

The Twenty-eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Reading 1 IS 25:6-10A

On this mountain the LORD of hosts will provide for all peoples a feast of rich food and choice wines, juicy, rich food and pure, choice wines. On this mountain he will destroy the veil that veils all peoples, the web that is woven over all nations; he will destroy death forever. The Lord GOD will wipe away the tears from every face; the reproach of his people he will remove from the whole earth; for the LORD has spoken. On that day it will be said: "Behold our God, to whom we looked to save us! This is the LORD for whom we looked; let us rejoice and be glad that he has saved us!" For the hand of the LORD will rest on this mountain.

Reading 2 PHIL 4:12-14, 19-20

Brothers and sisters: I know how to live in humble circumstances; I know also how to live with abundance. In every circumstance and in all things I have learned the secret of being well fed and of going hungry, of living in abundance and of being in need. I can do all things in him who strengthens me. Still, it was kind of you to share in my distress.

My God will fully supply whatever you need, in accord with his glorious riches in Christ Jesus. To our God and Father, glory forever and ever. Amen.

Gospel MT 22:1-14

Jesus again in reply spoke to the chief priests and elders of the people in parables, saying, "The kingdom of heaven may be likened to a king who gave a wedding feast for his son. He dispatched his servants to summon the invited guests to the feast, but they refused to come. A second time he sent other servants, saying, 'Tell those invited: "Behold, I have prepared my banquet, my calves and fattened cattle are killed, and everything is ready; come to the feast." Some ignored the invitation and went away, one to his farm, another to his business. The rest laid hold of his servants, mistreated them, and killed them. The king was enraged and sent his troops, destroyed those murderers, and burned their city. Then he said to his servants, 'The feast is ready, but those who were invited were not worthy to come. Go out, therefore, into the main roads and invite to the feast whomever you find.' The servants went out into the streets and gathered all they found, bad and good alike, and the hall was filled with guests. But when the king came in to meet the guests, he saw a man there not dressed in a wedding garment. The king said to him, 'My friend, how is it that you came in here without a wedding garment?' But he was reduced to silence. Then the king said to his attendants, 'Bind his hands and feet, and cast him into the darkness outside, where there will be wailing and grinding of teeth.' But when the king came in to meet the guests, he saw a man there not dressed in a wedding garment. The king said to him, 'My friend, how is it that you came in here without a wedding garment?' But he was reduced to silence. Matthew 22:12

This is the third week of reading about Jesus' attack on the Jewish religious leaders while in Jerusalem on his way to his cross.

Jesus tells them a parable about a wedding feast where a king gives a banquet but all the invited dignitaries refuse the invitation. The king then sends his servants into the streets to bring in whomever they find, "good and bad alike." The shorter option on this reading ends here but the longer includes a rather jarring ending: the king sees a man not dressed in a wedding garment and has him thrown out!

What? For not having a wedding garment, for not being properly adorned? Well, perhaps for not going to the effort beforehand to accept the invitation. Earlier in Matthew, in the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus says that "Not everyone who says to me 'Lord, Lord,' will get into the Kingdom of Heaven but the one who does the will of my Father in heaven" (MT 7:21). Let us not stop short at praising God in word but continue on to build the Kingdom of Heaven.



WAYNE MELONSON PLAQUE DEDICATION

This past Tuesday, Oct. 6, St. Therese Catholic Academy dedicated a plaque in memory of beloved former principal Wayne Melonson, who died in October 2017. Oct. 6 was his birthday. The plaque is located north of the church's west entrance.

Wayne had been part of St. Therese School (its former name) most of his life. He was a student, graduating with the Class of 1964. He became its first lay principal and also was a teacher, coach and St. Therese parishioner for more than 40 years. He graduated from O'Dea High School and Seattle University and was a U.S. Army veteran. Wayne's leadership is honored with STCA's Wayne J. Melonson Legacy Scholarship Fund and the Wayne J. Melonson Academic Excellence Award given to 8th Grade valedictorian(s). We join with the Melonson Family in honoring his memory.

CRUNCH TIME

Yes, it is crunch time with the St. Edward's Conference reorganization still in progress. We helped a total of 45 neighbors in September, providing \$16,672 for rent and housing needs, and \$1,300 for other benefits to the neighbors, for a total of \$17,972.

We received \$2,469.35 from the parish (thank you very much!) and \$10,000 from our Central Council for a total of \$12,469.35. The result is that after using our savings account, what we have left is about equal to our accounts payable.

We are hoping that our neighbors can benefit from the King County \$41 million Eviction and Rental Assistance program financed through the federal Cares Act - a portion of which is being administered through our Central office. But the awarding of benefits is very complicated and starts out with a lottery and difficult requirements which some of our neighbors, despite their needs, will not be able to meet. It also requires considerable cooperation from landlords.

We are uncertain how the program will help our neighbors, but we are providing them information so they can apply. In the meantime we may have to delay response to neighbors' requests until we get more funds. If you can assist us, you can donate by sending your gift to Sr. Kathleen - SVdP, 3514 E. On a brighter note, the parish food contributions (information on how to make contributions pg. 5) continue to be very good. In addition, Leschi Market recently made a donation of frozen meat and chicken to the Food Bank at St. Mary's that will provide nearly 400 servings for distribution to those who visit the Food Bank.

Reflection from October 2, 2020 Feast of St. Therese

Greetings, St. Therese Family!

This week has invited us all to reflect on our SLE calling us to be faith-filled servant-leaders who know and understand Catholic teachings and prayers. As a Catholic school, our faith and prayers are central to who we are, what we do, and how we do it. The Catholic Church has a rich history in pursuing understanding and connections with God through our intellectual pursuit of knowledge as well as spiritual and liturgical practices. The Eucharist - one of the seven sacraments of the Catholic



Church - is celebrated each week "in memory" of Jesus' Last Supper. In our celebration of the Mass, we praise and thank God, listen and reflect on God's Word through the readings and homily, offer our prayers, and receive our spiritual nourishment in the form of the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ. While different Christian denominations offer different teachings on the Eucharist and what happens in this moment of our liturgies, this practice is the source and summit of the Catholic faith. We had four students who received their "First Communion" this past weekend and entered more fully into their faith journeys as Catholics. St. Augustine encouraged us to truly embrace the "We are what we eat" mentality with the Eucharist. As we consume the precious Body and Blood of Jesus, our call is not simply to bask in this union, but rather, to be nourished by it and to go out and BE CHRIST to the world. Congratulations to Cori, Levi, Kaemon, and Ane for taking that big spiritual step on their Catholic faith journeys!

We also had the privilege of living out our faith and the teachings and prayers of the Catholic Church this week by learning about and celebrating the feast day of our patron, St. Therese of Lisieux. St. Therese provides a beautiful example to us of simple living and embracing the life God has blessed us with to the fullest. She experienced great suffering from tuberculosis, but also great joy in the union that provided her with Christ who suffered deeply in his days on earth. St. Therese earned the nickname, "The Little Flower" by practicing her "Little Way" spirituality and writing down her way of life in a spiritual autobiography, The Story of a Soul. As a community and as individuals, we are all invited to imitate her example of holiness by practicing all of the little things we do in life with great love. In her words, "Nothing is small in the eyes of God. Do all that you do with great love." Our children truly lived this out this week as the Kindergarteners offered prayers for those in need in a display in their classroom and our preschoolers made and shared flowers and words of wisdom from St. Therese to all on campus personnel! They also made a precious video highlighting who our patron is and why she is a good model for us to follow. Finally, our 7th Graders gathered on campus to lead us in a liturgy to celebrate the feast. All in all, it was a great week of honoring our patron, living out our SLE, and practicing what we preach!

We even got some "Hail Mary" handwashing in to link sanitizing our hands and cleansing our souls!
