"DEACON KEITH'S" (PASTOR'S) PAGE

THE THREE MINISTRIES OF THE DIACONATE:

One of the many fruits of the Second Vatican Council was the reinstatement of the permanent diaconate in the Catholic Church. For many centuries the ordination of married men to this role within the Church had been eliminated. The consideration of reinstating of the permanent diaconate was brought to the Council by the bishops in Germany. In post-World War II reflection, they thought that having ordained men living day-to-day lives would have provided a voice contrary to the rise of fascism that over whelmed the country, leading to the world war.

Like the other proposals taken up by the Second Vatican Council, the Council fathers looked back to the biblical revelation of the diaconate along with the tradition of the diaconate in the early centuries of the Church. From that scholarship, three particular ministries became clear and are the foundation for the role of the deacon within the Church today. Those ministries are: the deacon as minister of the Word, the deacon as minister at the liturgy, and the deacon as minister of charity and justice.

The role of the deacon to proclaim the Gospel at Mass is the core as evangelizer and teacher. During the ordination rite, with a bible being held by both the Bishop and the newly ordained deacon, the Bishop says, "Receive the Gospel of Christ, whose herald you have become. Believe what you read, teach what you believe, and practice what you teach." In accepting that duty, the deacon is given the honor to proclaim the Gospel, preach at Mass, educate the laity, and "transmit the Word in his professional life either explicitly or merely by active presence in places where public opinion is formed and ethical norms are applied."

The deacon provides a unique role as a member of the community and a member of the clergy as a minister of the liturgy. During the Eucharistic celebration, the deacon is called to participate in the penitential rite, the proclamation of the Word, the general intercessions, presentation of the offering to the priest, proclaiming the handshake of peace and the sending. Each of these points of the Mass are places of the community involvement. Also, it is through the deacon's other ministries as minister of the Word, and minister of charity and justice that the deacon spiritually brings the community with him to the altar.

Without the ministry of charity and justice the Church's ministries of word and liturgy would be severely deficient. Saint Pope John Paul II affirms: "This is at the very heart of the diaconate to which you have been called: to be a servant of the mysteries of Christ and, at one and the same time, to be a servant of your brothers and sisters. That these two dimensions are inseparably joined together in one reality shows the important nature of the ministry which is by your ordination." The program leader of our formation class always said, "If you are not ministering for charity and justice within the community, you should not serve on the altar."

It is such an honor to serve the community – the Church – in these three ministries. FATHER BERNARDIN'S HOMILY (AUGUST 23, 2020)

WHO DO YOU SAY THAT I AM? (21st Sunday in Ordinary Time)

We all need to know Jesus first hand. Our life here below and our eternal salvation depends on how we answer this very important question. It is easy to say what other people say about Jesus, but your own answer and what you do about it **is what matters**.

The 1st reading takes us back 700 years before Christ. King Hezekiah, a good king, reigned in Judah. Shebna was the second most powerful man in the court of the King. Shebna took advantage of his position by abusing and cheating those under his authority. He abused that power by taking advantage of perks like the royal chariots and even making a beautiful carved tomb for himself. God said, through the prophet Isaiah, that Shebna would be replaced by a person with integrity. His replacement was **Eliakim** who ruled with fairness and honesty. God wanted someone who would exercise that authority with fatherly concern and compassion, not self-promotion, domination, or greed. The master of the house should know the way God uses His authority, to serve His people. The characteristics God wanted in Eliakim or every good leader are described in the first reading and that is what we see in every pope as they sit in the chair of Saint Peter.

- -I will clothe him with Your robe, and gird him with Your sash, and give over to him Your authority
- -He shall be a father (pope, papa, Daddy) to the inhabitants of Jerusalem and to the house of Judah.
- -He has the key of the house of David. When he opens, no one shall shut, and when he shuts, no one shall open.
- -The pope is fixed like a peg in Rome; a place of honor for the whole family of God (the whole Catholic Church)

The one reason we have this reading today is because of the reference to the key of the House of David. Keys are symbols of authority.

Peter is chosen by Jesus as the 1st Pope:

In today's Gospel, Jesus asks His Apostles a very important question:

Who do people say that the Son of Man is? Surprisingly, some people don't know Jesus very well. They confuse Him with other important people such as Elijah, Jeremiah or one of the prophets.

Who do you say that I am? Peter hit the nail on the head. "You are the Christ, the son of the living God. We need to know Jesus first hand. Our salvation depends by how we know Jesus in person, not through some ideas or hearsay. The main question is who is Jesus for you and what you do about it? Do you listen to Him? Do you love Him and follow Him wherever He leads you?

Jesus chose Peter as the first pope: "You are Peter, and upon this rock I will build my Church, and the gates of the netherworld shall not prevail against it." Jesus meant He was not simply building on Peter's confession of faith, but Peter would be the foundation of His Church and his position in the Church would last even after Peter was long gone. We, as Catholics, see the leadership of Peter continuing in his successors. The symbolic key which Jesus gave Peter would be passed along to the next person to follow Peter and then the next person and so on as the succession of papacy in Rome.

The Church has been under attack by the powers of evil in all its forms. The persecution of the Church is real in history and is very present today. Martyrs are the results of the persecution. We need to stand with Jesus and His successors. There are attacks from outside of the Church and within the Church. The same things do happen in a family. But we have the guarantee from Jesus that evil will never prevail against the Church. Please stay in the Church. Away from the Church, you are weak and vulnerable.

I will give you the keys to the kingdom of Heaven. Whatever you bind on earth shall be bound in Heaven; and whatever you loose on earth shall be loosed in Heaven: If we want to be saved, we need to listen to the Church, the tradition of the Church. The sacraments we receive from the Church are to help us keep on the right path and so to enter Heaven.

You don't give your keys to anybody but to those you love and trust. Jesus gave the key to Saint Peter and his successors. We are all called to listen and obey them. They are invested with the authority to open or close the door of Heaven for us.

8:30 am MASS ATTENDEES


Beginning MONDAY, August 17th, Parishioners attending 8:30 am Mass need to arrive AFTER 8:15 am.
