"The Unfolding of Your Words Gives Light": A Deep Dive into the Ten Commandments (Part X) . . .

Among the sacrifices that we're all called to offer is the keeping of promises and vows made to God. The most serious of these are the promises one makes at baptism and confirmation. The promise to live according to the principles and demands of the Catholic faith—and to bring up one's child to live this way, is the substance of baptism. Likewise, at Confirmation, the person makes the promise to bear public witness to the Faith and actively work to promote the Gospel and build up the Kingdom of God. The marital vow also is a promise made to God to live in fidelity to one's spouse and to help one another grow in holiness.

These promises and vows bind us to God by a free act of the will: we freely pledge ourselves to meet the expectations of these particular sacraments (or the conditions & terms of whatever the specific promise is that we made). And we exercise our will by fulfilling these promises faithfully and consistently, even when we don't feel like doing so. It's not something to be taken lightly. God takes us seriously, and He takes the promises we make seriously, too. It's nothing less than a matter of personal honor and integrity to follow through on the promises we make. Jesus Himself cautions us about the importance of this in the gospels: "For which of you, intending to build a tower, does not first sit down and estimate the cost to see whether he has enough to complete it? Otherwise, when he has laid a foundation and is not able to finish, all who see it will begin to ridicule him."

Now, this doesn't apply to a rash vow made in the heat of panic. (Although, after things have calmed down, it would be a good idea to think about what we promised God and whether it does indeed point to changes we should make in our life.) But such impetuous vows aren't truly made with the deliberation and understanding necessary for a real act of the will. This is why such careful discernment and preparation is required before we make solemn promises. Someone wanting to be ordained a priest or deacon must go through at least four to six years of concentrated training. Likewise, a person thinking of joining a convent or monastery needs to go through the novitiate: a period of experiment and trial that usually lasts for years before they're permitted to make final vows.

Similarly, the engagement period for a couple preparing for marriage isn't just time spent making arrangements for the wedding day; it's meant to be a season for them to reflect seriously and realistically on the promise they're about to make and whether they truly are ready to fulfill that commitment. This is why it's such an extensive process to get an annulment: the Church takes the marriage vow seriously. If the promise the couple made at the altar was made with full knowledge, mature deliberation, and was a legitimate exercise of their free wills, then the bond remains effective even after the civil divorce. An annulment can only be granted if it's found that there was some deficiency at the time the promise was made.

It's no more trivial a matter to present one's baby for baptism or to approach the Church asking for Confirmation. The promises made in receiving these sacraments are every bit as grave—I might argue, even weightier—than the vows for ordination, religious profession, or Holy Matrimony. They require understanding what is expected of you as a parent or as a mature Christian, accepting the duty that comes with the promise being made, and the full intention of discharging those duties.

A promise made to God with sober reflection, adequate knowledge, and appropriate understanding is binding; if we make those promises lightly or insincerely, or if we choose to abandon them later on down the road, we will be held accountable for those choices when we appear before the Lord. God blessed us with the gift of free will, and He takes us seriously as beings free to exercise our will in choices deliberately made. Every choice we make carries consequences—either for good or for ill—and we are responsible for those consequences. God takes us seriously. We should be just as serious about ourselves. Not to mention that we should take God at least as seriously as He takes us.

Keeping our promises to God, having the firm intention of remaining true to those promises, is how we make a payment of fidelity to the God who remains ever faithful to us, and so live out the Covenant relationship He has entered into with us. It's in this Covenant that we demonstrate our love for God

O Desdobramento de Suas Palavras Dá Luz": Um Mergulho Profundo nos Dez Mandamentos (Parte X)...

Entre os sacrifícios que todos somos chamados a oferecer está o cumprimento das promessas e votos feitos a Deus. As mais sérias delas são as promessas feitas no batismo e na confirmação. A promessa de viver de acordo com os princípios e exigências da fé católica — e criar um filho/a para viver dessa maneira, é a substância do batismo. Da mesma forma, na Confirmação, os jovens fazem a promessa de dar testemunho público da Fé e trabalhar ativamente para promover o Evangelho e construir o Reino de Deus. O voto matrimonial também é uma promessa feita a Deus de viver em fidelidade ao matrimónio e de ajudar-se mutuamente a crescer em santidade.

Essas promessas e votos nos ligam a Deus por um ato livre da vontade: nos comprometemos livremente a atender às expectativas desses sacramentos particulares (ou as condições e termos de qualquer promessa específica que fizemos). E exercitamos a nossa vontade cumprindo essas promessas de forma fiel e consistente, mesmo quando não temos vontade de fazê-lo. Não é algo para ser tomado de ânimo leve. Deus nos leva a sério, e também leva a sério as promessas que fazemos. Não é nada menos do que uma questão de honra e integridade pessoal em cumprir as promessas que fazemos. O próprio Jesus nos adverte sobre a importância disso nos evangelhos: "Pois qual de vocês, pretendendo construir uma torre, não se senta primeiro e calcula o custo para ver se tem o suficiente para completá-la? Caso contrário, quando ele tiver lançado o alicerce e não puder terminar, todos os que o virem começarão a ridicularizá-lo".

Agora, isso não se aplica a um voto precipitado feito no calor do pânico. (Embora, depois que as coisas se acalmassem, seria uma boa ideia pensar sobre o que prometemos a Deus e se isso realmente aponta para mudanças que devemos fazer em nossa vida.) Mas esses votos impetuosos não são realmente feitos com a deliberação e compreensão necessária para um ato real da vontade. É por isso que é necessário tanto discernimento e preparação cuidadosos antes de fazermos promessas solenes. Alguém que deseja ser ordenado sacerdote ou diácono deve passar por pelo menos quatro a seis anos de treinamento concentrado. Da mesma forma, uma pessoa que pensa em ingressar em um convento ou mosteiro precisa passar pelo noviciado: um período de experiência e julgamento que geralmente dura anos antes de poder fazer os votos finais.

Da mesma forma, o período de noivado de um casal que se prepara para o casamento não é apenas o tempo gasto nos preparativos para o dia do casamento; deve ser uma temporada para eles refletirem séria e realisticamente sobre a promessa que estão prestes a fazer e se eles realmente estão prontos para cumprir esse compromisso. É por isso que é um processo tão extenso para obter uma anulação: a Igreja leva a sério o voto matrimonial. Se a promessa que o casal fez no altar foi feita com pleno conhecimento, deliberação madura, e foi um exercício legítimo de seu livre arbítrio, então o vínculo permanece efetivo mesmo após o divórcio civil. A anulação só pode ser concedida se for constatada alguma deficiência no momento em que a promessa foi feita.

Não é mais trivial apresentar a criança para o batismo ou aproximar-se da Igreja pedindo a Confirmação. As promessas feitas ao receber esses sacramentos são tão graves — eu poderia considerar, até mais pesadas — do que os votos de ordenação, profissão religiosa ou Santo Matrimônio. Eles exigem que você entenda o que é esperado de você como pai ou como cristão maduro, aceitando o dever que vem com a promessa feita e a plena intenção de cumprir esses deveres.

Uma promessa feita a Deus com reflexão sóbria, conhecimento adequado e entendimento apropriado é obrigatória; se fizermos essas promessas de forma leviana ou insincera, ou se optarmos por abandoná-las mais tarde, seremos responsaveis por essas escolhas quando comparecermos diante do Senhor. Deus nos abençoou com o dom do livre arbítrio, e Ele nos leva a sério como seres livres para exercer a nossa vontade nas escolhas feitas deliberadamente. Cada escolha que fazemos traz consequências — para o bem ou para o mal — e somos responsáveis por essas consequências. Deus nos leva a sério. Devemos ser tão sérios sobre nós mesmos. Sem mencionar que devemos levar a Deus pelo menos tão a sério quanto Ele nos leva.

Cumprir as nossas promessas a Deus, tendo a firme intenção de permanecer fiéis a essas promessas, é como fazemos um pagamento de fidelidade ao Deus que permanece sempre fiel a nós, e assim vivemos a relação de aliança que Ele estabeleceu conosco. É nesta Aliança que demonstramos o nosso amor por Deus.
