THOUGHTS FROM FR. SCOTT

FEBRUARY 19TH, 2023

Wednesday, February 22nd, is Ash Wednesday. Ash Wednesday is a day of fast and abstinence for all Catholics, however it is *not* a day of obligation. Still, many people desire to attend Mass to receive their ashes. We will offer three Masses on Wednesday at 8:15 a.m., 10:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. The school children will join us for the morning Masses but there will be plenty of room for everyone who wishes to attend. A full schedule for Ash Wednesday and the Lenten season may be found elsewhere in the bulletin this weekend.

We will offer Stations of the Cross every Friday during Lent. This devotion has personal as well as communal meaning to me. When the school children are in session we will be praying the stations with them on Friday afternoons at 1:15 p.m. Even though the afternoon session is primarily for the school community everyone is invited to attend and pray with us. Every Friday evening of Lent at 7:00 p.m. we will pray the stations primarily for adults as usual. We invite everyone to join us for any or all of these times of prayer. It is important for us to put forth a little extra effort during Lent so as to meet the Lord in prayer and devotion. Every Tuesday during Lent we will be offering Eucharistic Adoration in the Church. We will expose the Eucharist in the Monstrance following the morning Mass about 9:00 a.m. on all Tuesdays of Lent. At 7:00 p.m. we will pray a rosary together and conclude our day with Benediction. Hopefully, everyone will take advantage of this opportunity to pray before the Blessed Sacrament in the Monstrance. This year we will be hearing confessions every Tuesday of Lent at 11:30 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. It is a great privilege for us to have these opportunities and should be desired by all. The Lord desires our presence and wants us draw close to Him, Eucharist Adoration is the best way to accomplish this task in our daily lives. I highly encourage everyone to join us on the Tuesdays of Lent.

Another opportunity to be with God and grow in His Love will take place every Thursday evening of Lent. We will pray a holy hour using the musical style of the Taize community to guide our prayer; these holy hours will be at 7 p.m. in the Church. The Blessed Sacrament will be exposed for adoration and the style of prayer will be very calm and contemplative. The musical style is meant to bring us into a relaxed attitude so as to hear the Lord without talking at Him and without distraction. We will chant the psalms and prayers of the evening

and will conclude with Benediction. The entire evening will last about one hour. It is a wonderful way to calm our souls as we lead our very busy lives. Please join us on Thursdays and respond generously to God by growing in His love this Lent.

I offer some suggestions for our spiritual well-being in order to celebrate a more fulfilling Lenten season. Our first movement this Lent should be to evaluate everything about ourselves spiritually. What things do we need to work on? Will our goal be more "alone time" with God in prayer or something more active in nature? Shall we work on our personalities and/or relationships with others? Are there people we need to reconcile with or perhaps those in need of our forgiveness? By asking these simple questions we can help set things on the correct path in order to improve our lives in Christ. After all, Lent is about our relationship with God asking for His mercy and forgiveness. Our prayer during Lent should be to grow in the Love of God desiring His life within.

In the past, I am sure many have simply tried to "give something up" they greatly desire for Lent. Perhaps by abstaining from a certain food item, we thought we would join our suffering to Christ. This sacrifice is a noble endeavor if done with the proper attitude. However, if this has been your usual and typical practice, I recommend you try something different this year. Maybe we could take this opportunity to add something to our lives instead; such as offering fifteen minutes of silent prayer every day. This could be done in the quiet of your home or even better through a daily visit to a chapel or our Church. Perhaps we could plan to participate in the Stations of the Cross, Taize prayer, Adoration or daily Mass as your schedule allows. We might want to make the ultimate sacrifice and stay home on Sundays without running in a hundred different directions. Or, we could take a daily collection at home and donate the money to the poor at the end of Lent. Offerings of prayer and study will aid us in our desire to grow in spiritual holiness during this season of grace. So, how will we grow in holiness during this Lenten season? Our Lenten journey will be one of great hope and reflection if we truly put forth our best effort in seeking God. Simply giving up sweets and snacks without prayer and reflection will only help us lose weight, not gain the Kingdom!

This week our scriptures are all about holiness and perfection. These virtues are interesting and elusive to most because of our lack of understanding regarding their true meaning. Certainly, holiness is hard to define but easy to recognize when we experience it in others. I write "in others" because the truly holy person never recognizes their own holiness due to the virtue of humility. Holiness is a longing for the presence of the Lord in every way and having His presence about us at every moment. It manifests itself in our dealings with others and especially in our ability to love as God commands. Holiness leads to spiritual perfection as we are filled with the presence of God. So, strive for holiness in all things and love one another as Christ loves us!

Thought for the week: Jesus says: "be perfect, just as your Heavenly Father is perfect." A lofty goal indeed, but attainable through holiness and prayer!

VOILAND'S VIEW

The problem with Jesus is that he expects us to keep changing all the time. On top of that, his Church keeps reminding us of His expectations. And here we are again, a few days from the beginning of Lent, and another call to change: Repent! – will be ringing in our ears. "That Jesus is such a killjoy! He expects too much. He doesn't know what it's like to live the kind of lives we have to live. He doesn't face the troubles we have to face, or deal with the complexity of modern-day human existence." Well – *actually* – he does know. The reason He knows is because He is one of us. He experienced human life exactly as we do. Christ primarily came to sacrifice Himself to pay for our sins. But he came also to show us how to live rightly. And right living is the same today as it was in Christ's days on earth. We fool ourselves to think that we somehow live lives that the ancients could not understand – or that we struggle with challenges never before encountered. In many ways, we lag behind in spiritual and philosophical development as compared to people living at the time of Christ, especially those exposed to Jesus' own teachings.

Our inborn ability to live upright lives has been warped by Original Sin. Although that sin is washed clean through Baptism, our wounded nature still tends toward sin anyway. Praise God, this tendency to do wrong *can* ultimately be mastered, but only by following the example and teachings of Jesus. Jesus came to sanctify human existence, to make it holy. He was the first human being to live life perfectly, as it was meant to be lived. By following Jesus' example and the commands of his teachings, we become holy. By behaving in such a way, we truly do turn. We repent – we change. But here's the rub: change doesn't happen overnight.

The realization that *change takes time* is what makes Christianity so unappealing. The time-consuming demands of a Christian lifestyle are too much for people driven by an instant gratification mentality. We need same day delivery. We want our food *fast*. We don't want 5G phones – we *need* 50G . . . what's the holdup?! We are impatient with others. We are impatient with ourselves. This impatience with ourselves is what compels us to push Christ away.

Christ's call to repent and change into a better person may initially ring true in us. We might well feel a need to change when we find ourselves exhausted from the sins that suck the life out of us. The burden of sin is hard on a person. So, the invitation from Jesus to help us carry our burdens might sound good. But the thought that accepting that invitation means offloading our

sin can be a stopper. That means work. The change looks too big, too demanding – even impossible. It seems impossible because we think that change calls for instantaneous and total conversion – that, somehow, we are supposed to flip a switch and everything will be all right. That is almost never how it works.

Conversion is a process. Turning to Christ, and away from our sins, comes first with the admission that something is broken in us, which needs fixing. It is crucial to realize that our sin has got to go – but then not be instantly scared away from repentance by thinking about what it will take to succeed. Satan wants us to think that overcoming our sinful weaknesses is impossible. He makes us feel defeated, before we even begin the fight. The Devil helps us reason away our sinful inclinations, so that we don't have to engage in fighting them. At that point, he's got us, and we stay stuck in our sin.

The key to defeating sin is to identify it, own it, and engage in battling it *with Christ*. The battle is fought over time, a day at a time – sometimes minutes at a time. Patience with ourselves in fighting our sins is something that neither Satan nor the world will allow. When the Evil One can convince us that the task is too big, or that the fix will take too long, we will dismiss it and explain it away. That dismissiveness is why we have a constitutional right to murder in Michigan; killing is "healthcare." We don't have to think about our "problems"; we just kill them.

We will ultimately be killed – *eternally* – if we do not face our diseases, our sins. Once admitted and engaged in battle, our sinfulness is covered by the blood of Jesus Christ. A sense of victory over these sins may not come for days, months, or even years. We may carry disappointment over some of our weaknesses to our graves. But God will *not* be disappointed in us if we come back to him again, and again, and again. But, we must turn. We must beg his grace and forgiveness.

Jean's Jottings | Faith Formation News

Ugh! Why does it need to be so hard...I have to love those who persecute me and my enemies? Yes, this is often hard but I am here to tell you that this approach is so very, very freeing! I, not too long ago, walked with my brother as he was in his final months of life which is hard on anyone but for me this was especially challenging because to say we had some relationship hardships is an understatement; in many ways the last thing I wanted to do was exactly what I was asked to do. Here is the thing though, my God, gave me everything I needed to walk the walk; He gave me the example of His love! A love that does not make excuses or forgets but just loves no matter what the circumstances. For me, the example of love got me through the pain I was experiencing and allowed me to focus on healing and love. My prayer for you all is that if you are experiencing persecution of sorts or having to face those that are your enemies, that you focus on the love that only God grants us and allow that power to free you from whatever hatred or hesitation you may have.

I also found this "Family Connection" to share with you as well in hopes that it helps your family talk about God's love especially as we enter into our Lenten Journey this week:

Family Connection

Family life teaches us many things. It is often at home that we learn practical skills such as cooking, riding a bike, and making repairs. Talk about some of the things that the members of your family have learned to do at home. We also learn about caring at home. Talk about times when you have learned a lesson about sharing, forgiving, or loving through an experience that happened at home.

Talk about how love is the most important thing a family can share with one another. Explain that it is the same in God's family. Read aloud this Sunday's Gospel, Matthew 5:38-48. Talk about how Jesus tried to teach his disciples how to love others beyond those who are closest to them. Jesus tells them to love even their enemies. As members of God's family, we are called to do the same thing. Talk about some concrete ways you can "love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you"

Remind your children that Jesus does not expect us to be perfect. Jesus knows that we are human and will not always do everything correctly. Explain that what Jesus wants us to do is to love others as if they were Jesus himself. If we reach out in love to others, we are doing exactly what Jesus did. That is what perfection looks like. End this time together by praying the [Act of Love](#):

O my God, I love You above all things with my whole heart and soul, because You are all good and worthy of all my love. I love my neighbor as myself for the love of You. I forgive all who have injured me and I ask pardon of those whom I have injured. Amen.

Catholics from the ages of 18-59 must also fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. This means that they may only eat 1 full meal and 2 lesser meals and not eat between meals. Using these practices, and others, we conform our hearts to the Lord in His fasting.
