THOUGHTS FROM FR. SCOTT

MARCH 5, 2023

Hopefully your Lent is off to a wonderful and holy beginning. It is only the second week but it is never too early to ask ourselves how well we are doing in accomplishing our spiritual goals. There are many prayer opportunities being offered during Lent so as to help everyone grow in love for God and neighbor. Please take advantage of these opportunities to grow in Grace. We had a nice turn out last week for the day of Adoration, our Taize prayer and stations. Perhaps more people will join us each and every week during Lent. Please see the full Lenten schedule of events located elsewhere in the bulletin today.

Please remember those in our OCIA program, now *the elect* of our parish, who are preparing to receive the Sacraments at Easter. These wonderful people are making an effort to strengthen their relationship with God in a very important way. Our support for them is vital to their growth and hope in Christ. We should pray for them and everyone preparing to enter the Church by lending a kind word and prayer of encouragement. Please remember our elect in your daily prayers. There are always many people and situations needing our prayers and support; the OCIA candidates and catechumens are among the most important.

In the main gathering area of the Church there is a poster board with pictures of our OCIA, Confirmation and First Eucharist candidates. Underneath the board is a basket with prayer cards of all of those who are receiving any sacrament of initiation this year. Please take a card from the basket and remember that person, by name, in your daily prayers until they receive the sacrament(s) for which they are preparing. This is a great way for us to support those who are freely choosing to enter our community of faith in a most profound manner. This board will be up and names available throughout Lent. Please make an effort to pray for all of those entering any sacramental stage of their life.

Thought for the week: God shows His glory and majesty in many events past and present. Are we aware and awake enough to notice them?

VOILAND'S VIEW

You can't give what you haven't got.

This ancient, but wise, saying is so basic that we might not give it a second thought: "Duh. No kidding!" might be our response. After all, you can't give someone ten dollars if you are flat broke. You can't teach someone how to do brain surgery if you have no medical knowledge. You can't even read a child a bedtime story if you don't have the ability to read. You truly cannot give what you haven't got!

But the truth of this old precept works on a much deeper level than mere worldly pursuits. The truth is that we also cannot give *spiritual* gifts to anyone if we don't first possess them ourselves. Consider gifts of the heart and soul: think about love, patience, forgiveness, faithfulness, comfort and consolation, perseverance, and healing. All of these things, which come from deep inside our being, are things we Christians feel called to give to others. But to *possess* these gifts well enough to be able to give them away to others, means more than simply *understanding* what they are. In order to give a gift of the heart or soul, our heart and soul must be active in the giving. It takes more than just brains.

Take *patience*, for an example. It seems that just about everyone complains about lacking patience with others.

We might lose patience with a customer service person on the telephone, or with other drivers on the road, or just waiting in line for "fast" food. In these situations, we might even realize that our impatience is unjustified – and we feel badly. But we really feel guilty when we mistreat someone close to us – one of our children, or an elderly parent, grandparent, or neighbor, by being impatient for no good reason. This lack of kindness, this neglect of charity can be truly hurtful – and, if we see what we have done, we become sad and disappointed in ourselves. Yet, in all of this disappointment, did we even know what it means to be patient? Do we have any patience to give?

This point is crucial: if we have never been patient with ourselves, we won't even know what patience is. We won't have any patience to give away, because we haven't even got enough for ourselves. Patience – and love, and forgiveness, and loyalty, and consolation – are all more than just words. Simply knowing a dictionary definition of patience, or any other virtue, does not mean we truly know it effectively. We have to live it to know it. And we


have to learn to live it in ourselves first, before we can know how to give it away to others.

Again, regarding practicing patience, if we never cut ourselves any slack for being imperfect human beings, we'll never be able to give anyone else a break either. Constantly beating ourselves up for our every little failure will spill over into how we treat everyone else. If we are impatient with ourselves, our very nature is to be impatient. On the other hand, if we learn to give ourselves room to grow each day, we develop a sense of peace. By acknowledging that we are imperfect, patience with ourselves will be easier to practice with others.

The same idea applies to loving ourselves. It might sound conceited to say such a thing. But, we are talking here about *Godly* love, not about being infatuated with ourselves and being sickening narcissists. Good and proper loving of ourselves comes from knowing that God loves us deeply, and wants all good things for us. Healthy love of self is rooted in gratitude to God for his unfathomable generosity. He created us out of love, to be loved, and to love others. That is one marvelous reality! The greatness of this gift is lost if we loath ourselves, or are always overly critical of ourselves. We lose a sense of our own goodness – *and we won't be able to see the goodness in others*. We cannot give what we haven't got.

As we journey through this Lent, seeking to improve relationships with God and others, pay attention. Watch for the times you accuse yourself of failing in a relationship, either with God, or someone else. Notice if the offenses against them are also things you do to yourself. If you lie to others, do you lie to yourself, too? If you won't give others any of your precious time, do you deprive yourself of time for proper selfcare? If you use others for your pleasure, do you abuse yourself, too? If you don't matter to yourself, why would anyone else matter to you? Remember that God loves you deeply. He wants you to be a channel of love to others. Make sure you claim his love, so that you can give it away again!

What is Eucharistic Adoration and what do we do there? As Catholics we believe that Christ, Jesus, is real and present in the Eucharist and that the Eucharist is the Source and Summit of our faith. Eucharistic Adoration gives us the opportunity to really and truly sit with the Lord. The Eucharist is placed in the Monstrance (Latin meaning to show) and placed on the altar. The faithful are given the opportunity to spend time in silence with the Lord; to pray, to praise, to adore Him and His presence. We can gaze upon the Lord and be with Him. While in His presence you can thank Him, you can read Scripture, you can meditate on His Word, you can ask Him to speak to you and be silent. Really the time is yours as an opportunity to really be present to Him, and He to you. The Catechism states adoration as "the first attitude of man acknowledging that he is a creature before his Creator. It exalts the greatness of the Lord who made us and the almighty power of the Savior who sets us free from evil. Adoration is homage of the spirit to the "King of Glory," respectful silence in the presence of the "ever greater" God. Adoration of the thrice-holy and sovereign God of love blends with humility and gives assurance to our supplications." —Catechism of the Catholic Church, no. 2628. If you have never taken the opportunity to do so, I urge you to take advantage of the opportunities this Lent and spend some time with Him.

Lent is a great time to deepen your relationship with God and we have 144 children, teens and adults in our parish that are nearing the completion of their journey towards celebrating sacraments of adult Baptism, Eucharist and Confirmation. As a parish it is our privilege to support, lift and surround them in prayer. Available in the front gathering area of the church are individual prayer cards for those that will be celebrating in April on Holy Saturday or in April and May. Please take a card and spend time praying for their continued journey. I thank you in advance for letting them know and feel the support and welcome that the OLL family can provide.


