An Advent Message from Fr. Woody

Dear friends,

Am I the only one who's looking forward to celebrating Advent? This year, because Christmas falls on a Monday, we will have the shortest Advent possible: three weeks plus about $\frac{1}{2}$ of a day. (On Sunday, December 24th, we will have morning Masses to celebrate the 4th Sunday of Advent, then QUICKLY redecorate our churches in time for the first Christmas Mass, the Vigil, at 4:30 PM.) Advent is one of the richest, most beautiful seasons in our worship calendar, and it's the one that's hardest for folks who aren't steeped in Catholic sensibility and culture to understand and appreciate, especially here in North America. It's a season of joyful expectation and hope-filled WAITING as we prepare for the BEGINNING of the Christmas season at sundown on December 24th. Think of it as the darkness right before dawn, or like the gift-wrapped box sitting under your tree with a big "Do Not Open Until Christmas" sticker taunting and tantalizing you with expectant mystery. In some ways, it's the most Jewish season of our Catholic prayer life, as we pray with them in hope and longing for the coming of the Messiah. Most of all, and this is the hard part, it's decidedly and emphatically **NOT CHRISTMAS YET!** This is almost impossible to pull off when we're surrounded by institutions that don't have or celebrate Advent, and who therefore swamp the entire season with a premature celebration of Christmas. (Christmas-themed decorations and music everywhere, Christmas specials on radio and TV, office and home Christmas parties, and even Christmas-themed programming in other churches, even, I'm embarrassed to acknowledge, some "Catholic" institutions. It's as if even WE don't understand or embrace the spirit of Advent!)

I'm not just on a rant here. There ARE some things we can do to try to build up, nurture and sustain an Advent spirit in our lives and homes. Home Advent wreaths are a great place to start. They make fabulous dinner-table centerpieces, and can serve as the focus for family prayer during this holy season. A home Advent wreath doesn't have to be very complicated. Just set a few evergreen twigs or branches in the middle of your table, more-or-less in a circle, and set 4 pillar candles around that circle. They don't even HAVE to be purple. If you do this, then it's pretty simple to light the appropriate number of candles on that wreath during December on those likely-rare occasions when your whole family is gathered for a meal, as a seasonally special way of praying before meals. Another custom I saw down at my Catholic parish school in Vancouver was called "straws in the manger". A simple crib-like basket is set in your living room or den. Throughout Advent, family members, especially little ones, can write an act of kindness or prayer or service down on a narrow strip of yellow paper, then lay it in the basket when it's accomplished. The idea is that the baby Jesus is on the way, and we want to make his manger bed soft and comfortable for him in time for Christmas by filling it up with "straw".

I'm pretty hard core about Advent. It really IS my favorite season of the Church year. So . . . I'd like to ask you in advance for your understanding when I turn down most of the invitations I get to come and participate in "Christmas" events that happen DURING Advent. In December, my whole spiritual life revolves around WAITING for Christmas, so if I choose to avoid your concert, party or other "Christmas" stuff during December, try to remember that I still love you, and we can get together some other time.





CCS/CHS 2023 APPEAL FOR THE POOR

THANK YOU TO PARISHES AND SUPPORTERS WHO SHARE THE LIGHT OF HOPE

WITH TENS OF THOUSANDS OF NEIGHBORS SERVED BY 190 CCS/CHS PROGRAMS IN WESTERN WASHINGTON

2023 CCS/CHS KING COUNTY PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

- This fall, CCS/CHS opened St. Margaret's Place in Shoreline, 100 new units of Permanent Supportive Housing with 24/7 onsite case-management services for residents transitioning from chronic homelessness to life in the community.
- At our Federal Way and Kent Day Centers, the Engage Health program now addresses the crucial health needs of people living unsheltered in South King County thanks to a new partnership with Harborview Medical Center and Seattle/King County Public Health agencies.
- In King County, Volunteer (Chore) Services (VS) volunteers provide more than 1,000 hours of service every month to low-income older adults and adults living with disabilities who need a little help from others to remain safe and independent in their own homes. VS coordinators do thorough background checks and interviews to ensure good partners for our vulnerable neighbors.
- The Kinship Program will serve approximately 300 kinship families (family members raising family members) this year, with nearly 200 families receiving financial assistance with rent, utilities, and basic needs. Kinship caregivers offer children the chance to stay connected with their family, culture, neighborhood, and school in a home where they are loved and wanted.
- Junction Point shelter moved to a 49-unit Pallet Shelter in North Seattle, offering safe, non-congregate shelter to individuals and couples over 50 years of age experiencing homelessness. Services include electricity, hot meals, showers, laundry facilities, and housing case management.
- KC Housing and Essential Needs (HEN) program provides rent and utility assistance, hygiene and cleaning supplies, and ORCA Lift cards to 2,000 adults unable to work due to disability.
- KC opened its new Transportation and Essential Needs (TEN) program, in Phoenix House (the former Lazarus Center) on Rainier Avenue, providing services that include ORCA Lift cards and essential needs for 1200 + low-income adults with disabilities.
- New Bethlehem Shelter and Day Programs offer transitional housing and other services to families experiencing homelessness on the East Side. Last year, New Beth welcomed 56 families to their transitional shelter, and 38 are now in their own homes.
- The Josephinum, CCS/CHS most extensive low-income housing program, welcomed guests from the Seattle Archdiocese and Providence Healthcare for Days of Caring, structured immersion experiences designed to bring staff into the worlds of the people we serve.









Parol Workshop is Back!

The Joint Simbang Gabi Committees of St. Therese and St. Joseph Parishes will be hosting a parol workshop this Sunday, **Dec. 10th** in between the Masses from 9:30am-11:30 in the social hall at St. Therese. Filipino *parols* (star lanterns) symbolize the victory of light over darkness, as well as hope and goodwill. In the Philippines, they can be seen hanging on windows of houses and along streets during the Advent and Christmas season to symbolize that they are waiting for the arrival of the Baby Jesus. At St. Therese, parols have been a part of our Simbang Gabi celebrations since 1998.

All are welcome – grown ups and kids alike – to come and make your own unique parol. Supplies will be provided, and friendly folks from both committees will be there to help and coach! Free will donation of \$5.00 is encouraged.
