the *Ten Commandments* and how we perhaps have fallen short on God's rules which instruct us love not only Him, but also love others.

Use the <u>KIDS' EXAMEN</u> as a guide to begin this daily practice in your life. Then, write your own prayer to the Holy Spirit asking for God's grace to better follow His commands, memorize the <u>ACT OF CONTRITION</u>, or use the prayer below to ask for help with your choices.

All you blessed Angels and Saints of God, pray for me, a sinner, that I may repent from my sinful ways and that I may be forever united with you. Amen.
