## THOUGHTS FROM FR. SCOTT

Today we begin the final week of our Lenten observance and the final two weeks to prepare for our celebration of Easter. Use this coming week to prepare by recommitting to your Lenten promises and practicing them in earnest. Make diligent use of the scheduled prayer events and sacramental opportunities. I cannot stress enough the awesome power of quiet contemplation. These devotions and prayers call us to deeper communion with our Lord and teach us how to be in the presence of Jesus without distraction. I remind you of the poster board and prayer cards that are available near the baptismal font. These are the names and pictures of those involved in our RCIA group and our candidates for Confirmation and First Holy Communion. I encourage everyone to take a card or two from the basket and remember these people by name in your daily prayers until they receive the sacrament for which they are preparing. This is a great way for us to support those who are freely choosing to enter our community of faith in a most profound manner. Please join in prayer for everyone celebrating these Sacraments of salvation.

Our Gospel passage this weekend reminds us of our need for God, Our Heavenly Father. Today, Christ struggles with the will of the Father and His own desire to be in the world close to His people. His example calls us to be people dedicated to God in ways that the world may never understand. We are called to be patient and understanding. These terms are often at odds with our own personal desires and need for control. The fact remains, we must surrender everything to God just as our loving Savior did. In this surrender of will we please God and show Him just how willing we are to love and be loved. We are also made extraordinary in the eyes of world. Hoping to become people dedicated to God with humble hearts filled with joy.

## FR. CHRISTOPHER'S CONTEMPLATIONS

*Holy Spirit that our Christian lives are sustained. It is through the acts of the Holy Spirit that we have life and through His actions in Baptism we have been claimed for Christ, as God's beloved children. The Holy Spirit in Confirmation grants us the fullness of the gifts of the Spirit. The Holy Spirit gives us or assists us in a life of grace and holiness. The Holy Spirit is the sanctifier, the advocate sent to us by Christ for our grace.*

A son is a son, because he has a father. Christ, the Son, is begotten of the Father, while the Holy Spirit proceeds from the Father and the Son. It is through the love of the Father and the Son that the Holy Spirit proceeds. The Holy Spirit, like Christ, is fully divine and shares a special and particular relationship with the Father and the Son.

As we have been discussing over these past weeks, each member of the Most Holy Trinity (Father, Son, and Holy Spirit) must be adored and glorified. Again, they are not three distinct gods, rather they are three distinct persons through whom we can and ought to have a relationship. We can often see God as some obscure being in the sky and forget that God longs for us to have a relationship with Him. We can forget that there are three distinct persons in the Trinity who all long for us to cultivate a relationship with them.

The Father is often referred to as the creator. The Son is the redeemer and the Holy Spirit is the sanctifier. These titles are not who they are, but rather

what it is that they do. That is why we are baptized in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, instead of in the name of the creator, redeemer and sanctifier. The Most Holy Trinity is so important to our Christian life and that is why the creed is so important. Without the Most Holy Trinity, we would have nothing, not even our lives.

The final line of the creed with regard to the Holy Spirit reminds us that the Holy Spirit is the one who has spoken through the prophets. When we read sacred scripture, we can see how the Holy Spirit is active in the sanctification of God's people. The Holy Spirit is the one who has spoken through the prophets, through the Saints and through the Church. The Catholic Church has been founded by Jesus Christ and guided by the Holy Spirit ever since her inception. Jesus told us that He would send His advocate after Him to guide us. Therefore I encourage all of us to seek the guidance of the Holy Spirit.

The Holy Spirit often can seem abstract and difficult to understand. The best many seem to have is seeing Him as a dove. I would encourage us to move beyond the simple and ask the

Holy Spirit to reveal Himself to us in a deeper way. To turn to the Spirit to guide us in our daily lives and in growing daily in grace and holiness. The trinity is there waiting for us to seek their grace and guidance. Let us pray to them this day that they may always help us to grow in holiness and freedom from sin.





## ST. BASIL THE YOUNGER FEAST DAY | MARCH 26 DIED CIRCA 952

As a young man, Basil began living as a hermit near Constantinople, now Istanbul, Turkey. Courtiers of the Byzantine emperor, alarmed at his appearance and fearful of his influence, had him arrested and questioned as a spy. Basil would say only that he was a pilgrim and stranger on earth, but he denounced their immoral lifestyles. According to his hagiography, he survived their cruel tortures and being thrown to a lion unharmed, and was saved from an official drowning by two dolphins. These miracles won him freedom. Thereafter, many of the faithful came to his hermitage for healing, prophecies and instruction. Basil reportedly lived to the age of 110.



*Jean's Jottings* **FAITH FORMATION**

"Create a clean heart in me O Lord" – one of my favorite nights of the formation year with the students is when they celebrate reconciliation. For our first timers, they go in with trepidation and come out with smiles and excitement; they teach us so much. After watching them before and after they celebrate, I don't know why anyone would not want to experience the joy and relief they feel. I want to invite and encourage you to celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation especially if you have not done so in a while. Feeling God's grace and forgiveness is a gift that none of us should be passing on. If it has been a while, please note that 1) Father will help you along if you tell him it has been a while and you need help and 2) you can find two links to review the steps for celebrating at [ollonline.org/JeansJottings](http://ollonline.org/JeansJottings)

Did you know why it is also called the sacrament of conversion, penance, confession, forgiveness and reconciliation? In the Catechism of the Catholic Church we read: **1423** *It is called the sacrament of conversion because it makes sacramentally present Jesus' call to conversion, the first step in returning to the Father from whom one has strayed by sin.*

*It is called the sacrament of Penance, since it consecrates the Christian sinner's personal and ecclesial steps of conversion, penance, and satisfaction.*

**1424** *It is called the sacrament of confession, since the disclosure or confession of sins to a priest is an essential element of this sacrament. In a profound sense it is also a*

*"confession" - acknowledgment and praise - of the holiness of God and of his mercy toward sinful man.*

*It is called the sacrament of forgiveness, since by the priest's sacramental absolution God grants the penitent "pardon and peace."*<sup>6</sup>

*It is called the sacrament of Reconciliation, because it imparts to the sinner the life of God who reconciles: "Be reconciled to God."<sup>7</sup> He who lives by God's merciful love is ready to respond to the Lord's call: "Go; first be reconciled to your brother."<sup>8</sup>*

"How often do we need to celebrate the sacrament" you ask? Again let us look to the CCC: **1457** *According to the Church's command, "after having attained the age of discretion, each of the faithful is bound by an obligation faithfully to confess serious sins at least once a year."*<sup>56</sup>

If you haven't celebrated this past year, then know I am praying that you do so now. Look at the parish website and or bulletin for times and opportunities here at OLL.

Know of my continued prayers for your Lenten journey.

The church requires that all Catholic 14 years of age and older abstain from eating meat on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday and the Fridays of Lent. Catholics ages 18-59 must also fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. This means that they may only eat 1 full meal and 2 lesser meals and not eat between meals. Using these practices, and others, we conform our hearts to the Lord in His fasting.
