RECENT MESSAGE OF THE QUEEN OF PEACE:

Dear Parishioners, there is an African wisdom saying that the mouth of the old man or woman may be shaking but it says the truth. It is also said that those you love, you warn. Since June 24th 1981, the Blessed Virgin Mary has been giving messages via visionaries to every human being on the planet. These messages are full of wisdom that is much greater than any wise man or woman who ever lived on earth. She is the Mother of Jesus, she lives in Heaven and she really loves all of us. She said to all of us through visionaries that "if you knew how much I love you, you would cry of joy".

Fr. Bernardin's Homily (February 27, 2022)



8TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME:

"A person's speech discloses the bent of his mind" says the First Reading. This reminds us that language is a wonderful gift God gave to us humans. It allows us to communicate, to explain our ideas...

Whether we like it or not, our language shows whether we are educated or not. It usually indicates which country we are from, and, within the country, even which part. It tells about our age and sex, our temperament, our profession, our honesty, our moral values and our outlook on life. Our language should be the language of the heart, honestly reflecting our best selves. However, not all language is honest and reflects the real person. We are constantly exposed, for example, to the multifaceted language of diplomacy and the deceptive language of the slick commercial.

Jesus said that it is possible to notice a tiny splinter of wood in another person's eye while being unaware of a plank in one's eye.

It is a fact that we can be unaware of certain facts about ourselves, which are perfectly clear to anyone who has ever lived in the same house with us or worked in the same office. When we talk behind the back about other people; we underline their mistakes, at the same time, we claim to be innocent and perfect... It is a well known fact that nothing so blinds us to our own faults as a preoccupation with the faults of others. If you want to reform the world, to make things better, don't use the wrong way which begins by trying to reform others instead of reforming yourselves. It is only when you recognize your faults, you can confess them, and you can change your habits.

As Christians, we have a responsibility to show concern for others. But how can we be a guide to others if we are blind ourselves? The best thing we can do is not to guide simply by correcting, but by example. By walking the right road ourselves and being a true friend. That is the way to guide others. Each man must judge himself before he can judge or teach his neighbor.

A blind cannot lead another blind. If both are blind, there will be no progress, in other words, no man can teach his neighbor unless he himself has already learned the lesson he wishes to teach to him. The word "Hypocrite" means one who pretends to be what he is not in reality. In other words, most, if not all of us are to some degree, hypocrites. We pretend to be what we are not, but should be. We pretend to be producing good fruit: figs and grapes, whereas, we are only thorn bushes and brambles, which produce nothing but harmful thorns which sting and poison ourselves and our neighbors. Good works of charity and mercy will proceed from the man who is solidly grounded in virtue, while evil deeds proceed from the man who has lived and is living an evil life.

Why these words? These words are put before us today for there are few amongst us who do not need to be reminded of their lesson. We are all so prone to see the neighbor's faults and so inclined to cover up or deny our own, while ourselves are blind to our own faults. We can all criticize minor defects in our neighbor's Christian behavior while our own Christian way of living is giving far greater scandal.

Jesus knows our hearts. Imagine how many times in the past week have I criticized my fellow man without knowing all, or any, perhaps, of the true facts. How often have I honestly examined my own conscience to see my own more serious defects and try to correct them?

Brothers and sisters, when our Lord spoke these words, His purpose and intention was not to condemn His hearers, He wanted to open our hearts so that we should change for the better and learn to live with our neighbor's faults, and do all in power to correct our own. Let us remember that we are all guilty of rash judgement and unjustified criticism. Let us turn this criticism around to us and judge ourselves honestly and sincerely. Then we shall find ourselves becoming more Christian, and, therefore, more charitable towards our neighbor and less critical of the faults of others. **Amen.**



We will be ever happy to be together again for Religious Education on Sunday, February 27. On February 13 we ended our last session with a St. Valentine celebration, which began with a brief history of St. Valentine, and then one of our students and a teacher passed out spiritual Valentine cards and individually wrapped candy. Our children then vacationed on their three-day Presidents' Day holiday.

ST. AGNES OF BOHEMIA will be our honored saint this week on her designated Feast Day, March 2. Actually, St. Agnes was a medieval princess born in Prague in the early 1200's. She was the daughter of King Ottokar of Bohemia, which made her a descendant of St. Ludmila and St. Wenceslaus, who were both patron saints of Bohemia. Her mother Constance of Hungary was the sister of King Andrew of Hungary, which meant that Agnes was also the first cousin of St. Elizabeth of Hungary. At the early age of three, Agnes was placed under the care of St. Hedwig of Andechs, who was the wife of Duke Henry of Silesia, who sent her to be educated in a monastery with a community of nuns, and later she was educated in a priory.

Due to her royal status, Princess Agnes always received a superior education, and she was constantly a pawn in many an arranged marriage. Again, at the young age of three, Princess Agnes was betrothed to Boleslaus, and when he died, she was then engaged at eight years of age to Prince Henry, son of Emperor Frederick II, King of Sicily. Later, Prince Henry became the King of Germany, and despite his betrothal to Princess Agnes for six years, he married the daughter of Duke Leopold VI Babenberg of Austria. As a result, the father of Agnes went to war with the Babenbergs in 1226. Needless to say, Princess Agnes was again engaged by King Ottokar to King Henry III of England, but Agnes wrote to Pope Gregory IX asking him to prevent this marriage because she wanted to dedicate herself to Christ. Pope Gregory IX interceded for Agnes, and she then devoted herself to prayer, spiritual works, and the service of God in the sanctuary of the cloister.

In 1232, Agnes founded the Hospital of St. Francis on land donated by her brother King Wenceslaus of Bohemia. In addition, she built two friary complexes for the Franciscan friars, which were attached to this hospital. Through them, Agnes began correspondence with St. Clare of Assisi. Then in 1234, Agnes herself became a nun of the Franciscan Poor Clares. Later in 1238, Sister Agnes organized a new military order, which was dedicated primarily to nursing and was known as the Knights of the Cross with the Red Star, who followed the rules of St. Augustine. It was later that Sister Agnes handed all the authority of this hospital to the monastic knights. As a nun, even when she was an abbess, Sister Agnes always cooked for and mended clothes for lepers and the poor. Eventually hundred of girls from the nobility followed the lead of Sister Agnes, who saw something more valuable than becoming a queen or empress, because becoming a St. Clare nun meant that one would follow a unique pathway to God.

After having spent forty-four years as a Poor Clare, Sister Agnes died on March 6,1282. Pope John Paul II canonized St. Agnes on November 12,1989. The canonization of St. Agnes of Bohemia was based on her practice of the Christian virtues of faith, hope, and charity to an extraordinary degree. Christians from all around the world venerate St. Agnes. In 2011, on the 800th anniversary of her birth, St Agnes was honored as being the Saint of the Overthrow of Communism. On this anniversary, the National Gallery in Prague organized a special exhibition called "St. Agnes of Bohemia--Princess and Nun" at the Convent of St. Agnes.

The human heart has a desire for eternity, because eternal beauty makes people live in happiness. However, human heart can change. When human heart changes, love also changes at



Only God never changes because God is eternal. Therefore, when people fall in love with God, and this God has already loved people before the creation of the world, since God is eternal, loving others in God thus is also eternal. In short, entrusting lives in the hands of God, because God loves people eternally, life will enter eternity as a result.

"In him was life, and the life was the light of humans," writes the evangelist.

"Life" (zōē) is one of the central themes of John's gospel. The theology of John emphasizes the presence of true life, and only eternal life is true life; what can be passing away is only the

From the aspect of eternity, before the beginning of time, the Word is already life. This life cannot be destroyed by all means even if Jesus is crucified. The devil's power cannot destroy his eternal life as Jesus says: "For this reason the Father loves me, because I lay down my life, that I may take it again." (John 10:17)

Here, the "life" that Jesus lay down in Greek is "psyche" that points to earthly life. It then can be given up for the beloved people as a good shepherd (tithēmi; see if 10:10, 11, 15, 17-18).

What is taken back is not the earthly "psyche" but true life, that is eternal life (zōē). Therefore, the resurrection of Jesus is not the restoration of the life before death, but the transformation of the entire life, from the earthly to the eternal. Human life is only satisfied by the eternal God.

In front of eternal life, everything can be let go.

As conditions with the pandemic have improved. **Bishop Jaime Soto** and the Office of Worship would like to remind the faithful of the protocols in place for attending Mass in the Diocese of Sacramento. These protocols provide safe and healthy environments for our communities and are simple, sensible acts of charity:

Parishioners

- Parishioners are encouraged to wear masks while indoors regardless of one's vaccination status.
- Refrain from physical contact outside of one's household during the Exchange of the Sign of Peace.
- Individuals are not obligated to attend the Eucharist on Sunday or other obligatory solemnities if they are sick, have a vulnerable health condition, are caring for someone with a vulnerable health condition, or have other serious reasons (Canon 1245; Catechism of the Catholic Church, 2181).
- All those eligible to receive vaccinations are encouraged to do so. Anyone with medical concerns should consult their doctor.

Holy Communion

- All ministers of Holy Communion must wear masks when distributing Communion to the faithful.
- During the distribution of Communion priests, deacons, and extraordinary ministers should have sanitizer available for use when needed.
- For Communion, the distribution of the cup is still suspended.
