"The Unfolding of Your Words Gives Light": A Deep Dive into the Ten Commandments (Part XLX) . . .

Nobel-peace-prize winner and Soviet dissident Alexsandr Solzhenitsyn once wrote that the line separating good from evil passes through every human heart. This is an incredibly important point to bear in mind when considering the Christian's duty to commit to the truth. The commandment prohibiting us from bearing false witness against our neighbor fundamentally requires us to cultivate a real regard for the reputation of others.

Gossip is a pernicious habit that contaminates our conversations, and unfortunately it's all too common. I find myself slipping into it more often than I care to admit—especially when it comes to bishops and other higher-ups in the Archdiocese. (I don't like having to fess up to this flaw, but if I'm going to commit to the truth, then I have to be honest, don't I?) But gossip drags conversation down to a crass level; on the one hand, it sets ourselves up as being superior to the poor victim of our criticisms, and on the other hand it distorts the subject of our gossip, defaming his/her character. Even if our criticism is true or accurate, it deforms the reality of the matter by creating a disproportionate dynamic of good and bad: we come out smelling like the proverbial roses, while our victim invariably ends up degraded, made to look like a real stinker. And in keeping with our theme, let's be honest: anytime we engage in gossip we exaggerate the situation. We sculpt the story to make ourselves look *just a little bit* better and paint the other guy to seem a little bit (or a lot!) worse than is actually the case.

Respect for other people is a hallmark of humility as well as honesty. It reminds us that we're all works-in-progress, that we all have our flaws and peccadillos (I love that word!); and it reminds us that everyone—including that son-of-a-gun who we love to carve up with a knife and fork anytime we get together with friends—is a person with dignity, loved by God and created in His image and likeness. The Apostle Paul, who himself wasn't immune to verbally tearing other people to shreds, nonetheless gives us good counsel as to how to approach our treatment of others: "Say only the good things that will build up faith," he advises the Ephesians, "that it may impart grace to those who hear."

My own rule-of-thumb (whenever I have the presence of mind to put it into practice) is that if there is a real issue that a person I know has to deal with, I make sure I say it to the person him- or herself and try to say something positive about that person when (s)he isn't in the room. At the bare minimum, never say anything out of the person's earshot that you wouldn't say to his/her face.

Respect for others also demands charity. Always give someone the benefit of a doubt. Never assume the worst possible interpretation of a situation or a person's behavior unless there's a really, *really* sound reason. This doesn't mean being gullible or Pollyannaish, but it does mean allowing that people quite often make good-faith mistakes, and most people do operate from a base of good will. Never jump to negative conclusions without good reason, but always approach the situation from the assumption that the person wants to do what is right, and we should try to help guide him/her into that. This is saying the things that will build the person up in faith.

Boasting and bragging also are offenses against the Eighth Commandment. It inflates our own importance and distorts the truth of who we are by making us look better than we are. And following the same line of thought, flattery of others similarly exaggerates the truth. Especially when we flatter other people to ingratiate ourselves to them or gain something from them, we warp the truth for our own benefit. At its most egregious, when we endorse behavior we know is sinful either by tacit acceptance or overt approval, we betray the truth that God calls all His children to repentance and conversion; instead of imparting grace and helping the person grow in personal holiness, we inhibit his or her progress in sanctity and thwart their eternal destiny, which for everyone is the Beatific Vision of God's perfect presence.

"A Revelação de Suas Palavras Traz Luz": Um Mergulho Profundo nos Dez Mandamentos (Parte XLX) . . .

O ganhador do Prêmio Nobel da Paz e dissidente soviético Alexsandr Solzhenitsyn escreveu certa vez que a linha que separa o bem do mal passa por cada coração humano. Este é um ponto incrivelmente importante a ter em mente ao considerar o dever do cristão de se comprometer com a verdade. O mandamento que nos proíbe de dar falso testemunho contra o próximo exige fundamentalmente que cultivemos uma verdadeira consideração pela reputação dos outros.

A fofoca é um hábito pernicioso que contamina nossas conversas e, infelizmente, é muito comum. Eu me pego escorregando nele com mais frequência do que gostaria de admitir - especialmente quando se trata de bispos e outros superiores na arquidiocese. (Não gosto de ter que confessar essa falha, mas se vou me comprometer com a verdade, tenho que ser honesto, não é?) Mas a fofoca leva a conversa a um nível grosseiro; por um lado, nos colocamos como superiores à pobre vítima de nossas críticas, e por outro, distorcemos o assunto de nossas fofocas, difamando seu caráter. Mesmo que nossa crítica seja verdadeira ou precisa, ela deforma a realidade da questão ao criar uma dinâmica desproporcional entre o bem e o mal: saímos cheirando a rosas proverbiais, enquanto nossa vítima invariavelmente acaba degradada, feita para parecer um verdadeiro fedorento . E, de acordo com o nosso tema, sejamos honestos: sempre que nos envolvemos em fofocas, exageramos a situação. Nós esculpimos a história para parecermos um pouco melhores e pintamos o outro cara para parecer um pouco (ou muito!) Pior do que realmente é o caso.

O respeito pelas outras pessoas é uma marca registrada da humildade, assim como da honestidade. Isso nos lembra que somos todos obras - progresso, que todos temos nossas falhas e pecadilhos (adoro essa palavra!); e nos lembra que todos - incluindo aquele filho da mãe que adoramos cortar com garfo e faca sempre que nos reunimos com amigos - são pessoas dignas, amadas por Deus e criadas à Sua imagem e semelhança . O apóstolo Paulo, que não era imune a despedaçar verbalmente outras pessoas, ainda assim nos dá um bom conselho sobre como abordar nosso tratamento para com os outros: "Dizei apenas as coisas boas que edificarão a fé", ele aconselha os efésios. , "para que dê graça aos que ouvem".

Minha própria regra de ouro (sempre que tenho a presença de espírito para colocá-la em prática) é que, se houver um problema real com o qual uma pessoa que conheço tenha que lidar, certifique-se de dizê-lo à pessoa. ou ela mesma, e tente dizer algo positivo sobre essa pessoa quando ela não estiver na sala. No mínimo, nunca diga nada fora do alcance da voz da pessoa que você não diria na cara dela.

O respeito pelos outros exige também a caridade. Sempre dê a alguém o benefício da dúvida. Nunca assuma a pior interpretação possível de uma situação ou comportamento de uma pessoa, a menos que haja uma razão muito, muito sólida. Isso não significa ser ingênuo ou polido, mas significa permitir que as pessoas frequentemente cometam erros de boa fé, e a maioria das pessoas opera com base na boa vontade. Nunca tire conclusões negativas sem um bom motivo, mas sempre aborde a situação partindo do pressuposto de que a pessoa quer fazer o que é certo, e devemos tentar ajudá-la a fazer isso. Isso é dizer as coisas que irão edificar a pessoa na fé.

Vangloriar-se e gabar-se também são ofensas ao Oitavo Mandamento. Aumenta nossa própria importância e distorce a verdade de quem somos, fazendo-nos parecer melhores do que somos. E seguindo a mesma linha de pensamento, a bajulação dos outros exagera da mesma forma a verdade. Especialmente quando lisonjeamos outras pessoas para cair nas boas graças delas ou ganhar algo delas, distorcemos a verdade para nosso próprio benefício. Em sua forma mais flagrante, quando endossamos um comportamento que sabemos ser pecaminoso, seja por aceitação tácita ou aprovação aberta, traímos a verdade de que Deus chama todos os Seus filhos ao arrependimento e à conversão; em vez de conceder a graça e ajudar a pessoa a crescer na santidade pessoal, inibimos o seu progresso na santidade e frustramos o seu destino eterno, que para todos é a Visão Beatífica da presença perfeita de Deus.
