

Ascension of the Lord

Thoughts from Fr. Scott

Greetings and welcome back. I pray everyone is doing well and anxiously awaiting the day when things completely open up again. These days have been and continue to be filled with great anxiety and it seems an abundance of fear. We, the faithful of the Lord Jesus, should be more settled than most. Through prayer and faith, we can trust in the loving mercy of God and realize these days are not for panic. Rather, they are for us to witness to the Hope that is Christ Jesus. Being people of faith in these days is most important but we also need to be people of reason and common sense. As we act with faith and use our reason we will be able to navigate these days safely and with great trust in God's will for us.

Certainly you are aware our Archbishop, and all the Bishops of Michigan, issued directives about resuming Masses. You can find the directives on the Archdiocesan website www.aod.org if you desire to read them. We will follow the directives and are able to resume Masses here at Lakes this weekend. Our weekend liturgical schedule will remain the same 5 p.m. on Saturday and 8:00 a.m., 9:30 a.m., 11:00 a.m. and 12:30 p.m. on Sunday. We are able to accommodate about 250 people at any one time in the Church so as to keep proper social distance. Also, we have returned to our regularly scheduled daily Mass Monday through Friday at 8:15 a.m. We will be live-streaming the 5 p.m. and 9:30 a.m. Masses until further notice. You can watch the Masses on Facebook or our website www.ollonline.org and they are posted there to watch at any time. If you are not feeling well, have a compromised immune system, or simply are not comfortable with coming out to a public gathering at this time, I ask you to stay home. The Archbishop has given everyone in the Archdiocese a dispensation from our obligation to attend Mass through September 6, 2020. This means you should not "push it" and try to attend in person if you feel uneasy in any way. It also means you absolutely should not use Mass attendance as a means of

"meeting your neighbor just because." Coming for the liturgy at this time is about hearing the Word of God and receiving Him in the Eucharist for the salvation of your soul. Again, coming to Mass or not during this time is about loving God and neighbor; meaning your eternal salvation. It is not about using your faith to prove political points of view or to take a stand one way or another.

Just a few practical notes about our return to public worship. In addition to the directives and for the foreseeable future the following principles will apply to our local situation at Our Lady of the Lakes. The layout of our Church building allows us to "safely social distance" with about 250 people in attendance. This number will be enforced at all liturgies. Additionally, we have set up St. Joseph's Hall for overflow, where the other priest will celebrate a full Mass, if we are in need. I believe the crowd will be greatest at 9:30 and 11, but we shall see. Fr. Christopher and I will be ready to do extra duty if the need arises. We will do our best to accommodate all who wish to enter and pray. We will also make adjustments once we see how things progress. The congregation will not be offered the Precious Blood during this time. We will only distribute the Eucharistic Host in the hand; this is a respiratory virus and we should not be breathing on one another. Confessions will continue to be heard at 3:30 p.m. on Saturdays. Finally, please use common sense and treat everyone with respect, now is not the time to "prove anything."

During this time of returning to public worship we have been asked to consider and plan to bring the elect, those in the RCIA, into full communion. Additionally, we are to plan for the reception of Holy Communion for those who are waiting to receive for the first time. These liturgies for these groups of people, the RCIA and First Communion, will be celebrated on dates yet to be determined. They will happen in due course. As for the celebration of Confirmation, we are waiting for the

Archdiocese to direct us as this requires a Bishop to confer the sacrament. As soon as we hear about this path forward we will let you know. In short, I ask your prayers for the staff, Fr. Christopher and me during this time. We will do our best to lead and help everyone return to worship in the safest way possible. If you need to contact us at the parish office, please call. We are present but on reduced hours. So, just leave a message if no one answers and we will return the call as soon as possible.

Our Mass on Monday morning May 25th will be celebrated at 9:00 a.m. as it is Memorial Day. I invite you to join us for Mass to pray for our country, those who sacrifice to protect our freedom and those who died protecting the same. Hopefully, everyone will enjoy time with their family and celebrate the many gifts given to us from God our Heavenly Father.

This weekend we celebrate the feast of the Ascension; an important feast for our consideration and hope. This feast is about Christ ascending so He may send us the Holy Spirit for guidance. This feast is also about our letting go of attachment in this world in order to freely seek Him, the Truth and the glory of the Kingdom of Heaven. Christ desires us to be reconciled to the Father and where He ascends we hope to follow. This event gives us cause for rejoicing, knowing that what we await is the fulfillment of our hope. Indeed, The Lord mounts His throne with shouts of joy. He does this to send us the Holy Spirit so that we may gain the Kingdom when our earthly lives are done.

As many if not all of you know, this weekend we have begun to resume public Masses here in the Archdiocese, though in reduced numbers. This is a day to celebrate and an answer to our prayers. Therefore, as a parish community, I want to encourage us to take a moment and thank God for the answer to our prayers with Masses resuming and for all of the many blessings we have received in these weeks.

As I have mentioned in my bulletin articles and homilies, this time of quarantine was not a punishment. It was an opportunity for us to grow in faith, in our belief and desire for Jesus in the Eucharist. God has been working

something greater here. As I have mentioned before, this Lent, Holy Week, and Easter are not one we will soon forget. 

FAITH FORMATION NEWS

Well, here it is folks; this is what it all boils down to for us. Jesus cannot make it any simpler for us to understand. What He is saying is that all power was given to Him and what does He do...He turns around and says; here I give it to you so that you can help me do my Father's work. Now, we may not always get it right, but He knew that we wouldn't before He handed that command on to us. Then when we open back up, if they are armed with the experience of these prayers they will feel more comfortable to attend in person. Please, do as Jesus has asked of you and invite others to "watch parties" of these events with you.

Likewise, even though we did not get the chance yet to have a proper end to this past year of formation (which we will somehow, someday), we have begun the registration process for the upcoming year. Tell your neighbors, your children that have children that you just want to help Jesus do what He has asked you to do, and therefore you are spreading the word of our school and parish opportunities for our children to grow in the education of their faith. Pass the word on that we are preparing now to open in the fall (whatever that may look like) by registering our students now. Registration forms will be available beginning next week on the parish website and in hard copy in the church and parish office.
