# Unit 4 — How are we called to become missionary disciples of Jesus Christ?

**EQ #2:** How do I follow Jesus Christ? (Part 2-VOCATIONS)

#### CATECHIST PREPARATION

To prepare for this week's lesson:

Prepare your adult heart and mind by watching one of the following videos ahead of the

As a parent, you may also be interested in tips for praying that your children are attentive to whatever Christian vocation they are called to and, should marriage be their path, how to begin praying now for their *future spouse* – yes, starting now. You will find some beautiful reflections at:

The focus of this Unit has been on how we go forth and help to bring about the Kingdom of God right here on earth as Christian disciples. God has a special plan, or *vocation*, for each of our lives. This vocation is designed to use the unique gifts and talents that we were created with in order to cooperate with God in making His Kingdom visible here on earth. When we live lives of virtue that are driven by care, concern and service to others and a desire to share all that we know to be true about our beloved Savior with those who we encounter, we answer our Baptismal call, vocation or mission. By answering the call to become our authentic selves – i.e., the best version of ourselves that God created us to be - we experience *true* happiness in our life. We are defined through our relationship with God and Jesus Christ and not by the world around us. This freedom allows us to grow deeper in that happiness with the Spirit enkindling in our hearts a passion bursting forth to share the source of our joy – i.e., the Gospel message

with others. Through the example of our lives, we follow in Jesus' footsteps and serve as his missionary disciples throughout our earthly journey. This is the perfect time to discuss with the children how their relationships with Jesus have changed this year through all they have learned about their Catholic faith and how they can be open to discerning God's plan (or vocation) for their lives even at this young age.

- Review the appropriate grade-level learning targets from the Catechetical Framework
  for Lifelong Faith Formation (CFLFF) posted on the Catechist website at
  <a href="https://stlaurence.org/the-catechist">https://stlaurence.org/the-catechist</a> for your age group. Keep these targets in mind as
  you prepare for and progress through the weekly lesson, making discussion points based
  upon these specific age-appropriate targets.
- Reflect upon a favorite Scriptural passage that you would like to share with your children about how God has a special plan, or *vocation*, for each of our lives, and explain why the passage is important to or resonates with you. Or, you might like to consider any one of the following:

<u>GENESIS 12: 1-9</u>, <u>EXODUS 3: 1-12</u>, <u>ISAIAH 6: 1-13</u>, <u>1 SAMUEL 3: 1-14</u>, <u>JEREMIAH 1: 4-10</u>, LUKE 1: 26-38, ACTS 9: 1-19

- Create a <u>Prayer Table</u> (or check out <u>How to Make a Prayer Table for Kids</u>) in a special corner of the classroom. Keep a Bible reverently displayed there to be used for readings in your lessons. When proclaiming *The Word* to children, it is more impactful to read directly from the Bible and not just from their workbooks. This gives them the sense that this is not just any book.
- Establish a comfortable learning space in your classroom for your session.

#### Supplies you may want to have on hand before beginning the Lesson:

- A Catholic family or children's Bible (go to <u>USCCB</u> for approved Bible translations); on campus, we use the <u>ST. MARY'S PRESS CHILDREN'S BIBLE</u>, a classroom set of which is located in the "CCE" storage cabinet.
- An electronic device with reliable internet access (i.e., an in-class mounted TV or TV cart if a video will be watched as part of the lesson)
- Sticky notes
- Art or any unlined paper
- Crayons, markers and pencils as needed (located in the "CCE" storage and your class bin)
- (Optional): Materials necessary for any of the craft ideas selected during the EXTEND segment of the lesson

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#### **OPENING PRAYER**

Begin your discovery session today with your learners in prayer. Gather together in your dedicated prayer space and ask the children to quiet their minds and hearts as you pray together. Begin with the <u>SIGN OF THE CROSS</u> and then recite a favorite prayer, choose one of the <u>COMMON PRAYERS BY GRADE</u> or sing the song <u>THEY WILL KNOW WE ARE CHRISTIANS BY</u> OUR LOVE together as a class. Conclude by praying the <u>SIGN OF THE CROSS</u>.

#### **ENGAGE**

#### (Mental warm-up)

Say, "Recently, we have been discussing how we are called to follow Jesus Christ and the expectations of how we live that out. Today, we will talk about how God creates each of us for a special purpose in making His Kingdom known here on earth. Let's listen to one of my favorite passages from the Bible about how God has called people of faith to do His will throughout history... (Read your favorite passage from the Bible about God calling a person of faith into service and explain WHY it is important to you or resonates with you) ... You know, when we answer God's call to serve him in a particular way, we live out the special purpose that He created us for, or our vocation."

### **EXPLORE**

#### (Pre-assessment of faith concepts)

**Ask/Discuss**, "What can you tell me about the different ways we might follow Jesus as we respond to God's call for our Christian vocation?"

- ❖ As the children share their ideas, have them jot a few down on a sticky note (with their name) and then place them on the wall in your discovery space. (For younger children, you may act as the 'scribe'). Retain the sticky notes to have an understanding of what your child or children already know or don't know. This will be helpful as you move along through today's lesson.
- ❖ To facilitate thinking and discussion above, use some of the following prompts: What is a vocation? Is a vocation the same thing as a job? Can I have a job and a vocation? Who decides what our vocation will be? How do we choose/decide our vocation? Can you name some Christian vocations in the Catholic Church? Who are the clergy? The laity? What are vows? What do all Catholic Christian vocations have in common? How do each of the Catholic Christian vocations serve the universal (greater) Church? How does following Jesus and his ways help us live out our special calling, or vocations, as his disciples? Plus, any others you can think of...

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## **EQ** "Essential Question"

(This question serves as a cognitive bookend for the children – i.e., it is the targeted "so what" or "take-away" of the lesson being presented. If your learners can articulate a relevant answer to this question by the end of the session, you have done your job. ⊕)

Share and post the physical representation of the lesson's EQ in your classroom (Note: Each classroom is equipped with a set of *EQ posters* corresponding to those posted on the weekly *Lesson Schedule*):

**EXPLAIN** (These comprehensive lessons on *Vocations* are meant to be presented to your learners. This is not content which should be turned over to the children to be completed alone, as there are certain prompts and activities which need to be navigated through,

content to be explained and topics to be discussed as a class. Staff will prepare copies of all of the related content and activities and provide them in your class bin):

\*NOTE: We are aware that some of our lower Elementary learners have been delayed and are not all reading ready. As the Catechist or class facilitator, your role is to help your learners understand or connect with the *content* of the weekly lesson. You can convey the assigned weekly content from the *Alive in Christ* textbook in a variety of creative ways that are appropriate and effective for your learners and does not involve the class taking turns reading from the student text. Review the content *beforehand*, and feel free to introduce other methods of conveying it or more specifically adapting it to your learners. Some suggested ideas can include the use of any of the following, many of which are available on campus. Just ask a staff member. These are:

- Story Books
- Felt Board Creation Figures to tell the stories
- Role-playing/Skits
- Manipulatives
- Costumes/Dress-up
- Puppets

If you have any questions or need suggestions, be sure to reach out to a staff member. Be sure to also check out the supplemental resources at the end of this Lesson Plan outline for additional ideas.

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## **EXTEND**

(When you have covered the lesson material together invite children to share, in turn, what they learned about *Vocations* and the special ways that God invites us to live out our Baptismal call as Catholic Christians. Affirm positive answers and interject grade-level learning targets into the discussion, where applicable. As a class (or in groups), come up with a list of *at least three new things* that the children learned, were surprised by or think others should know about what a Christian vocation is, and how God has a plan or a special path to

happiness for each of our lives. Then, extend the lesson together by completing <u>at least one</u> of the activities provided below).

## **EVALUATE/REFLECT**

Restate today's Essential Question (EQ) – How do I follow Jesus Christ?

Summarize what's been learned during this lesson, emphasizing those concepts which may have been missed or misunderstood in the EXPLORE step above.

• Say, "Everyone has a vocation. A vocation is God's plan for our lives: the specific purpose for which He made us. Sometimes God calls a person for a particular role. When Jesus was ready to begin his work here on earth, he gathered some friends to help him. Remember them? The first twelve disciples. Jesus said he would make them 'fishers of men' as they helped him spread the Good News of God's love. Not everyone hears God's call as clearly as the first disciples did. Sometimes it takes many years of praying and listening to know our vocations. Our vocation is usually not the same thing as our job or what we do for a living, but rather is our Christian purpose – what God wants for our lives so that we can experience true happiness.

The *mission* of the Church is to be *catholic* (little 'c' = universal), and to welcome every person who wishes to be a disciple of Jesus. Through the *Sacrament of Baptism*, all of us are called to serve others, spread the *Gospel Message* and build up the *Body of Christ* (the Church). All Christian vocations come from God's grace that we receive in Baptism and are important in His plan for humanity. Being part of a family brings many responsibilities and being part of God's family, the Church, brings responsibilities too.

Every baptized Christian has the responsibility to answer the call from God and to choose a *vocation* in which they cooperate with God as He makes His Kingdom visible on earth. *God's Reign* or rule is a world of love, peace and justice that He intends, but we will not fully experience until we reach Heaven. Jesus announced *God's Kingdom* and revealed it in his life and ministry through his actions and words, but God's Kingdom will not be realized here on earth until the end of time when Christ returns in glory. Until then, we are called to help God increase his rule in our lives and in the world.

The Catholic Church recognizes four ways in which people respond to God's call to serve: through the *priesthood*, *consecrated religious life*, *committed single life*, or the *married life*. Consecrated religious life is a state of life in which a person makes *vows*, or solemn promises made to or before God, that help them to grow in holiness. Priests and married couples take vows as well. The Church recognizes that some people may be called to serve God by remaining single. The dedicated single life is also a vocation. Both single and married people are part of the *laity*. All who are baptized are invited to serve the universal Church and the parish community. Baptism sets each of us on a journey of holiness and it is our responsibility to discern (or discover with God's grace) what this path will look like in each of our lives.

You can already use your gifts from God to make a difference. Discerning your *vocation* means learning through prayer, about what God wants you to do. You don't have to do something big and public to make the world a better place. You can do it quietly and privately. As Saint Teresa, the "Little Flower" says, "We can do no great things, only small things with great love." In this way, we too can live our daily lives doing very ordinary things with extraordinary care as many of the great Saints who answered their special call to be disciples of Jesus Christ did themselves on their own paths to holiness.

- Say, "Think back to the passage that I read from the Bible at the beginning of our lesson today. What did it tell us about how God has a special plan for each of our lives and the various ways that he may 'call' us to fulfill that?" (Discuss together, affirming appropriate answers and reinforcing lesson teaching points)
- Separately reflect on these questions: How has my relationship with God/Jesus Christ changed this year by learning more about him and the Catholic faith? How will this special encounter as well as the practices of our Catholic faith I have learned about help me to better understand my own Christian vocation or calling? How can I best serve Jesus Christ at this time in my life? (After some reflection time, have the children turn and share their answers with a partner or the class).

## **CLOSING PRAYER**

Gather together in your dedicated prayer space and ask your learners to quiet their minds and hearts as you pray together. Begin with the <u>SIGN OF THE CROSS</u> and recite a favorite prayer, choose one from the <u>COMMON PRAYERS BY GRADE</u>, pray the <u>PRAYER FOR VOCATIONS</u> or the <u>PRAYER FOR VOCATIONS</u> together as a class, or ask the children to offer up their <u>INTERCESSORY INTENTIONS</u>. Conclude by praying the <u>SIGN OF THE CROSS</u>.

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**BONUS** (optional)

- What We Pray: The <u>Traveling Chalice Program</u> at St. Laurence parish provides an opportunity for vocation visibility, inviting families to pray for vocations in their own homes. Check out the program on the parish website and discuss as a family praying for vocations in this special way. This is a wonderful way for families to build up the universal Church by praying especially for religious vocations.
- Saint of the Week: Saint Paul had a dramatic encounter with the Lord on the road to Damascus (Acts 9: 1-19) which changed the direction of his life forever. He is one of Christianity's most recognized missionary disciples.

Watch one of the videos about Saint Paul's life at <u>GOD'S STORY: PAUL</u> or <u>PAUL'S MINISTRY</u>. Or, with the help of your parents safely use the internet to research interesting facts about Saint Paul's life. Then, reflect upon and answer the following questions:

- What surprised you most about Paul's life before his encounter with the Lord?
- In what way did Paul's encounter with the Lord change the direction of his life (i.e., what became his new *vocation* or mission)?
- ➤ How did Paul live out his vocation or mission? Was that easy to do?
- What can I learn by reflecting upon the life of Saint Paul and how can I live by his example in my own life?


