This Father's Thoughts on the "Our Father" (Part V)

At first glance there's something odd about the shift that takes place at this point in the Lord's Prayer. We just got finished asking that God's will be done, and immediately it sounds as though we're launching into making demands on Him. *Give us some bread!* If we're listening carefully to what we're saying, it can hit our ears as contradictory.

But the petition is phrased as it is—and not in a more passive voice, like "Please, would You give us the bread we need today?"—for good reason. It's a request we make with confidence. We trust that God does provide us with what we need; we make this supplication for our daily bread simultaneously with the humility of knowing that we are dependent on God for our sustenance and the conviction that He indeed will give us what we need. It's both an admission that we are contingent beings—that is to say, that our existence is reliant exclusively on God's good grace; and a familiar address to the paternal God Whose love for us we know with certainty.

It's at this point that the focus of the prayer moves from attentiveness to God for Himself to concern for ourselves, from lifting our gaze up to Him to drawing His favor down to us. And how fitting that as we turn our attention back to ourselves it's with the recognition that we are dependent on Him for the things that keep us alive—or to put it more succinctly: we freely acknowledge that we rely on God for our very lives. Our daily bread is shorthand for the food that keeps our body alive, and by extension all the things of this earth that we need to stay alive and healthy. But the petition also looks ahead to the Bread of Life that God gives us in the Eucharist: the food that nourishes our soul and fills us with the grace we need to respond promptly to the demands of God's will—that will which we have just asked to be done in our lives.

And it reminds us that we are continuously dependent on God to furnish us with these good things: our daily bread, asked for on a daily basis is nothing less than the recognition that every moment is a gift from God. Taken on the spiritual level, when we ask for what we need today, it should remind us that those needs aren't necessarily the same as our needs were yesterday, nor what they might be tomorrow. We are works in progress, always growing, and we ask that God provide us with the grace we need to accomplish the progress we need to make today.

Finally, this petition should call to mind how many people in our world are deprived of their daily bread, how many people don't have enough to meet their needs. If we truly make this supplication with the proper blend of humility and confidence, if we make it as a genuine appeal for God to continue to bless us with His sustaining power, then it should give us the proper perspective on the things of this world. It should recall to our minds that we are stewards of the goods that God has blessed us with, that ultimately they come from God, given freely to us according to His good pleasure, and should be used in a way consistent with His will. If we believe that God is the provider, then we should have the trust and humility to share what we have with others, so that all may receive their daily bread. "Freely you have received," Jesus tells His disciples, "freely you are to give." God's generosity is the basis of our commitment to justice, and our commitment to justice is the fertile field that is well tilled to receive from His generosity.

É a este ponto de concentração que a oração muda a atenção para Deus para nos preocuparmos com nós mesmos, a elevarmos o nosso olhar a Ele para atrairmos a Sua atenção a nós. E como nos serve que quando voltamos a atenção pra nós mesmos com o reconhecimento de dependermos de Deus nas coisas que nos mantem vivos – ou tornar mais simples: livremente reconhecemos de que dependemos de Deus para as nossas próprias vidas. O nosso pão de cada dia é o alimento que nos mantem vivos, e por extensão de todas as coisas deste mundo de que necessitamos para manter o nosso corpo com vida e saudável. Mas a petição tambem olha em frente ao Pão da Vida que Deus nos dá na Eucaristia: o alimento que dá sustento à nossa alma e nos enche da graça que necessitamos para respondermos apropriadamente à vontade de Deus – que será realizado em nossas vidas assim como pedimos.

Vision Health, Part 2

Tips for Healthy Eyes:

Maintain your health – "keep your numbers in check" like blood pressure, cholesterol, blood sugar etc.
Eat a healthy diet and maintain an appropriate weight for your height. Sleep well. Overall good health will help you maintain good eye health

See your eye doctor for regular exams, including dilation of your eyes. Many common eye diseases such as glaucoma, diabetic eye disease and agerelated macular degeneration often have no warning signs. An eye exam is the only way to detect these diseases in their early stages.

Know your family's eye health history, this can help you and your health care provider know if you are at higher risk of eye issues.

Quit smoking or never start. Smoking is as bad for your eyes as it is for the rest of your body.

Wear sunglasses to protect your eyes from the sun's ultraviolet rays. When purchasing sunglasses, look for ones that block out 99 to 100 percent of both UV-A and UV-B radiation.

When playing sports or engaging in other potentially dangerous activities wear protective eyewear such as safety glasses or goggles to protect your eyes.

Wash your hands - keeping your hands clean is important when it comes to your eyes, especially if you're a contact lens wearer. Some germs and bacteria that come from your hands can cause eye infections.

Digital devices and Blue Light - Here are some other tips to help your eyes, if you have a lot of daily "screen time":

Keep your computer screen within 20"-24" of your eyes.

Keep the top of your computer screen slightly below eye level.

Adjust the lighting in the room to minimize glare on the screen.

Blink frequently.

Take a break every 20 minutes to focus on an object 20 feet away for 20 seconds.

If you have any of the following eye problems, don't wait for your next appointment—visit your eye doctor as soon as possible:

Decreased vision

Draining or redness of the eye(s)

Eye pain

Double vision

Floaters (tiny specks that appear to float before your eyes) and/or flashes of light
