THOUGHTS FROM FR. SCOTT

Today, Sunday, at the 9:30 a.m. Mass, we will be formally blessing our catechists for the coming year in celebration of Catechetical Sunday. Anyone who formally teaches the faith to anyone else is considered a catechist in the Church. More than a fancy title, catechists are a vital part of the Church. They are ministers who inspire and direct faith in and for others. Without the many catechists who serve the universal Church we would be lost. I fondly remember the many folks that helped educate me over the years. Without their inspiration and dedication my own journey toward God would have taken a very different path to be sure. We owe a debt of gratitude to those who graciously give of their time to educate others. It takes a great deal of work, energy and prayer to be a catechist. So, let's pray and be thankful for everyone who gives of his or her time and talent to participate in this ministry. Thank a catechist this weekend, it may be the simplest yet most important thing you do all weekend!

In the coming weeks our OCIA, the process by which we receive adults into the Catholic faith, and faith formation programs will be starting up. Please be attentive to the start dates if you are part of these groups. These programs will be in full swing soon enough. This time of year brings with it the excitement of moving closer to God in all things and especially through our study of His ways. More specific information about these programs will be forthcoming.

Perhaps you noticed the crosses along the front of the Church property on Dixie Highway? Hopefully, they will remind you of a very important fact of our daily lives: life is a precious gift from God and under attack in our culture. Yes, the federal law has been overturned and the so called "federal right to abortion" is no longer. Now it is up to each State to determine what to do with abortion and its legality. In Michigan there is a horrible proposal being offered for our vote in November. This proposal as written, proposal 3, is simply a right to murder the most defenseless of all human beings; babies in the womb and newly born infants. We have a *spiritual obligation* to defeat this


proposal and the crosses are a reminder of this fact. No Christian, Catholic or otherwise, can in good conscience support this proposal in any way without putting their mortal soul at risk. Yes, it is a matter of our eternal salvation. Supporting murder, in the womb or otherwise, will not gain us the Kingdom of Heaven and a vote for proposal 3 is exactly that, supporting murder. So, the crosses are there to remind us to support life at every stage from the first moment of conception to a last natural breath. This is required of every follower of Jesus and Life is Gods' first and most precious gift to us. The crosses also remind us that we are to care for one another and not cast stones upon our sisters and brothers but rather to accompany them in faith. This too is required of all disciples of Jesus. So, please pray for life and especially for all of those who find it a burden in any way. It is a matter for all us to show our love for God by proudly standing up for His most precious gift to us.

This weekend, our Scripture readings remind us to be people of integrity and hope knowing the generosity of God; being a person of integrity means there should be no duplicity in us. Our Lord asks us to live lives worthy of our calling in Him. Therefore, we need to realize that duplicity is contrary to our Christian calling. By practicing the virtues of honesty and integrity we weed out those things working against our nature and vocation in Christ. We find true freedom in Christ when we are honest and act with complete integrity. The way to life in Christ requires us to be people whose words meld with our actions. So, it is not "do as I say and not as I do," rather it is "do as I say and do." We call this leading by example!

VOILAND'S VIEW

Our Blessed Mother Mary provides many good things to multitudes of people. She holds a great number of titles within the Church which describe her exalted status and the benefits she offers to her children. Among those titles, she is Virgin, Mother, Queen, Seat, and Refuge. Under her many titles, she is the recipient of our prayers and she is intercessor on our behalf. Through prayer, countless people seek Mary's attention by offering the Rosary. This devotion brings comfort and peace amidst the chaos of hectic life in our hyperactive society. Simply being able to turn to Mary in prayer as our Mother is a source of quiet peace.

During my seminary formation, I came to know Mary in a different way. I became noticeably aware of Mary's role in my life as Model. I had not really seen her in this light in the past – at least not very clearly. The role of models in our lives is truly significant. Whether we realize it or not, people who occupy prominent positions in our day-to-day existence have a profound effect on the kind of people we turn out to be, even affecting us in the later years of life. Parents are, obviously, major influences upon our human development – for better or worse. Growing as little ones, our parents are our whole world. They are quite literally gods in our lives – until they themselves teach us about the true God! We see how our parents act, what they say and do, and then we try to copy them. I was blessed to have great parents and I sought to be like them in many ways. They were solid models of faith and love. How I modeled them, though, was even more thorough than I knew. Nowadays, I can catch myself saying something, or gesturing in a certain way, only to suddenly realize, "Oh, my gosh! I'm my father!" We mysteriously absorb aspects of the important people in our lives.

If Mary is important in our lives, she has this same effect. Contemplation on her life is genuine inspiration for those of us who struggle to make sense of our daily challenges. While we have faith in God, we can't just pick up the phone and call him to get advice. Mary could not call God on the phone either, but her peaceful confidence reveals that she was in constant contact with him nonetheless. "Do whatever he tells you," she says. And she seemed content to do whatever the Lord told her, regardless of how impossible it might have seemed. Certainly, after Jesus' birth, she held, nurtured, spoke with, and loved God incarnate. But her entire life, even before she was pregnant with Christ, had to have been one of continuous awareness and dependence upon her

heavenly Father. Her reception of the news from an angel that she would bear God's Son was news that she would not have been able to deal with had she not already know the Lord well. Then came pregnancy, raising Jesus as a child, learning to know him as an adult, and finally enduring the intensity and ultimate torment of his public ministry. She was tested beyond normal human limits. Without an intimate relationship with God, she would have been crushed by the magnitude of her calling. Yet, she was not crushed, but was the one who crushed the Ancient Serpent with her consent to bear Christ.

We can grow to be more like Mary when we spend time close to her heart. What we know of Mary is *all* heart. Although she allows us to be sentimental in her embrace, she is tough as nails. Her heart is strong and relentlessly faithful. Like the best mother and the kindest queen, she put herself at the service of her Lord and gave herself to the people she loved. She is the model of a human being who lets love transform her into divine union with her God. May we be so fortunate as to have hearts that grow to be like Mary's. Our Lady of the Lakes, pray for us.



This is the start of a very exciting time for the Office of Faith Formation! Today is Catechetical Sunday; a day when we pause to pray for and bless our catechists, teachers and staff members. *"Catechetical Sunday is a wonderful opportunity to reflect on the role that each person plays, by virtue of Baptism, in handing on the faith and being a witness to the Gospel. This year, the theme is: "This is My Body given for you" Those who the parish community has designated to serve as catechists will be called forth to be commissioned for their ministry."*

Monday of this week the catechists will gather in preparation for the start of classes next Sunday and Monday and our OCIA will gather for the first time next Sunday as well. As adults are we praying about where we spend our money; if you are that is wonderful but I fall short in that area. Taking time to pray about budget and how I should spend my money will help me put perspective in how I am honoring God with what I have. I feel as though our young people today are inundated with *spend, spend, spend: have the best of very thing you can and gain as much as you can by our society.*

If we focus ourselves and our prayers on needs rather than wants then perhaps we will see more clearly how we can serve our God and not be mastered by other gods. If we really want to love and serve our Lord a little better the perhaps we need to focus our lives toward Him and use the resources we have been given for His honor and glory.

This week, let us ask ourselves where our alignment is between our God and the worldly gods of need and self-abundance.






As you look at the crosses on our church grounds, remember that each day in the United States, more than 3000 babies lose their lives to abortion. These crosses are a powerful visual display of the tragedy that is abortion. The cross display is an outreach project of Right to Life-Lifespan, the Oakland/ Macomb chapter.

There are over 35 pregnancy help centers in our area as well as faith based post-abortion counseling programs such as Project Rachel and assistance from Lutherans for Life. The outreach purpose of the display is to publicize the reality of abortion while enlightening everyone to the healing message of repentance, forgiveness, and the sacredness of life offered by the Church.
